

NEED INCOME TAX PAY EXPENSES

Cummins Contends New Im-post Both Just and Necessary.

PREDICTS BIG DEFICIT

Iowa Senator Says Without Tax on Incomes, \$175,000,000 Will Be Amount in 1911—Borah Joins Attack on Aldrich.

WASHINGTON, June 30.—The income tax was predicted by the only subject, and Cummins of Iowa and Borah of Idaho the only speakers before the Senate today.

Need Income Tax for Revenue. Cummins took the floor as soon as a quorum could be obtained and held it until 4:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

Estimating the total revenues under the Aldrich-Payne bill at \$669,000,000 and those to be derived from the internal revenue at \$280,000,000, he predicted that at the end of the fiscal year 1911 there would be a deficit of not less than \$175,000,000.

Expects Defeat of Amendment.

Cummins said if the finance committee's resolution providing for the submission to the states of a constitutional amendment for an income tax should be presented to the Senate, he would vote for it, but not with any hope of its success.

Borah spoke in support of a straight income tax amendment to the tariff bill. He declared his opposition to the corporation tax which regards as another means for taxing the consumers of the country.

The proceedings were begun with the presentation by Cummins of an emphatic protest from the Building & Loan Association League of New Jersey, against the inclusion of building and loan associations in the corporation tax.

Irony Aimed at Aldrich.

Before proceeding with his speech, Cummins remarked upon the absence of Aldrich, saying he had seen in the morning papers the announcement that the chairman of the finance committee was going on a sea voyage.

"After the acknowledgment that he made to the Senate yesterday with respect to his vote in the case of the amendment that we are now considering," explained Cummins, "he needed the restoration and preparation of salt air."

"I notice by the newspapers that the large corporations are not uncomfortable. They are reported as being well satisfied with this provision."

Cummins replied there was nothing in the corporation tax amendment to make a corporation uncomfortable.

Declaring that \$479,000,000 might be raised from customs duties and an inheritance, corporation or income tax, to meet Government expenses and to keep up the sinking fund, Cummins charged that secretaries of the Treasury had failed to place aside a sinking fund for the amounts contemplated by law.

Wants Many Tariff Bills.

Core made the novel suggestion that the finance committee should report each schedule of the tariff bill as a separate bill, so that Senators and Representatives might vote against the portions of it they might not approve.

AMERICAN HELICOPTRE FLIES

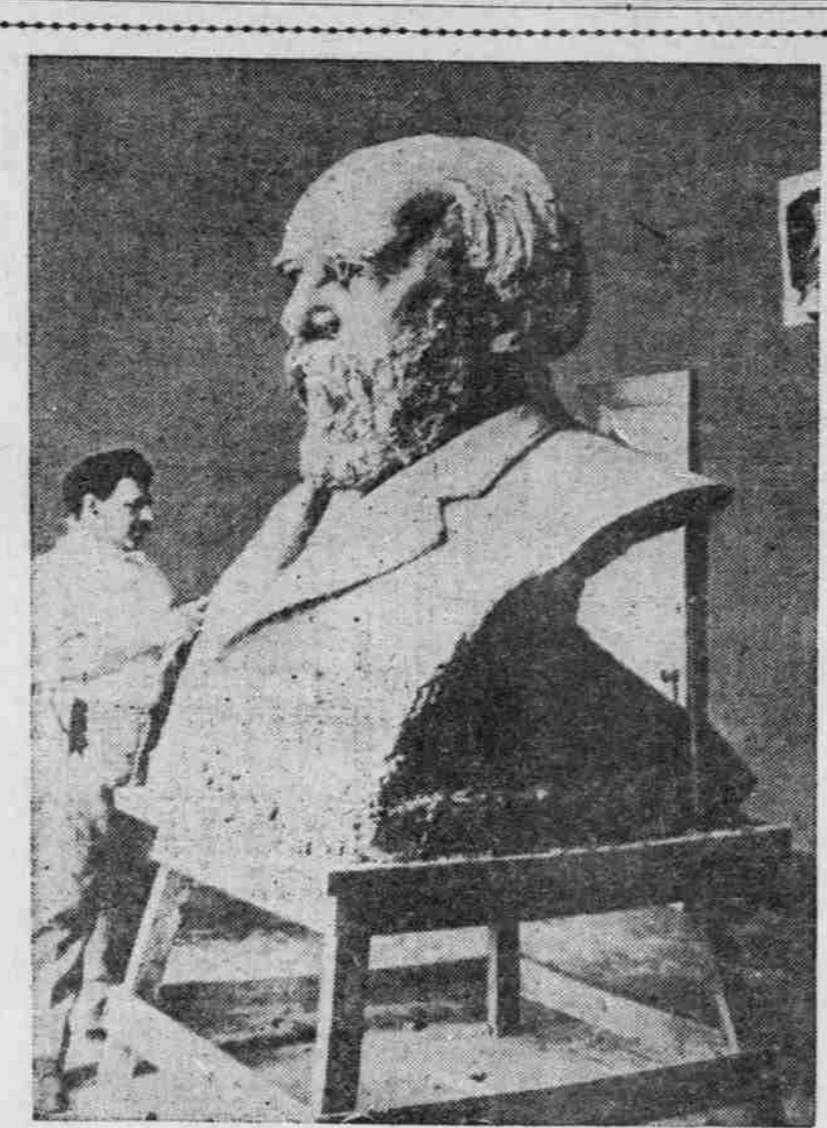

PRAYERS AND JOY AS STATE IS DRY

Tennessee Law Goes Into Effect as Some Men Drink and Some Pray.

LONG LEGAL FIGHT AHEAD

"Four-Mile Law" to Be Contested on Every Hand, Distillers of Liquor Taking Lead of Battle in the Courts.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., June 30.—The Holiday state-wide prohibition bill went into effect at midnight tonight. The bill makes it illegal to sell whisky or other alcoholic beverages within four miles of any schoolhouse in the state.

In striking contrast with the scenes of revelry the state-wide prohibitionists held private meetings of rejoicing. There were prayer services in the homes of leading members of local prohibition forces.

General Jefferson, McCann, Attorney-General Davidson County, takes the position that liquors cannot be sold in Tennessee after midnight tonight, either at wholesale or retail, and says he will prosecute all violators.
