ne few small transactions are reported by dealers from the interior, but the local millers are not buying any grain at present A leading miller declared that, roughly speaking, 10 cents was the difence between himself and the growers, and the same situation appears to exist between the growers and exporters.

Some new barley was bought at \$20, or about \$3 under the prices current for the old crop, but there were no signs of any considerable quantity moving. While the reports of bumper crops have tended to weaken newhat the attitude of the grower, the dealer is pulling correspondingly away. That this parloying will not extend beyond the arrival of the new crop appears certain. Many growers, it is said, will require funds threshing, and will be compelled to approach the dealers on contracts.
