

SIMON OUTLINES POLICY AS MAYOR

Laws to Be Enforced and Lid
on Gambling and Sunday
Saloons Continued.

NO SHAKE-UP ANYWHERE

Old Detectives Must Go to Work or
Resign—Attitude of Administration
Toward Regulating Social
Evil Not Yet Defined.

MAYOR SIMON'S POLICY.
The laws—will be enforced fairly and impartially.
Moral Appearances. The city will be kept free of gambling, Sunday closing will be enforced rigidly and good order preserved.
Social Evil—This is a grave problem, requiring deep thought, and will be solved in the best possible manner, but no district will be set aside whereby any financial profit will accrue to any person or set of persons.
Municipal Departments. No "shake-up" are contemplated and no disbursements planned; as long as employees are faithful and competent they need have no fear.
Old Detectives—Must go to work for the city or quit for all time; no further gifts from public treasury will be tolerated.
Appointments—The most insistent part of the administration.

No pyrotechnics—Just a sane, business administration, is the gist of Mayor Simon's policy, which will be enforced throughout his term of office, which begins this morning. The new executive will go to the City Hall about 9 o'clock to take up his official duties, and at 2:30 he will preside at his first meeting, it being the regular monthly session of the Board of Health. At 4 P. M. he will meet with his Executive Board, where the new administration will, in reality, take up the routine of business.

Mayor Simon outlined his policy in an interview yesterday afternoon, clearly showing that it is his purpose to give Portland a first-class business administration while he is in office. There will be no sensational "shake-ups" in departments, and no one will lose position as long as the employee is competent and faithful, giving the city full return for the salary paid.
Those who thought that the city would be thrown "wide open" by the new Mayor will be greatly disappointed. For Mayor Simon declares that he will tolerate no gambling, no opening of saloons on Sunday and no open and flagrant red-light district, and that he will preserve good order and keep the morals of the municipality in good condition. All laws will be fairly and impartially enforced.

Two Officials to Be Named.

Mayor Simon has yet to announce the appointment of a City Engineer and Chief of Police, but he will name these later. Chief Gritzmacher, while wishing to be released from service as early as convenient, will remain in his position at his desk until a new head for the department is named and assumes command. Chief Gritzmacher has expressed to the Mayor his desire to leave the city, which he has no longer had. City Engineer Taylor has asked for and has been granted two weeks' time in which to finish up work that has accumulated in his office, and his successor will then take charge.

One of the gravest problems confronting the new administration is the social evil, which is now in the city. It is considered quite generally a very bad condition. All houses of ill fame, located in the old North End district, were closed about one year ago by Mayor Lane, and since that time, it is declared by the Mayor, no more have been opened. He has directed to all parts of the city, creating a positive nuisance and annoyance everywhere. That this state of affairs must be remedied in a proper manner, is recognized by Mayor Simon, who declares that it is a subject requiring deep thought. A solution of this problem will be reached, and one thing is certain—no district will be set aside for this purpose that will afford any person or set of persons to reap a financial harvest.

No "Shake-up" Anywhere.

It is not Mr. Simon's intention at all to reorganize any branch of the city government for the mere purpose of placing favorites in certain places. Good of the service alone, will be the reason if any changes are made, according to Mayor Simon's statement. He does not contemplate sensational shifting of employees in the police or any other department, and one thing is certain—every one will have to work hard and give the city full value for the salaries paid, or otherwise, there is every reason to believe that something will happen.

As to the "old detectives," Joe Day, Frank J. Snow, and Carpenter and J. F. Resing, they will either have to return to police headquarters and go to work for the city or else resign. Mayor Simon will not tolerate any further distribution of municipal funds to them while they are not doing a tap for the city, as has been the case for three years. It is probable that Day and Snow will return to work, but it is doubtful whether Carpenter and Resing will, as they have excellent positions, and may not care to leave them for police duty.

Mayor Simon declares that the most important part of his work will be his appointments, as compared with the great responsibilities and duties that lie ahead. While the naming of department heads, and various other appointments are important matters, the new Mayor already realizes that there are vast piles of hard work ahead, which will require constant labor throughout his term of office.

Day to Go to Work Monday.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 30.—(Special.)—Detective Joe Day, of Portland, told friends tonight that he had been promised his old place on the force by Mayor Simon. Day says he will return to work next Monday.

Notes of the Courts.

L. L. Goodpasture, formerly a conductor for the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company, accused of forgery for having passed worthless transfers, pleaded guilty before Presiding Circuit Judge Bronaugh yesterday morning, and was sentenced to 60 days in the County Jail. The judge then placed him on parole, this action being taken

upon the recommendation of the District Attorney and a representative of the company.

The suit of J. H. Olston, administrator of William H. Olston's estate, against the O. W. P. & Ry. Company was decided in favor of the defendant yesterday. It was tried by Judge J. H. Olston in the department of the Circuit Court. Olston demanded \$5000 damages because a fuse blew out on a railroad car, and Olston was trampled to death in the effort of the passengers to alight. He had previously accepted \$500 from the company, and the jury refused to allow additional damages.

