

CZAR GETS HALF OF STOLEN MONEY

End of Long Flight in Canada to Recover \$1,000,000 From Smart Ivan.

THIEF LIVING IN LUXURY

Russian Official Who Robbed Treasury in Caucasus Makes Compromise and Remains Safe in Winnipeg.

WINNIPEG, Man., June 24.—The famous case in which the czar of Russia brought action against Ivan Proskowkoff in the Winnipeg courts for the recovery of a large amount of money was ended today after a year and a half of litigation.

Ivan was a defaulting official in charge of the administration of a province in the trans-Caucasus. He absconded with more than \$1,000,000 years ago, made his way through China and Japan, where he purchased large quantities of Oriental goods, and finally reached America, opening stores in San Francisco, Vancouver and Winnipeg.

Anna Seaman, a talented and handsome Russian woman, alleged to be a nihilist, joined him here as his wife, and they kept house in luxurious fashion in a fashionable suburb.

The Winnipeg police eventually traced him to Winnipeg, but when the time came to make his arrest he was missing. His property was attached, and after a long fight a compromise finally has been reached, under which the property and merchandise is to be sold and the proceeds divided between the czar and representatives of the Proskowkoffs.

NEPHEW OF GRANT KILLED

Evans Dent Shot Down in Brawl Over San Jose Woman.

SAN JOSE, Cal., June 24.—Evans Dent, a nephew by marriage of the late General U. S. Grant and a local saloonman, was killed and Mrs. Schley, divorced wife of a beauty doctor, was shot but not fatally wounded by a Cleve Urline, a newspaper solicitor, who afterwards shot and killed himself shortly after 3 o'clock this morning at the room of the woman at Second and San Antonio streets. Urline is from Missouri, where he is well connected.

Mrs. Schley is the woman who was with Mrs. Armour when the latter was shot in the House last winter by Fred Smith, who subsequently hanged himself in the city prison.

A double inquest was held tonight over the remains of Dent and Urline. The jury found that Dent came to his death from a gunshot wound inflicted by Urline, and that the latter came to death from a gunshot wound self-inflicted with suicidal intent.

It developed today that Dent was a nephew by marriage of General U. S. Grant, his aunt, Julia Dent, having married the warrior President.

Urin Son of Pioneer.

MISSOULA, Mont., June 24.—Cleveland Urline was the son of one of the first settlers of Missoula, A. J. Urline. The elder Urline died several years ago. "Cleve" worked in Missoula for several years in newspaper offices. He was highly regarded and his habits were good.

NAVAJOS TO BE RELEASED

War Department Said to Exceed Its Authority in Holding Prisoners.

PHOENIX, Ariz., June 24.—A number of Navajo Indians, who have been held at Fort Huachuca at hard labor for two years, will be liberated, following an order of the Supreme Court of the territory today, permitting the withdrawal of the request from the Government decision of the District Court.

The Indians were arrested after some turbulent scenes on the reservation, and two of their number were killed by soldiers while making the arrests. The others were sent to the fort by order of the War Department. The action today is understood to have been taken at the instance of the Indian Rights Association.

In its decision, the District Court held as no state of war existed the War Department could not keep the men prisoners. Interest in the case lies in its effect in establishing a precedent limiting the Department's authority.

SALEM, Or., June 24.—(Special.)—Kathryn Gilbert Huggins, who secured a divorce from her husband, Henry E. Huggins, in Los Angeles, is well-known in Salem, where she lived prior to her marriage. SUTRO HEIRS GET MONEY

WILL GIVING VAST ESTATE TO CHARITY ANNULED.

Supreme Court Orders Distribution Among Heirs With No Trusteeship.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 24.—The Supreme Court invalidated today the will of the late Adolph Sutro and ordered that the large estate, valued at millions and consisting of the Cliff House ranch in this city and the San Miguel rancho, be distributed among the heirs. The former property is situated along the beach and includes the famous Sutro heights and rocks.

Under the terms of the will the estate was to be held in trust until the last surviving child should die, after which the lands were to be sold and the proceeds given to charitable and educational institutions in this city. The court held that the failure to provide specifically for the distribution of the proceeds of the sale rendered that bequest invalid.

PRICE OF IRON ADVANCED

Pittsburg Concern Gives Notice of Increase of 15 to 25 Cents Ton.

PITTSBURG, June 24.—A Pittsburg concern today announced that a deal has been completed for the sale of 600 tons of basic iron for immediate delivery at an advance over the prices of 20 days ago. A general advance of from 15 to 25 cents a ton in the price of basic and Bessemer pig iron has already been made.

STEWARDESS IS SUICIDE

Woman Believed to Have Leaped Overboard From Pacific Liner.

