COLFAX, July 5.-(Special.)-The large fruit crop along the Snake River from Al-mota to Lewiston, in Southern Whitman Country, is beginning to move at a rapid rate. One of the largest orchards in this district belongs to White Bros, who a few years ago owned a small commission house in Lawiston. Besides other valuable lands their orchards cover 250 acres. Along the river the total orchard acreage is 840 acres. valued at from \$200 to \$600 an acre. Notwithstanding the source Whiter, when the temperature reached a below zero, 125,-000 house of peaches are expected from the poar's orop of the total acreage; also 15,000 boxes of peaches and 7000 houses of pears. The peach crop at Waxwaw is a full one, the trees having been thinned fully one-half. A great number of the orchards are irri-mited from springs and creeks, giving a sufficiant supply of water. The Waxawi orchards are being supplied with five miles of spin-tare being supplied with the miles of elabet-inch wooden pipe, carrying the water from several creeks and springs.
