Eastern States Uncertain.

It is known that most of the Western states and states of the South would gladly welcome opportunity to vote for the rati-fication of such an amendment, but there is scelar. is serious question whether many of the states of the East, the small but populous states, through their Legislatures would fall into line. Sentiment in favor of an income tax is not strong in the East, and the class of men or the class of in-terests that wield great power in East-ern Legislatures would exercise that power to prevent ratification of the sug-gested constitutional amendment. True believers in the income tax have hoped against hope that they would be given opportunity to have a direct vote upon their amendment. They are con-fident that legislation which they con-templated would stand the test in the courts: they believe it would be approved by the Supreme Court, as it is now con-stituited, and they quote at least one judge upon the Supreme banch as voicing this opliaton.
