

OWNERS WRANGLE OVER DELEGATES

Hammond Accused of Being Capitalist Spy, and Jones With Embezzling.

ROW NARROWLY AVOIDED

Flynn, Aspirant for Presidency, Will Reply to Charges Made Against Him When Report of Moyer Is Read.

DENVER, July 15.—The supporters of P. W. Flynn, of Butte, in his fight for the presidency of the Western Federation of Miners, and the adherents of the plan to affiliate with the Industrial Workers of the World, suffered a decisive defeat today when the Federation convention refused to seat Delegates Edward Hammond, of Michigan, and J. A. Jones, of Colorado, who were given over to consideration of the charges against Hammond and Jones. The former was accused by Joseph Cannon, also alleged that Hammond joined the local union in Michigan last May only to become a delegate, and that he assisted in packing the convention.

PRISONER NOTED CROOK

The police have identified Chapman by the Bertillon measurements as Fred W. Diehn, or "the Fritz," said to be a member of the notorious gang of "Shenly Ben" in New York City.

COREA ACCEPTS CHANGE

TRANSFER OF COURTS TO JAPAN RECEIVED QUIETLY.

Misapprehension at First Felt Is Removed, and New Plan Is Generally Accepted.

SEOUL, July 15.—The news of the new agreement between Japan and Korea arranging for the transfer of Korean judicial authority to Japan, is being quietly accepted here, now that its terms are fully understood. It was feared that some disturbance might follow the public misapprehension that the disbanding of the court guards was included in the abolition of the Korean War office. Now that it is known generally that the guards are not to be discharged, but merely are to be placed under the command of the Emperor's aide-de-camp, the cause for uneasiness has been removed.

JAPANESE WELCOME CHANGES

Are Generally Pleased With New Convention With Koreans.

TOKIO, July 15.—Count Komura, Minister of Foreign Affairs, was granted an audience with the Empress today, at which the new convention with Korea was the chief topic of discussion. Prince Ito left Tokyo, Corea, today en route to Fukuoka, and it is believed that he is bringing a copy of the document with him.

HONOLULU, July 15.—Twenty citations for contempt of court are said to have been issued today, ordering leaders of the Japanese strikers' organizations and a number of their pickets to show cause why they should not be punished. It is charged that the injunction issued by Judge Robinson, restraining the strikers from picketing, boycotting or in any manner interfering with laborers returning to work, has been utterly ignored.

Water Suits Stir Echo.
