

UTOS EXPECTED IN SEATTLE TODAY

**Ford Car No. 2 and Shawmut
Are Racing Through Snow
in Snoqualmie Pass.**

SHAWMUT HOPES TO WIN

**Only Eight Miles Behind Leader
When Cars Leave Ellensburg.
Guggenheim Prepares to
Greet Racing Cars.**

SEATTLE, June 22.—With the Ford car No. 2 and the Shawmut car, the two leading contestants in the New York-to-Seattle automobile race winding their way through Snoqualmie Pass in the Cascade Mountains, out of reach of telephone and telegraph, the outcome of the race, which is rapidly approaching an end, is very much in doubt. Although the Ford car No. 2 entered the pass fully eight hours in the lead, the Shawmut car has a chance to catch the leader should the snow be as heavy as reported.

Mr. Robert Guggenheim, donor of the cup and prizes, said tonight that if the cars meet with no obstruction in the pass, there is a chance that the winner in the race may reach the gates of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition, the goal, before daylight.

Mr. Guggenheim had made arrangements to start east to meet the racers as soon as they reach North Bend, the first telegraph station this side of Snoqualmie Pass. It is a 40-mile run, over excellent roads, from North Bend to Seattle, and once out of the mountains they should make fast time.

Ford car No. 2 passed Eaton the entrance to the mountains, 90 miles east of Seattle at 1 o'clock this afternoon. The Shawmut car reached Ellensburg 40 miles east of Eaton at 5:17 P. M., eight hours behind the Ford car.

At that time the driver said that he stood a good chance to catch the Ford car in the mountains. The Ford car No. 1 is reported to be broken down near Prosser, Wash., 214 miles east of Seattle. The winner will receive the Robert Guggenheim silver trophy cup and \$2000; the second car will receive a prize of \$1000.

SHAWMUT CAR MAY YET WIN
**Driver Is Fresh and Close on Heels
of Ford Car at Ellensburg.**

ELLENBURG, Wash., June 22.—(Special.)—Eight hours and fifteen minutes apart, the Shawmut automobile in the New York-to-Seattle race, the Guggenheim car, passed through Ellensburg today. The Ford was in the lead and arrived at 7:45 A. M., having made the trip from Toppenish since midnight.

B. W. Scott was at the wheel and Machineist C. J. Smith was asleep on the seat of the driver's side. After a stop of an hour for breakfast, the little car started on the last leg of the long journey. Guy C. Williams will pilot the car from this city into Seattle.

The Shawmut tore into town at 6:30 this evening, and after stopping for four minutes, took stock with motor oil and tires, and started in pursuit of the Ford. Neither the motor oil nor the tires showed the effects of the trip so far. It is believed that the Ford is in charge of the car, but they had a fighting chance to beat the Ford at Seattle.

T. A. Pottingill was driving and R. H. Meiser acting as mechanic. The Shawmut made the trip from Yakima to Ellensburg, 47 miles, in 1 hour and 46 minutes.

BANKS WILL CELEBRATE
Washington County Will Observe Independence Day July 3.

FOREST GROVE, Or., June 22.—(Special.)—Banks, on the P. R. & N., is celebrating the independence day, the event being remembered by the town on Saturday, July 3.

Besides a civic and historical parade, there will be a general program of sports and street races. The oration will be delivered by William Gilman Hale, of Hillsboro, the Declaration of Independence will be read by W. C. Stewart, of the Methodist Church, and Miss Ethel Smith will give the address of welcome to the celebrants in behalf of the thriving town.

The Banks Cornet band, the largest musical organization in the county, will furnish music for the celebration, in which the towns of Buxton and Greenville will participate.

LARGE CROWD AT WALLOWA
Sunday Excursion to Lake Attracts 2500 People.

WALLOWA, Or., June 22.—(Special.)—Twenty-five hundred people from La Grande, Pendleton, Baker City, Elgin, Wallowa and intermediate points attended the Railroad Men's Picnic at Wallowa Lake Sunday. The people of Joseph met them at the train with free conveyances and took them to the lake. Free lunches of fried late wheat, the visitors to the head of the lake, and served free coffee at the picnic grounds. They provided two ball games for the guests, one in the forenoon between Cove and Elgin, which proved a victory for Cove, and one in the afternoon between the Joseph and Wallowa teams, which proved very much in favor of Wallowa, the score being 16 to 1. Two trains, consisting of 18 coaches, were filled to their utmost capacity.

