

SPAIN WILL SEND TROOPS TO AFRICA

Eight Thousand Men Will Be Used to Strengthen Garrisons in Morocco.

WARFARE IS NOT INTENDED

Present Move Is Outcome of Disagreement Last October. Since Which Time Conditions Have Been Unsatisfactory.

MADRID, July 15.—The Spanish government expects to send a total of 8,000 troops into the Rif region, but it officially declares that the trouble at Melilla is purely local and does not affect its relations with Mulali Han. Spain does not seek war with the Kabyl tribe. Its sole purpose is to put its possessions in Northern Africa in a condition to repel attacks. While the immediate cause of Saturday's fighting was an ambush laid by the tribesmen for the purpose of seizing prisoners for exchange for Moorish captives, the Spanish, the acute situation goes back to last October, when revolting tribes raided Spanish mines near Melilla. The mines were finally reopened July 1 under precarious conditions. Spain alleged that under the treaties of 1860 and 1894 the Sultan is bound to maintain a Governor or Ruler with the troops. Mulali Han, however, refused to recognize the mining concessions or to resume negotiations until the Spaniards had evacuated the two military posts. Spain replied by voting \$500,000 to strengthen the garrisons at Melilla and Ceuta.

ANARCHY RULES IN MOROCCO

Conditions in Country May Make Intervention Necessary.

TANGIER, July 15.—The internal situation in Morocco occasions the deepest apprehension and it is believed here that international intervention cannot be long delayed. The entire country is the prey of complete anarchy.

CALLS HIS WIFE BEAST

Wife Seeks Divorce From Second-Street Saloonkeeper.

That her husband, Charles Jones, who conducts a saloon at Second and Clay streets, whipped her 12-year-old daughter with a buggy whip just to hurt his wife's feelings, that he slapped his wife's face while she was eating breakfast, and made her nose bleed, and that he persistently violated the law by selling liquor without a license, being obliged to serve six months in the Douglas County Jail on that account, are charges made by Mrs. Elizabeth A. Jones in a divorce complaint filed in the Circuit Court. She married Jones in Salt Lake City, September 26, 1905. He is of a jealous disposition, she says, and continually accused her of meeting other men. Mrs. Jones also complains that her liquor-selling husband wanted her to sell beer in a room above his saloon. She says her only means of support is the income from a small rooming house at 232 Second street. She asks \$500 for support, \$100 attorney's fees, and secured an injunction restraining him from molesting her or visiting the rooming-house. John H. Stevenson is her attorney.

NEW DEPOT IS PROMISED

Northern Pacific to Build Soon at Chehalis Is Report.

CHEHALIS, Wash., July 15.—(Special.)—Word reached Chehalis today in a letter from the chairman of the State Railroad Commission, Harry Fairchild, in effect that the Northern Pacific Railway Company expects at some early date to erect a brick depot in Chehalis. The present depot facilities have long since become inadequate to the demands made daily, and for some time the question of better facilities has been a war on here. Some time ago at a joint meeting of citizens, the Railroad Commission and officials of the company the whole subject of facilities was threshed over, and later the company promised to move the old depot to afford more platform room.

BOLIVIA REFUSED APOLOGY

Report That Regret Had Been Expressed to Argentine Denied.

LA PAZ, July 15.—It is not confirmed here that Bolivia expressed official regrets to the Argentine Republic for alleged hostile demonstrations at La Paz. On the contrary, it is asserted that Bolivia informed Argentina that as neither the Argentine Minister nor the Argentine flag had suffered in any way, the claim for satisfaction could not be recognized. President Montes has informed the Peruvian Minister that under no circumstances will Bolivia accept the arbitral award.

lodge them, was exceedingly fierce. Non-combatants were compelled to seek shelter in cellars, as shells were bursting everywhere. The Cossacks succeeded in holding their position, and, on the withdrawal of the attacking party, opened fire with their artillery on the Parliament building. Under cover of this, they made an attack on the Nationalist headquarters, but were repulsed. There is no way of estimating the casualties, but, so far as known, no foreigners are among the killed or wounded.

DON'T WISH TO DEPOSE SHAH

Nationalists Tell Designs—Royalist Cause Not Yet Desperate.

LONDON, July 15.—The Times correspondent says: Nationalist leaders give assurance that they have no designs on the throne, but regard the future of the Shah as dependent upon the will of the nation, which the forces under their command will make no endeavor to influence. On leaving the Parliament building the

correspondent found himself in a crowd rushing up the street where heavy firing was going on. Kakhkharis on roofs of houses were discharging their rifles into the streets, while the Nationalist guns were belching forth flames. The Shah's men were strongly established within 600 yards of the Parliament building. They were forced to abandon one gun, but otherwise maintained their position. This suggests that the Royalist cause is not such a desperate case as has been supposed. The Royalists are making continuous attacks on the ramparts. In spite of the extraordinary expenditure of ammunition, the number of killed and wounded on both sides will not exceed 100.

