19 MARKSMEN QUALIFY

GUARDSMEN SPEND BUSY DAY AT CLACKAMAS RANGE.

Fifty Men Take Up Target Course and Many Good Scores.

Nineteen National Guardsmen qualified as marksmen out of 50 firing at the Clackamas rifle range yesterday. This is regarded as an exceptional record in view of the fact that practically all the marksmen had never before qualified on any range.

Three companies of the Third Oregon Infantry were represented on the range and the total number on the firing line was close to 100, the number taking up the marksmen's course being 50. Company B, in command of Captain W. W. Wilson, of 50 men present; Company F, in command of Captain L. E. Crouch, had 26 men on hand, while Company G, from Oregon City, had a detail of 15 men in command of Captain Loomis. About a dozen team men were on hand from the various organizations of the Third Infantry.

The firing was confined mainly to the ranges at 200, 300 and 500 yards. The short ranges were completed by noon and the afternoon was devoted to the mid-range. Plans for a skirmish run and firing at 600 yards were spoiled by a break shower which set in late in the afternoon.

Keen interest continues to be shown in the range practice, and there is no doubt but that the largest number of marksmen, recorded in a single target year will be developed during the present season. The new modern range at Clackamas Station has given a lasting impetus to the work, and the attendance each week is increasing rather than diminishing.