The firm of H. C. Browne & Co. is suing the John P. Sharkey Co. before Circuit Judge Cleland, for \$1000 damages. It is alleged that the Browne company furnished the real estate corporation with a large number of booklets describing Council Crest, and that the Sharkey company has failed to make payment. In reply the real estate company alleges that the booklets were not ordered.

The estate of Chauncey Rose Winslow has been appraised at \$65,753. The report was filed in the County Court yesterday by C. F. Adams, J. D. Wilcox and J. H. Vogt. The most of the property consists of stock in various concerns, 285 shares in the firm of C. R. Winslow & Co. being valued at \$31,350.

The estate of Rufus I. Eckerson, valued at \$28,000, was admitted to probate in the County Court yesterday morning. Inez McKnight Eckerson being appointed executrix. The property in toto is bequeathed to the executrix, who is the widow of the deceased.

CHIEF IS BID GOOD-BY

GRITZMACHER GIVEN WATCH
BY POLICE FORCE.

Ceremony Is Occasion for Show of
Much Feeling—Chief Will
Not Step Down Yet.

After 28 consecutive years of service in the Portland police department, Charles Gritzmacher, Chief of Police, severed his official connection with the department last night at 12 o'clock.

He will, however, continue to act as Chief until his successor is appointed and qualified. Chief Gritzmacher entered the department as patrolman, and has held every position from bottom to top.

As an evidence of the esteem in which he is held by the personnel of the department, numbering 150 men, a beautiful hand-engraved, hunting-case gold watch was presented Chief Gritzmacher yesterday afternoon at 3:45 o'clock in the Municipal Courtroom. All the members of the department were present in uniform. The ceremonies caused a show of feeling on the part of all concerned.

Chief Gritzmacher, in his parting address, thanked the members of the department and alluded feelingly to the long and happy association with them. It was some time before Chief Gritzmacher could reply to the remarks, which were slightly choked then and his remarks were brief.

At 5 o'clock last evening a bulletin was posted at police headquarters in the direction of Chief Gritzmacher, to the Captains of the three reliefs, in which he expressed his thanks at the commendation of his long and happy association with the department, and his great regret at leaving.

TIMBERMAN KILLED BY LOG

Hit on Head by Timber That Comes
Down Chute.

COTTAGE GROVE, Or., June 30.—(Special.)—Norman Hickey, a timberman, was instantly killed at 5 o'clock today. He was working on the log chute for Harlow, Stocks & Hankins sawmill at Cottage Grove, 12 miles east of here. A log came down the chute and hit a shear log with force enough to drive it against Hickey's head. His body was brought in on a handcar this evening.

He leaves a wife and a boy and girl 5 and 9 years old. He was 35 years old and was a member of the Oddfellows.

HENEY GETS COAT OF TAN

Logger Loses Life.

CENTRALIA, Wash., June 30.—(Special.)—J. E. Connor, a logger employed by the Eastern Railway & Lumber Company at its camp near Knapall, is dead from injuries received last Saturday. He was helping to adjust the rigging of a donkey engine to a log that was out of sight of the engine, over a small hill. He signaled the engineer to go ahead, but when the log came in sight, Connor was found entangled in the rigging. He was taken to camp, where he lived until Sunday night. He leaves a wife and five small children. He was a member of the Oddfellows and of the Modern Woodmen. The body will be taken to California for interment.

LANE GIVES TO MAYOR SIMON

Old Administration Closes in
Exchange of Well Wishes
and Official Farewells.

FINAL LETTER TO PUBLIC

Retiring Executive Declares He Has
Endeavored at All Times to
Serve Only Interests of
People of Portland.

Dr. Harry Lane ceased to be Mayor of Portland at midnight, but he did not go out of office "in a blaze of glory," as he would have wished. He presided for the last time in his official capacity at a meeting of the Executive Board at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, but there were no sensational features connected with the session.

While it had been intimated by some that Fire Chief Campbell would be discharged, he was not, and the department was not so much as mentioned in the proceedings, except that the monthly payroll was passed upon in the regular routine manner. A note of thanks to the heads of departments of the municipal government, to Deputy Auditors Grutze and Wiegand in particular, and to the newspapers for "courtesy and kindness," was given, and every one connected with the official family left the City Hall in good humor.

Dr. Lane thanked the members of the board at the close of the meeting for their labors on behalf of the city, and wished them all health, happiness "and every good thing." There were handshakes, hasty "good-byes" and well wishes all around, as the officials left the Hall. Dr. Lane remained at his desk quite a while after the 5 o'clock closing hour, the time when all employees leave, finishing up official business.

Give Purse to Miss McDonald.

Miss Louise McDonald, who served as private secretary to Mayor Lane, was surprised by a bevy of young women clerks and stenographers during the morning, who presented her with a beautiful silver purse, and bade her good-bye. She and Dr. Lane were busily engaged during the day, arranging for the future of the city, and the subject will be in order when Mayor Simon and his secretary-stenographer, Miss Agnes Parsons, reach the City Hall this morning.

