REMARKABLE PLAY DEALS WITH LIFE'S SHADY SIDE ONLY TO TEACH LESSON
"Salvation Nell" Tells Story of Slums, but Is Argument for Survival of Good and Beautiful.

AFTER seeing for a second time that wonderful performance, "Salvation Nell," into which Mrs. Fiske has put the very best of her marvelous acting capacity, one is inclined to the theory that the croaking prophets are all wrong about present day tendencies of the stage. The play is a big, virile discussion of conditions as they actually exist in our large cities. Even here in Portland we have instances which correspond almost to the dot to those concerning the depraved scrubwoman who rises nobly from the depths to be a positive force for good, a conscientious, self-sacrificing woman doing God's work in this world through the bolsterous Salvation Army.

Those who know the under side of things are charitable. They know the struggles, the trials and the temptations to which poor Nell, of Cherry street, was exposed. It is the clustered few who are stiff-necked and over-exacting. There are a dozen or more wonderfully realistic types presented, the men and women we meet every day in the street, good, bad and indifferent. The play is a remarkable ultimate survival of the fittest, the ultimate and the beautiful. I cannot conceive of any healthy-minded man or woman going to see this soul-stirring play without being helped.

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MRS. MINNIE MADDERN FISKE AS SALVATION NELL.

Completed bit of stage literature and, as such, deserves to live.
Mrs. Fiske has three or four new plays under consideration for next season, none of which have been definitely decided upon, but she will open her New York season in "Salvation Nell" next September and continue in it until the first of the new year.

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