SCARED SHE KILLS SELF
Nervous Woman Shoots When Friend Knocks on Door.

SEATTLE, June 22.—Mrs. Mabel Tenney, the 22-year-old wife of Franklin Tenney, a steamfitter at the Puget Sound Navy Yard, shot and killed herself in a moment of fright late last night at her home in Charleston, when a friend knocked at the door. This friend came from the husband to tell Mrs. Tenney, who was excessively nervous when alone, that he would be detained late by his work.

FALL GRAIN IS FULL CROP
Farmers About Harrisburg Say Field Will Be Above Average.

HARRISBURG, Or., June 22.—(Special.)—Interviews with about 30 farmers located promiscuously within a radius of 10 miles disclose the fact that the crop of short crops was far fetched, and a slander on this fertile region. The fall grain is a full average and in many instances a bumper crop is in promise. The spring wheat is quite backward, but in the majority of cases the stand is good and the plant has an excellent color. However, some farmers complain that the long continued dry weather blighted their spring wheat to an extent that they do not hope for full recovery.

Hay, alfalfa and vetch are in fine condition, but wheat is in bad shape, owing to winter killing and drought in the spring. Hop culture in this district is being sadly neglected. Of the 300 acres formerly cultivated hereabouts, only one-half is in use for hop culture. The hops have been plowed up and the yards planted to fruit and other crops that can be relied upon to return a profit. Those still hanging onto the hop industry are working in a half-hearted way. No missing hills are being replaced, and the cultivating is being done in such a slipshod manner that a half crop would be a surprise. Fruit in this section was badly damaged by the late frosts. However, there will be plenty for home use, and in some cases a surplus.

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STATE AUDITORS CONVENE

**Session Is Devoted to Discussion of
New Duties of Officers.**

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 22.—(Special.)—Auditors representing all the counties of Washington except Wahkiakum, Garfield, Jefferson, Kittitas, Lewis and Snohomish, met here this afternoon and will be in session several days.

Today's meeting was devoted to discussing new laws with relation to the duties of county auditors. It was the sense of the body to ask the Legislature to amend the new school code so that all school warrants be issued from the Auditor's office instead of by the respective district clerks.

Unsuccessful efforts were made to adopt a resolution asking repeal of the new law which has taken from the Auditor the extending of tax rolls, given the work to the Assessors. Tomorrow the Auditors will hold a joint session with the new State Board of Accountancy to arrange a plan of work.

ACCREDITED LIST LARGER

**State Board, However, Refuses to
Accept 21 Eastern Colleges.**

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 22.—(Special.)—The State Board of Education, in its session today, rejected applications of 21 Eastern colleges and placed the following on the accredited list, which means that graduates of these institutions will be entitled to receive state teachers' certificates or life diplomas in this state on complying with the requirements in regard to experience without having to pass the regular examination: Baker University, Baldwin, Kan.; Kalamazoo College, Kalamazoo, Mich.; Lake Forest College, Lake Forest, Ill.; Maryville College, Maryville, Tenn.; State Normal School, Kearney, Neb.; University of West Virginia, Morgantown, W. Va.

TWO INSTRUCTORS ARE ADDED
Board of Regents of University Holds Annual Meeting in Eugene.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, June 22.—(Special.)—In the annual commencement meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Oregon, held here this morning, two additions were made to the teaching force. Dr. Bertha Stuart, now assistant director at the Barber gymnasium of the University of Michigan, was chosen as physical director of the women of the university, and Gustave Buchen, of the University of Wisconsin, was chosen as debate coach and as an assistant in the department of public speaking, to fill the vacancy left by Samuel Elliot, who has asked for a year's leave of absence to study at Harvard.

Dr. Stuart holds B. A. and M. D. degrees from Michigan. The old university gymnasium will be remodeled and equipped for use by the girls. Gustave Buchen was a leader in debate in the Wisconsin institution, and has coached several teams.