Dr. Lane issued a letter to the public, which he gave out yesterday, expressing his gratitude for the honor conferred upon him, and assuring the people that it had been his constant aim to serve only their interests. He said that he had tried to apply the same rule to every case, and that he would result, in every case, to the conclusion that no one man could completely remedy certain things that he regarded as nuisances to the government, but that it will require the election of such men to official positions as will be able to pass under the law to the persistent efforts of every man and private interests. He thanked all of the board and members of the administration for all they had done for the city. At the session of the Executive Board the bridge committee introduced a resolution, which passed, authorizing the Mayor to sign for the city a contract between it and H. W. Scott, H. L. Pittcock, F. W. Leadbetter and the estate of G. T. Myers, permitting the raising of the grade of Madison street between west end of the bridge and Front street.

Will Raise Bridge 15 Feet.

It is intended to do this so that it will make possible the construction of the bridge 15 feet higher than it was originally designed. This will enable small craft to pass under the opening of the draw. All of those mentioned above have signed the contract, giving the city permission to change the grade.

The contract for building the East Side Police Station at Union avenue and Hancock street was awarded to W. B. Steele for \$23,300.

A request to the Civil Service Commission for a new eligible list for master signers in the first department was made, the fire committee reporting that there was not enough evidence of the ability of those on the present list to warrant an appointment.

A communication from the Mayor, stating that the Buffalo-Pitts Company had been awarded the contract for the construction of the new fire station at the corner of Third and Union streets, was received by the Mayor yesterday.

HOME WILL BE BUILT

METHODISTS TO ERECT RESI-
DENCE FOR AGED.

Women's Missionary Society Ad-
Journs After Hearing Reports
and Electing Officers.

Resolution to establish an old folks' home at Salem was the most important action taken yesterday forenoon by the Women's Home Missionary Society of the Oregon Methodist Conference, in session at Centenary Church, East Ninth and building by the Salem First Methodist Church makes this possible. Plans for the organization and establishment of the home are yet to be made. It will probably be in charge of a deaconess.

The statistical report of Mrs. Fannie M. Patti, corresponding secretary, showed a great gain in membership. The figures are: Old auxiliaries, 8; new auxiliaries, 12; total, 20. Officers: President, Mrs. J. E. Jones; Vice-President, Mrs. J. E. Jones; Secretary, Mrs. J. E. Jones; Treasurer, Mrs. J. E. Jones; Stewardess, Mrs. J. E. Jones; and Deaconess, Mrs. J. E. Jones.

Mrs. C. L. Weaver, state organizer, read her report, setting forth the details of the establishment of the Portland Swedish Mission, in charge of Miss Olivia Rosendahl, who was brought from Brooklyn, N. Y., to undertake the work here. She had been engaged in such work for eight years. The sum of \$167 was collected the past six months and \$156 expended. Mrs. Weaver traveled over 3000 miles in the state.

Miss Bostrom, deaconess in charge, addressed the convention at length, showing what is being done in Portland. Mrs. J. E. Jones, president of the convention, presided.

D. Lee, supply secretary, reported for her department, having been in charge of that work for 10 years. It was reported that Miss Reese, of Hubbard, Or., who is now in the training school at San Francisco, is making good progress. For her support it was announced that the Home Missionary Society of Oregon contributes \$100 annually.

After a solo by Mrs. J. S. Hamilton the committee on resolutions submitted their report, when the convention adjourned. Mrs. Helen M. Southwick presided.

EXHIBIT ON RG SCALE

TUBERCULAR DISPLAY WILL BE
ELABORATE.

Steps Will Be Taken to Provide
Funds for Education Against
Great "White Plague."

Not only will there be an adequate exhibit of an educational nature on tuberculosis to be sent to every part of the state, but it will be designed and carried out on an elaborate scale. This assurance is given in view of the interest that the subject is awakening. The plans of the State Board of Health to secure the necessary financial aid can follow several channels so that failure to get the money will be impossible. The subject will serve the purpose of a dire warning against the encroachments of the "great white plague."

The subject is to be further taken up today at Salem by the State Sanatorium Board, which meets with Governor Benning at 11 A. M. for the purpose of planning the expenditure of \$20,000 to be appropriated by the last Legislature for the establishment of a state sanatorium for the tubercular poor at the Oregon State School for the Deaf.

On this board are Dr. E. A. Pierce, Dr. R. C. Yenney and A. L. Mills, of Portland; Leslie Butler, of Hood River; Dr. E. W. Harlow, of Eugene; Dr. J. B. Wiseman, of Portland; Dr. C. J. Smith, of Pendleton; Dr. A. H. Kinyon, of Astoria; Dr. E. B. Pickle, of Medford; and Dr. W. B. Morse, of Salem.

A model of the Portland Open-Air Sanatorium is to be sent at once to the A-Y-P Exposition at Seattle for the purpose of letting visitors see the facilities for taking street between west end of the bridge and Front street. The exhibit consists of a replica in miniature of the grounds with 35 miniature cottages fitted up with miniature furniture for the care of tubercular patients.

Within a comparatively short time it is hoped to complete the plans of the state exhibit and determine precisely its scope.