LEGATIONS UNDER HOT FIRE

Russian Building Partly Destroyed and Diplomats Leave City.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 15.—The Novos Vremya has received a dispatch from Tcheran stating that the foreign legations were under fire by the Nationalists. The dispatches say that the Russian legation was partly demolished and that the entire staffs of the various legations were removed to safety outside the city. The Foreign Office is anxious concerning the fate of Colonel Likhoff and the other Russian officers who commanded the Persian Cossacks in Tcheran. A press dispatch says that M. Likhoff refuses to leave her husband's side.

POLYGAMY IS CHARGED

ASTORIA WOMAN UNDER ARREST IN SAN FRANCISCO.

Accused by Her Husband of Having Another Spouse When He Married Her 8 Years Ago.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 15.—A woman giving the name of Mrs. Agnes Selka was arrested here tonight by detectives upon the telegraphic request of the police of Astoria, Or., where she is wanted on a charge of polygamy, according to information of the local police department.

ASTORIA, Or., July 15.—Mrs. Selka is accused by her husband of having been married to E. P. Durand, in the employ of the Southern Pacific Company at the time she married Selka, a Jeweler in Astoria. It is alleged she procured a divorce in St. Helena in June from Durand, after she had been married to Selka for eight years.

She left with her brother for California Saturday, not telling her husband. It is charged that she was intimate with an employee of the Navy in San Francisco, and it is believed she went to meet him. Information was filed in the Justice Court Monday, and Sheriff Porter telegraphed the chief of police of San Francisco to arrest the woman. An agent will leave in the morning for Salem to secure extradition papers for the return of Selka to Astoria for trial. She took two children with her when she left home.

FOREIGNERS QUIT CAMPS

Cripple Creek District Hereafter to Be Strictly American.

CRIPPLE CREEK, Colo., July 15.—Henceforth the Cripple Creek district will be strictly American labor. This is the effect of action taken by county officials. Several days ago Sheriff von Puhl issued an ultimatum that foreign workmen employed at some of the mines must leave. Immediately the foreigners armed themselves, but today when the deputies reached the camps they found their quarry had gone.

BABY RULER HEADS FORCE

Edict Names Chinese Emperor Commander-in-Chief

PEKIN, July 15.—An edict issued today in the name of the Emperor appoints his majesty commander-in-chief of the land and naval forces of the empire. In accordance with the constitutional project of the late Emperor Kuang Hsu. The exercise of the military powers of the Emperor is delegated to Prince Yu Lan.

Japanese Elopers Head This Way

Chief of Police Duley, of Tacoma, apprised the local department to be on the lookout last night for Yen Sanjiro and Mrs. Mitsu Hori, two Japanese who eloped from Tacoma Wednesday night. The woman is said to have forsaken her husband, a business man in the latter city and has taken their 4-month-old baby with her on her flight with Sanjiro. It is believed the pair headed for Portland with San Francisco as their destination.

Wilson Loses Automobile.

Dr. George F. Wilson, 531 Hoyt street, reported to the police that his automobile was stolen from the curb in front of the Arlington Club about midnight last night.

Up to a late hour last night no trace of the thieves had been secured. The machine is described as a Wolverine White Flyer and at the time of the theft carried No. 1649.

Old Man Missing.

The proprietor of the Hotel Rheinpfalz last night requested the police to locate Josiah S. Court, an aged man who has been missing since Saturday morning. Apprehension is felt for the old man, who is believed to have wandered away from the hostelry and become lost. A minute description of Court was furnished to the police.

Reform School Escapes Sought.

The police have also been requested by the Superintendent of the Chehalis Reformatory to locate two boys, one named "Red" Vine, two 16-year-old lads who escaped from that institution and are now believed to be in this city. When last seen the boys were attired in regulation hickory shirts and overalls, the garb of the institution.

Money for Cushman's Widow.

Hunter Gets \$90 Bounty.

MONTESANO, Wash., July 15.—(Special.)—Auditor Fred Rosmond yesterday issued a warrant in the sum of \$90 in favor of Earl Pettit, of Hoquiam, for the bounty on three cougars and nine wildcats. The three cougars were killed in one day.

PINCHOT WOULD TEAM WITH SCOTT

Forestry Policy Would Be Upheld if Kansas Man Succeeded Wilson.

FRIENDS ARE SPECULATING

Meanwhile Secretary Wilson Is Preparing to Carry Out His Own Ideas of Reform in the Forestry Service.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, July 15.—It has been rumored, Secretary Wilson retires from the Cabinet next Winter, and is succeeded by Representative Scott, of Kansas. Pinchot forestry stock will take a big rise. Scott and Pinchot are on intimate terms, and in most respects are in entire harmony on questions of forestry administration. Their relations are very different from the relations that exist between Secretary Wilson and Forester Pinchot.