The recommendations of the faculty, granting Professor Luella Clay Carson and Dr. Frank Strong, chancellor of the University of Nebraska, LL. D. degrees, were ratified by the Board of Regents. Much business, however, was deferred until the meeting early in the summer.

SCHOOL ELECTIONS ARE HELD
Clackamas County Voters Decide on Union High School Near Canby.

OREGON CITY, Or., June 22.—(Special.)—School elections were held in every district of the county yesterday. In Oregon City, O. D. 220 was re-elected director and Williamette R. W. Baker succeeded E. P. Berdine by a vote of 37 to 27. George DeBok was elected clerk at Willamette, succeeding Ernest Mass.

The taxpayers of the Canby and River-side districts voted to establish a union high school, which is the first in Clackamas County.

DINNER SERVED ON CAMPUS

**Large Number of Graduates Attend
Exercises—Commencement Pro-
gramme Ends Today With Ex-
cursion From Portland.**

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Or., June 22.—(Special.)—This was alumni day and hundreds of the "grads" were here to participate in the campus exercises of the 33d commencement of the University of Oregon.

A business meeting of the Alumni Association was held in the forenoon, luncheon was served under the Condon oaks, and a tug-of-war contest with the seniors closed the exercises in the afternoon. In the alumni business meeting officers were elected as follows: Allen Eaton, of Eugene, president; Edward C. Jakway, of Portland, vice-president; Miss Ella Dooby, of Portland, secretary; Marion McClain, treasurer, and Carl McCline, of Eugene, and Judge Harris, all of Eugene, alumni members of the athletic council.

Resolutions were passed by the Alumni wishing Dr. Carson enjoyment in her new position as president of Mills Seminary, and in congratulating Judge Bean on his appointment to the Federal bench.

For the university annual dinner, the alumni and seniors under the Condon oaks on the campus, an elaborate luncheon was prepared for the 200 guests. L. R. Alderman, head of the department of education, was toastmaster, and toasts were responded to as follows: "For the Board of Regents," J. W. Hamilton; "For the Alumni," Arthur L. Venable; "For the Class of 1909," Jesse H. Bond, president of the class; "For the University," President Campbell; and "For the Alumni," Dr. Luella Clay Carson.

The alumni were victors over the seniors in the tug-of-war contest held on the banks of the mill race. With the rope stretched across 50 feet of deep water, the 18 alumni heavyweights and the lighter college youths struggled against each other for 21 minutes. The seniors gained a few feet at first, but the alumni, wringing wet with perspiration, clung on until finally weight began to tell and the college lads were forced to swim. During the contest A. R. Tiffany, registrar of the university, and Professor P. S. Young, dean of the economics department, coached the alumni, while Dr. H. B. Leonard, of the mathematical department, an old baseball and football star of Chicago University, timed the struggles of the seniors. Professor R. Dearborne, head of the electrical engineering department, was judge of the match.

Many former athletic stars were on the alumni team. They were: Hug, Prescott, Alderman, Joe McCarthy, C. McClaine, M. McClain, Gardner and Wainwright, all of Eugene, and Earl Carruth, Latour, and Jakway, of Portland, and Winslow and Tom Williams, of Salem.

Wednesday, commencement day, is the big day of commencement week. A large excursion is expected from the respective districts.

In the morning the alumni, under Captain Roy Kelly, of Hood River, a former star-catcher on the varsity team, will play the seniors.

Tents have been erected on the campus, under which have been placed long tables, with a seating capacity of several hundred persons, and luncheon will be served to the visitors by the Woman's Auxiliary of the Eugene Commercial Club.

The commencement exercises will begin at 2 o'clock. Judge George Burnett, of Salem, will deliver the address to the graduating class, and President Campbell will present the diplomas. The hours between 5 to 7 in the evening will be taken up with class regalia and supper. At half past 7 the visitors will leave for home, and at 8 o'clock the alumni and seniors' ball will be held in the Armory.

NEW FISH RECORD

**Catch of 120,000 Salmon Is
Made at Hoquiam.**

INDIANS DO GREAT WORK

**Redmen Leave Open Channel in
River for Fish to Reach Spaw-
ning Grounds; Yet Huge Num-
ber Is Taken in Nets.**

HOQUIAM, Wash., June 22.—(Special.)—A catch of 120,000 salmon is reported this season, which nearly doubles the record of 75,000 for last season.