HONOLULU, June 24.—Miss Margaret Stephenson, of San Francisco, stewardess of the Pacific Mail Steamship Company's liner China, which arrived today, committed suicide early Sunday morning. Miss Stephenson was last seen on deck at 5 A. M., and it is believed that she leaped overboard.

Brother Claims Suicide's Body.

The body of C. F. Hawley, who committed suicide by shooting himself through the head with a 22-caliber revolver near the entrance to the City Park Wednesday morning, was claimed by his brother, Benjamin M. Hawley, of Home Valley, Wash., yesterday. The suicide's remains were shipped to the family home at Cottage Grove, Or., for interment last night.

Brandenburg described the presentation of the Cleveland article, the sale of which to the New York Times led to his trial for grand larceny, and reiterated his assertion that he saw Groves Cleveland sign his name to the article that he sold the Times. But he insisted that the article offered in evidence by the state and the signature purporting to have been clipped therefrom were not the originals.

Hastings Gave Approval.

The approval of S. F. Hastings, executor of the Cleveland estate, to the sale of the article was obtained, Brandenburg said, in August, 1908.

After it was published Brandenburg offered \$500 to Mr. Hastings, but the latter declined to accept it, saying that he "might be in a position to take it later."

Offered Cleveland \$2000.

Brandenburg said he had suggested to the ex-President that he prepare a series of three political articles and allow Brandenburg to sell them. The witness said he offered Mr. Cleveland \$2000 for the series. On March 5 Brandenburg called at Mr. Cleveland's office and received from him 15 or 18 groups of papers. The contents were made into the article signed "Groves Cleveland." Brandenburg said he transcribed the matter himself and later took the typewritten sheets to Mr. Cleveland, who made corrections in them. The sheets were then transcribed.

His next interview with Mr. Cleveland was between March 2 and 16, he said, on which occasion Mr. Cleveland signed the last page of the carbon copy and did not blot the signature.

Brandenburg was shown the alleged Cleveland signature in evidence and declared it was not the signature Mr. Cleveland affixed to the article. Handing the Cleveland article in evidence, the one alleged to have been sold to the Times, Brandenburg said he could say positively that it was not the original.

S. P. LINE INVADES MEXICO

Southern Pacific of Mexico Incorporated; Capital \$75,000,000.

TRENTON, New Mexico, June 24.—The Southern Pacific Railway of Mexico was incorporated here today with an authorized capital of \$75,000,000, divided into 750,000 shares at \$100 each.

The object of the company is to build a railroad in Mexico under concessions granted by the Republic of Mexico to J. A. Jaugle, representing the Southern Pacific Railroad Company.

WILL RUN DOWN WEST COAST

Harriman Extension in Mexico to Comprise About 1600 Miles.

NEW YORK, June 24.—The Southern Pacific Railroad Company of Mexico was organized for the purpose of acquiring the lines now being built by the Southern Pacific Company on the west coast of Mexico, which, when completed, will extend from Nogales, Ariz., through Guaymas to Guadalajara, Mexico. The new company also will take over the property of the Cananea, Yaqui River & Pacific Railroad. Together these lines comprise 1600 miles.

RACER FILES PROTEST

FORD CAR NO. 2 BROKE RULES, SAYS SHAWMUT DRIVER.

Got Special Permit to Cross Railroad Bridge and Replaced Worn-out Axle.

SEATTLE, June 24.—Declaring that Ford car No. 2, which arrived in Seattle first in the ocean-to-ocean automobile race, is not entitled to the M. Robert Guggenheim trophy cup nor the \$2000, first prize money, formal protest was made today against the award of the cup to the Ford.

The principal charges against the Ford are: First—That at Fort Steele, Wyo., where the wagon bridge was washed out, the two Ford cars were allowed to cross on the railroad bridge by virtue of special permits, while the Shawmut was delayed access to the bridge, being delayed 18 hours.

Second—That the Ford No. 2 broke the rules regarding the actual driver. In the Snoqualmie Pass, it is alleged, an employe of the Ford branch in Seattle met the racer and proceeded to get into the driver's seat and operated the car. Later, the regular driver, who had sent the car across the continent went back at the wheel.

Third—That Ford No. 2 arrived in Seattle with a new axle, one that had not been stamped in New York City, thus breaking the rule against putting in new axles if the old ones wore out.

The attorney who filed the protest and the drivers of the Shawmut car decline to discuss their complaint, and the de-

tails will not be known until the protest committee hears the evidence.

Badly Hurt in Runaway.

ROSEBURG, Or., June 24.—(Special.)—A team driven by O. P. Henderson, an old and respected citizen of this city, ran away late this afternoon, throwing its driver to the ground with serious results. When picked up, Henderson was

unconscious and was bleeding freely, several deep gashes being about the face and head. He was taken to Mercy Hospital, where an examination of the injuries revealed the fact that his arm and wrist were broken, while two of his fingers were fractured.
