

JOY CLUB TO RENEW CAMPAIGN

Effort Will Be Undertaken to Assure Success of Races and Stock Show.

GOOD START TO WORK ON

Drake Heads Movement to Sell 3500 Season Tickets Necessary to Complete \$25,000 Guarantee for Project.

As a result of the prominence which Portland has gained as a livestock center within the last year, and as a result of the interest that was taken in the record-breaking season of harness races here last fall, the effort to make the second annual meet to be held the week of September 20-25 the most brilliant achievement of its kind ever attempted in the Pacific Northwest will be redoubled by the promoters of the great sportsman's project.

The Portland races and livestock show which were given at the Country Club grounds last September took their place among the foremost endeavors that have been made west of Chicago, and it is for the purpose of adding still greater prestige to this city that the new campaign is to be undertaken.

Beginning next Monday, a corps of campaigners, selected by the directors of the Portland Fair, will start out to raise the balance of the fund which is essential to the success of the Fall meet of this year.

Soon after the Pacific National Livestock Exposition and race meet of last September, a crusade to sell 3500 season tickets for the 1909 meet was inaugurated, and during the week or ten days during which the canvass was kept up nearly 1500 tickets were disposed of.

Thus nearly one-third of the work of insuring the success of this year's show was accomplished, and it is for the purpose of guaranteeing the full \$25,000 which will be required to float the undertaking this September that the new campaign will be initiated.

Directors Make Plans.

President Wehrung, of the Portland Fair and Livestock Association, held a conference with several of the directors yesterday afternoon, and it was unanimously decided that a never-say-die campaign be conducted not only in Portland, but in all sections of the state where the livestock industry or the harness racing game has any hold whatever.

Director Drake, one of the Country Club leaders, has been selected to manage the campaign, and he will have no fewer than ten committees ready for active work by the end of the week.

The first problem to be taken care of is the careful districting of the city into sections in which the committees will conduct their canvass. This work is in charge of a committee which will work out its plans with ward and precinct maps and turn the results of its work over to the managers.

General Manager Drake feels that there should be little difficulty in placing the remaining 2000 season tickets among Portland people and in the race, horse and livestock centers of the state.

Secretary Drake, of the North Pacific Fair circuit, who will have charge of the harness meets not only here, but at the Salem State Fair, at Seattle, at Spokane, Walla Walla and other leading Northwestern cities, reports that California will send its finest speeders, trotters and pacers over the circuit this fall. Mr. Wisdom recently completed a tour of the California state circuit, and announces that every stable of any prominence will have a complete list of entries in the various events here. Dealing with the results of his trip, Mr. Wisdom said yesterday:

Many Stockmen Coming.

"Stockmen from all over the country, and particularly from the Northwest and from California, have assured me that they will be represented here in greater numbers than ever before."

"In the horse department some of the biggest importers of the East will be represented. Crutch and Sons, of Lafayette, Ind., and McLachlin Bros., of Columbus, Ohio, will have entries of Percheron and Belgian horses, and the former will have German coach and the latter French coach horses as well. These are among the biggest show men in the East. They have already forwarded application blanks for the exposition here and throughout the livestock circuit of the Northwest."

"Eastern cattlemen have also pledged themselves to send here their finest beef, dairy and dual-purpose herds. We had very few outside of the Northwest a year ago."

"The sheep show, which will be a part of the next annual exposition, will attract entries from not only all over America, but from foreign breeding centers as well. About one-third of the sheep in America are raised in the Pacific Northwest, and all the big sheep-raising ranches in the United States will be represented. I fully believe that the sheep show will be finer than the International at Chicago, at present the greatest on the American continent."

Local fair and livestock associations in all parts of the state will be asked to join in the movement to centralize the livestock industry of the Northwest at Portland, this being one of the principal objects of holding annual expositions here.

Reports of the soliciting committee will be made daily as soon as organization has been perfected.

DAIRY INSPECTORS NAMED

Bailey Appoints Three Deputies Under New State Law.

To assist the pure milk cause throughout the state Dairy and Food Commissioner Bailey has appointed three deputies under an act of the Legislature creating the position. The new inspectors, as they are to be called, are Paul V. Maris, of Multnomah; M. S. Schrock, of Marion, and W. W. Catterlin, of Tillamook. Each is to receive \$1200 a year salary from the state plus \$300 traveling expenses.

Heretofore Mr. Bailey has had but one deputy paid by the state, his laboratory chemist, who now is R. V. Williamson. As special deputies, for inspection of dairies, Mr. Bailey has commissioned up to this time Mr. Maris, whose salary has been paid by local creameries, and Mrs. S. A. Yoakum, of Coos, who has been similarly paid by creameries of that locality.

The office of Dairy and Food Commissioner has been short-handed for many years and the work has far outgrown the old facilities of the state. Mr. Bailey will at once start a campaign for cleaner dairies.

INSPECTION IS FAVORED

SEATTLE HAY MERCHANTS SATISFIED WITH NEW LAW.

High Average Will Be Maintained. Surplus Eggs Are Put Into Storage.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 15.—(Special.)—The inspection of hay under the new law now in effect will probably double the receipts at the Seattle office. Forty-five carloads were inspected today and it is expected that a high average will be maintained. No objections have been raised against the inspection of hay, although before the law went into effect several dealers threatened to oppose the new law. Although egg receipts are exceptionally heavy this week prices were well maintained today. All surplus stocks are going into storage temporarily, so that the market is not weakened at any time. As much as 25 cents was secured today for fancy eggs.

Under receipts of berries from nearly every point on Puget Sound, the market broke badly and sold as low as \$1. In fact, most berries sold at that price. The first carload shipments of new potatoes reached here today. The carloads of Early Rose came from California and a carload of Texas potatoes arrived. The top price on new potatoes is 4 cents. Some sell at 3 1/2 cents.
