

PERSONS UNKNOWN ACCUSED BY JURY

Coroner's Inquest Fails to Clear Mystery of Hood River Murder.

ROBBINS STOLIDLY SILENT

Accused Man Refuses to Talk and
When Taken Before Dead Body of
Mrs. Casto Exhibits No Emo-
tion or Indication of Guilt.

HOOD RIVER, Or., June 28.—(Special.)—After a search of the Robbins house and investigation of the surrounding country that lasted until late this evening, the county officers believe they have a chain of strong circumstantial evidence against George Robbins, accused of the murder of Mrs. Emeline Casto.

Developments today show that Robbins was seen by a number of people in the vicinity of the murder Saturday, and the time he spent between the hours of leaving town and when the murder is supposed to have taken place is gradually being accounted for.

A point that is said to look bad for young Robbins was his denial today of having been at the Rockford store on Saturday afternoon, although both Mr. and Mrs. Brayford state positively that he was there and used the telephone. It is the supposition that Robbins himself sent the message to his father to meet his daughter at the depot here. During the absence from home of young Robbins, father the murder occurred.

A rumor which gained ground tonight to the effect that Robbins had been with whom he is not living, had threatened to kill Mrs. Casto the day before the murder took place, on being investigated, was found to be groundless.

Inquest Reveals Little.

The coroner's jury this afternoon brought in a verdict to the effect that the woman was killed by strangulation by some unknown person or persons.

The witnesses examined were Dr. H. L. Dumble, who conducted the post-mortem examination; W. G. Somerville, Bert Adamson and William Robbins, for whom Mrs. Casto worked, and Deputy Sheriff G. P. Christie. PIONEER OF '52 PASSES

Edward F. Tempes Dies at Vancouver, Aged 79.

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 28.—(Special.)—Edward F. Tempes died Sunday of the weakness incident to old age. Mr. Tempes was born in New Orleans, October 19, 1839. While a young man he followed steamboating on the Mississippi River. In 1862 he went to New Mexico in the Government service. In 1882 he came to Oregon. Three years later he went to California, returning to Oregon in 1888.

He was married in 1890 to Mary Redding and they went to Idaho two years later, remaining there three years. He returned to Clark County in 1895. Besides his widow, one son, F. W. Tempes, of this city, survives him.

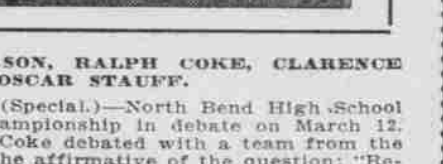

They call it Gretna Green. Not that elopers are the chief contributors to marriage license revenue, or do most to keep the clergy from those saturnal employment devised for idle hands to do. It has been the pride of Canadians that marriage chains forged on this side of the line are more dependable and lasting; on the other hand it is claimed by Americans that Canada encourages weddings and discourages divorce, making the former much easier and the latter much more difficult than under the Stars and Stripes.

Especially do prospective bridal couples resent the new law, now strictly enforced in the near cities of Seattle, Bellingham and Tacoma, requiring medical examination and certificates of physical fitness from applicants for marriage licenses.
