WILL FORM COMMERCIAL CLUB—There will be meeting of the promoters of the Sellwood Commercial Club tonight at the parlors of A. B. Hemstock's establishment on East Thirtieth street and Union.

Dr. R. S. Skarns presiding. It was decided to organize a club with a capital stock of \$1500, whose object was to promote the growth of Sellwood and provide permanent quarters. William H. Morhouse, Dr. W. L. Johnson and Walter Adams were appointed a committee on permanent organization and they will report on a plan tonight. Tentative arrangements have been made for rooms in the Sellwood Bank building on Union.

Unanimous subject to approval of the club. As yet more than half \$1500 have been subscribed the club will incorporate. Later the club will erect a building. It has not been started in opposition to the Sellwood Board of Trade, but to work with it. The quarters of the club will be provided with a billiard room, library and a social meeting room. The project is quite popular with the residents of the suburb.

PROFESSOR METZGER SPEAKS—Professor J. M. Metzger, of Dallas College, addressed the Evangelical Association Ministerial Association informally yesterday forenoon on the "Small Colleges and Christian Education." He said that he did not so much bring to the attention of the audience as to express his own views on this subject. He said that he believed that this fact had come to be recognized as the truth. The association discussed the subject of small colleges and Christian education, and the unanimous opinion of the members that it was the biggest boost Portland has yet had from every view point.

There will be one more meeting next Monday for election of officers, when the association will adjourn for the summer.

MAKING STREET CONNECTIONS—Many of the property-owners on East Burnside street, between East Tenth and East Thirtieth streets are making street connections for water, gas and sewers preparatory to the hard-surface pavement soon to follow. However, there are many others who are not making these connections, and it is desired that they should do so at once while the street is being graded. Attention is called to the fact that the cost now is not more than half what it will be if these connections are not made until after the pavement has been completed. "We can have one of the finest streets on the East Side," said C. N. Rankin, "if all property owners will lay their gas, water and sewer pipes at once, and not wait and tear up the street after it has been paved. It will be expensive to make this improvement and we hope to keep it unmarred."

METHOD IN DOUBT

Water Board Discusses Pipe Line Across River.

QUESTION OF TUBE RAISED

Clarke Advises Laying Conduit Under Water, but Suggestion is Made Water Be Conveyed on Superstructure New Span.

Whether or not it is wise to lay a large main for carrying a supply of Bull Run water to the West Side across the new Madison-street bridge, is a question now receiving careful consideration by Mayor Lane and members of the Water Board. At a meeting yesterday afternoon, the matter was under discussion for an hour, a report from Chief Engineer Clarke forming the basis. Mr. Clarke advised laying the pipe under water. The report was referred back to him for a detailed statement of the cost of construction.

The suggestion that a tube be constructed across the river on the new steel span soon to be put in at Madison street was conveyed to the Water Board through a communication from H. M. Eterly, a member of the City Executive Board. Mr. Eterly was given the idea by Oscar Hubert, a civil engineer. The Water Board now wishes information as to what will be the cost of carrying it across on a specially constructed superstructure and of the expense for the pipe itself. Mr. Clarke gave an approximate estimate of the cost of pipe from \$40,000 to \$50,000, and the cost of building the tube with the superstructure at perhaps \$30,000. It is thought perhaps \$10,000 or more may be saved by placing it under the water instead of carrying it overhead.

Mayor Lane expressed the fear that, some day, a big vessel might ram the steel bridge, soon to be built, and that both ship and bridge will be wrecked. Otherwise he seems to favor the plan to place a large main above water.

Owing to the fact that the people elected last week to change the system of laying mains, so that all pipes over 10 inches in diameter shall be paid for by bonds the board voted to hold up all the mains until July 1, when the law will become effective. Mayor Lane was averse to this action, as he has always favored the present law, which is that the benefited property shall pay the cost. He maintains the new plan will not work satisfactorily.

The new East Side water office, just being completed at East Seventh and Alder streets, will be opened to the public July 1, if possible. Superintendent Dodge so announced at the meeting of yesterday. City Engineer Thompson, of Seattle, stated in a letter to the Board that he is giving the plans of Chief Engineer Clarke, of the local department, careful study, having received a full set recently. Mr. Thompson was employed by the Board as consulting engineer. Later he will come to Portland to inspect the ground through which the second large pipe line to Bull Run will be constructed.

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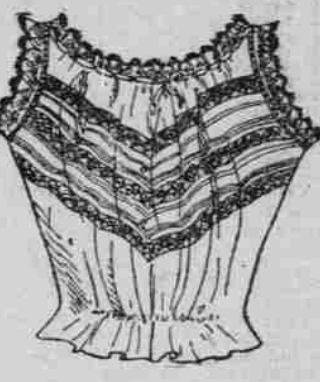
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
