ASKS AID IN VAIN

While Woman Pleads to See Husband, He Dies.

SEEKS LEGAL ASSISTANCE

Mrs. S. W. Whitney, of Los Angeles, Appeals to Court for Order to See Mate, Declaring Lawyer Plots Against Her.

LOS ANGELES, June 8.—Mrs. Sarah W. Whitney, a prominent club woman of Pasadena, and well known in the crown city, today invoked the aid of the Superior Court in order that she might be able to see her aged husband, G. A. Whitney, a wealthy retired real estate operator, who is ill at the California Hospital.
Mrs. Whitney alleges that she is restrained by the attending physician, Dr. E. J. Cook, and by the nurses, from seeing her husband. An effort on the part of a prominent attorney to control the disposal of the Whitney estate is alleged by Mrs. Whitney to be back of the opposition. The doctor says the patient is too ill to be seen.
The court has appointed two other physicians to investigate the case.
While Mrs. Whitney was on the witness stand testifying as to why she should be allowed to see her husband, Mr. Whitney died at the hospital. Mrs. Whitney was not informed of the death of her husband until after the case had been continued until tomorrow, and she had left the courtroom.

FAVOR AMERICAN HORSES

Opening of International Horshoew at London Gala Event.
LONDON, June 8.—At the International Horse Show this morning, W. H. Moore, of New York, took second prize with Berkeley Bantam in Class II, judging of pony stallions foaled previously to or in 1906, not exceeding 14 hands.
Olympia was packed to its fullest capacity this afternoon for the gala performance of the horse show in honor of the visit of the King and Queen. The building was beautifully decorated with flowers.
Ambassador Whitelaw Reid and practically all the other Ambassadors and

Ministers in London were present, accompanied by their wives as usual.
The big event, the jumping competition for the King's cup, in which teams representing Argentine Republic, Canada, Great Britain, France and Italy, took part, was won by the French team.
American exhibitors got first and second honors in class 40, a pair of horses to be driven by India, C. V. West was awarded first prize, \$200, with Norena and Kitty Grey, while W. H. Moore got second money with Phyllis and Metella.

BLACKHAND MEN ON TRIAL

West Virginia Italians Face General Charge of Blackmailing.
FAIRMONT, W. Va., June 8.—With the counsel table piled with knives, revolvers and other paraphernalia of an alleged black hand society, 19 Italians arrested two months ago in a raid were placed on trial today in the Circuit Court. Oratio Prabell, 19 years old, testified that he was forced to join the organization under penalty of death. Prabell said he was approached many times by countrymen, who threatened to kill him unless he became a member. He told of finally informing the District Attorney, who offered five \$5 bills and advised him to join the organization. Prabell testified that he was told by the society members that it was customary to make a demand for money on rich men. If the rich man declined to give the money demanded, the members drew cards from a deck and the one drawing a certain number was to kill the man who refused to pay. He identified nine of the 19 prisoners as those who initiated him into the black hand organization.

WILL FIGHT EXTRADITION

Man and Wife Accused of Defrauding Scranton Man.
GRASS VALLEY, Cal., June 8.—Captain J. W. Morrell and his wife have been arrested and released on \$500 bonds at Forest City, Sierra County, on a charge of obtaining \$10,000 from John Bosson, of Scranton, Pa., through a fraudulent mining deal. Bosson asserts that he invested the money in a mine at Forest City which Morrell claimed to own, but which he had merely bonded.
Morrell and his wife, who have been indicted by the grand jury of Lackawanna County, Pa., have declared their intention to fight extradition and have gone to San Jose to prepare for a legal battle.
Big Car of Lumber.
EUGENE, Or., June 8.—(Special.)—The largest carload of lumber ever brought to Eugene was shipped from the Booth-Kelly mills at Sagaraw and unloaded at the company's yards in Eugene today. The car contained 21,000 feet of dry cedar lumber. The average car of lumber contains about 20,000 feet.

ODD ACCIDENT ON SHIP

AMMONIA FUMES OVERCOME PASSENGERS ON LINER.
Woman and Child on Oriental Boat Suffer Injury Before Boat Reaches Bay City.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 8.—The bursting of a valve in the ice plant of the Pacific Mail steamer China, as the vessel was nearing this port from the Orient today, flooded the first class cabins with ammonia and several passengers narrowly escaped suffocation. Among those suffering from the effects of the ammonia when the steamer arrived here were Mrs. C. R. Rosenstock, wife of a former editor of the Manila Bulletin, and the youngest of her four children.
In attempting to remove the child from the cabin she fell, wrenched her ankle and was overcome by the fumes. She and the child, also unconscious, were taken out by officers of the ship. A little boy of the Rosenstock family proved himself a hero by attempting to carry out his little brother and giving the alarm when he found his strength insufficient.

EXCHANGE PROBE IS OVER

Committee Forwards Report to Hughes, Who Keeps Silent.

ALBANY, N. Y., June 8.—Horace White, chairman of the committee appointed by Governor Hughes to inquire into the facts surrounding the business of exchanges in New York, today submitted a report of the committee's findings. The nature of the report, which was unanimous, will not be disclosed until it is made public by Governor Hughes.

HAT MAKERS WIN STRIKE

Union Label Will Be Used and Factories to Reopen.
DANBURY, Conn., June 8.—The strike that has closed 22 hat factories in this city, Bethel and New Milford for the last five months was practically ended today, both sides making concessions. An agreement was reached between 15 of the manufacturing concerns and the National executive advisory boards of the United Hatters. Six of the factories not in the agreement began work today as open shops.
The terms of settlement include an agreement on the part of the manufacturers to withdraw from the National Association of Hat Manufacturers,

which can be done on 90 days' notice. According to the terms of the agreement, the union employees are to return to work as individuals for 90 days, and after the withdrawal of the manufacturers from the National Association becomes effective, matters in dispute will be arbitrated and the use of the union label will be resumed.

Retired Officers Ousted.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Two more retired naval officers were today detached from important active duty and a third officer who will be retired this month also was detached from active duty. The retired officers are Rear-Admiral H. N. Manney, in charge of the naval coaling station at San Diego, Cal., to be relieved by Civil Engineer F. T. Chambers, and Commander C. P. Perkins, commandant of the Pacific Naval District, to be relieved by Captain A. G. Berry. Captain Berry also will serve as senior member of the Board of General surveys of the Pacific Coast, when relieved of command of the receiving ship Lancaster by Captain A. Mertz.
