"You must be a brether to the saloon man," they say. In other words, you must sacrifice principle to be on good terms with him.

I remember when this movement was gathering force. Brother Wheeler asked to preach upon the subject in an Eastern church. The officers of the church compelled him to preach his sermon to them before they would allow him to use the pulpt.

Praises Maine's Sobriety.