These fish are valued at approximately \$45,000, and of this sum some \$20,000 odd goes to the heads of 30 Quinalt Indian families, thus netting them \$800 each.

A 50-foot channel was kept clear of all nets this season by the Indians, and thousands of salmon passed up this unobstructed runway to their spawning grounds in the Quinalt river.

The Indians took the initiative in establishing this clear way for the fish at a big pow-wow in their village, and have strictly observed the rules there promulgated.

These fish have all been either canned or reshipped by the Hoquiam Packing Company.

ONTARIO BRIDGE IS BEGUN

**Construction Material Arriving for
Big Steel Structure.**

ONTARIO, Or., June 22.—(Special.)—A. C. Thorberg, of the Minneapolis Steel & Machinery Company, has arrived in Ontario to begin the erection of the Idaho-Oregon Interstate bridge across the Snake at this point. Pre-thorber reports that within a week or ten days a full force of men will be at work on the structure.

Mr. Thorberg is occupied in erecting temporary buildings near the river to use for storing the machinery and tools to be used in the construction of the bridge. He is also superintending the erection of a frame for the piler, which will have a hammer weighing 2000 pounds.

This hammer and other bridge machinery is expected to arrive within the week, and also two cars of steel to be used in the structure. A car of cement has also been ordered from Utah, as well as a large amount of heavy timber from Washington. This will be heavy coast fir, and among it will be 125 immense pilings from 30 to 45 feet long. The bridge to be erected will be 900 feet long. Six hundred feet of this will be steel, and the remaining 300 feet will be heavy timbers, 150 feet on each side.

For the erection of this bridge the Legislature of Oregon last winter appropriated \$100,000. The City of Albany has also appropriated \$10,000, and the City of Ontario a like sum. The bridge will span the river at the point where the old emigrant trail across the two states crossed.

WORK BEGINS ON SAWMILL
**Nibley-Minnaugh Company Erect-
ing Factory at Wallowa.**

WALLOWA, Or., June 22.—(Special.)—Work has begun on the big Nibley-Minnaugh Lumber Company's sawmill. Last week the master mechanic, A. H. Kleinick, of Portland, arrived, the plans were secured, a force of men engaged and everything put in readiness for rushing the work to completion. This morning a full force of carpenters is busy framing timbers, the laborers are preparing the ground for the concrete foundations and everyone about the mill site is in a hurry.

The construction work will occupy most of the summer, but the company expects to cut a portion of its timber, which lies close to town, in the fall, and to be ready to begin work on the logging railroad to the heavy timber belt early in the spring.

Sunday School Picnic June 29.
FOREST GROVE, Or., June 22.—(Special.)—Preparations are being made for a district Sunday school picnic to be held in Forest Grove, east of Gaston, Tuesday, June 29. The Sunday schools which will join in the affair are: Dist. Dilley, Forest Dale, Gaston and Hill's Union. Charles Philip, the state field-worker, will be present, and will take part on the programme.

Albany High School Bids In.
ALBANY, Or., June 22.—(Special.)—The bids for Albany's new high school have been received by the City Council. Of the four contractors bidding, the lowest was Snook & Tavern, of Salem, Or., bidding \$44,200, not including the fixtures. The plans call for a stone structure estimated to cost \$50,000. None of the bids have as yet been accepted.

Albany Cannery Starts.
ALBANY, Or., June 22.—(Special.)—The new Albany cannery, under the ownership of Moore & Son, started on its first season's work today with the canning of strawberries. The cannery has a capacity for 100 people, and will be one of Albany's leading industries during the fruit season.

New Cabinet for Hungary.
VIENNA, June 22.—The resignation of Dr. Alexander Wokierle, the Hungarian Premier, and his cabinet presented to the Emperor on April 21, was

accepted today. It is said that Dr. Lukacs, the ex-finance minister, will form a cabinet.

Clatskanie's Main Street Oiled.
CLATSKANIE, Or., June 22.—(Special.)—The main business street of town, which was recently covered the entire width with crushed rock and screening 12 inches deep, was today covered with crude oil by the City Council, and property-owners, making it the most satisfactory piece of street in this part of the state.