But up to the present time there is much doubt as to the accuracy of the Wilson retirement rumor. Friends of Secretary Wilson announced, when he was reappointed by President Taft, that he again took the Agricultural portfolio without condition, and to serve to the close of the present Administration, so far as existing circumstances could govern. It was specifically denied that Secretary Wilson would be allowed to remain in the Cabinet only long enough to round out his 13th consecutive year as Secretary of Agriculture. That statement being taken into consideration, in connection with the statement made by Secretary Wilson that he had no intention of resigning, would seem to discount the rumor, if not altogether discredit it.

Reforms Are Planned.

If this is the true situation, and if Secretary Wilson is to continue as Secretary of Agriculture, the Forest Service will continue to be subservient to his orders, as it has been since the 4th of March. It is a fact that Secretary Wilson is preparing to bring about what he considers essential reforms in the forestry administration, and, having the backing of the Administration in his effort, it would be strange if he should retire from office with that work only half completed.

Pinchot Favors Scott.

It is a well-recognized fact that Pinchot would welcome the appointment of Representative Scott as Secretary of Agriculture. Indeed, if given the opportunity, he would probably recommend the appointment. Pinchot is well aware that if Scott succeeded Wilson, the Forest Service would again become a virtual independent bureau, for there would be little inclination on the part of Scott to upset the plans and operations of his friend Pinchot. It may be that the wish was father to the thought, and that Pinchot or some of the other officials of the Forest Service, discussing their desires, may have given rise to the rumor that Wilson was to retire in favor of Scott.

It may be that Secretary Wilson, because of his long term and advanced years, may desire to resign before the end of the Taft Administration. If he does, the Kansas delegation in Congress will recommend the appointment of Scott to succeed him. That move has been agreed upon—but nothing more. In fact, members of the Kansas delegation, including Representative Scott, who know nothing of the proposed retirement of Secretary Wilson, and do not look for it in the near future.

WORKMEN HURT IN FALL

Three Injured When Platform Breaks Near Rainier.

Frank Littlefield, of 42 Hoyt street this city, and O. R. Snibley and Harry Berks, of Yale, were injured when they were brought to Portland and taken to the Good Samaritan Hospital at midnight last night. The injuries are said to be the result of the breaking of a scaffolding upon which they were working.

Littlefield was the most seriously injured. Beside a fracture of the right ankle and several broken ribs he is believed to be suffering from internal injuries. Snibley was painfully bruised about the head and face, while Berks is suffering from a fracture of both ankles and several ugly lacerations about the back.

It is said that the three were engaged in raising heavy timbers to a platform upon which they were standing, 20 feet from the stone surface below. The weight of the timbers caused the supports to snap beneath them. The men were carried down in the crash that followed. They were pinioned beneath the timbers and the stone floor of the quarry. Fellow workmen rushed to their assistance and after half an hour's work extricated the victims from beneath the debris. Littlefield and Berks were unconscious when rescued, but later revived.

CURTISS MAKES A RECORD

Does Nine Miles in 15 Minutes in His Aeroplane.

NEW YORK, July 15.—Glenn H. Curtiss bettered his own record again today when he flew his aeroplane at Mineola, L. I., nine miles in 15 minutes. Curtiss made two flights between 5 and 6 o'clock this morning. The first was stopped after two miles by the fog. The second flight beat his performance of yesterday, when he traveled about eleven miles in 17 minutes and was compelled to descend by the loosening of two bolts in the propeller.

Quaker City Offers Purse.

NEW YORK, July 15.—An offer of a purse of \$25,000 has been made by Jack McGuigan and Harry Edwards, light promoters, for a six-round contest between Stanley Ketchel and Sam Langford, in Philadelphia. The promoters plan to have the bout take place in the open air at the grounds of the Philadelphia American League Club. Joe Woodman, manager of Langford, said today he would accept the offer unless the Ely, Nev., promoters granted him \$10,000 for Langford's end and \$2000 for training expenses.

KISSES HER DEAD LOVER

ACTRESS TRIES VAINLY TO ATONE FOR REJECTING HIM.

Young Cuban Follows Girl From Cuba to New York—Ends by Shooting Himself.

NEW YORK, July 15.—After having rejected the offered love of Juan Baisinde, a young Cuban student, and thus become the innocent cause of his suicide, Louisa von Oester, an actress, called at the morgue this evening, knelt beside the body, kissed the lips repeatedly and cried: "Oh, why did you do this? Why were you so foolish?" Becoming hysterical, she was led away.

"I saw him last night," she said. "He asked me to marry him again, and when I refused he remarked that, if he had the means at hand, he would end his life." ment at 21 East Fourteenth street today. Nearly 200 seat checks from theaters, some memoranda and a letter indicated that he had been infatuated with the actress and had followed her from place to place in Cuba and this country. He killed himself, it is said, because his money had given out and his love affair lost its interest.

Baisinde, who was 25 years old, had been attending a school at Poughkeepsie. He returned to this country from Cuba several months ago, following the company in which the actress was playing. Among the memoranda in the youth's room were notes showing his expenses from June 15 to July 4 had been \$48. A letter, apparently written by his mother, said that no more money would be sent him unless he returned to his school at Poughkeepsie.
