

WICKERSHAM'S FAST TENNIS PLAY

Bethel Loses Chance to Keep Fiske Cup, Which He Has Won Twice.

MATCH FULL OF INTEREST

Bethel Loses Every Alternate Set and After Winning Second Seems to Get Nervous—Several Thrilling Plays Are Made.

In the greatest exhibition of tennis seen during the entire state tournament just held on the M. A. C. courts, Brandt Wickersham won from Major Bethel yesterday in the postponed match for the championship of the men's singles and thereby robbed Bethel of his chance to obtain permanent possession of the Fiske cup. This is now held for the first time by Wickersham.

Five sets had to be played and the match was in doubt till the finish. The scores were 6-1, 6-8, 6-2, 6-2, 6-2. As usual Major Bethel lost his first set and then crawled up in the second. He did not lose his winning streak, however, and lost the third set as well as the last, thus losing every alternate set. In the fourth set, he would have obtained permanent possession of the Fiske cup, as he already had won it twice. Fighting hard for this end, he appeared to become excited and lost some of his usual self-control. Time and again he hit the ball into the net when the chances favored making a winning stroke. On the whole, though, he put up one of the greatest exhibitions of tennis ever seen on the Multnomah Club courts, and he forced Wickersham to keep up on his toes and fight every minute for his points.

Grandstand plays were numerous throughout the match. Wickersham proved he is one of the most aggressive players that have ever played the game. In getting after Bethel's hard drives and acute angles served he did stunts that brought frequent and prolonged applause from the bleachers. Nor was Bethel far behind in furnishing sensational features. He is a thorough master of the game when he keeps his head.

In the first set, Wickersham had a walk-away winning six games to Bethel's one. Wickersham won the first game and Bethel the second. The remaining games were really won by the man who ever played the game. Wickersham won two-three order in favor of Wickersham.

The second set was the hardest fought of the match. In this Wickersham crawled up from a 6-3 score to 6-5, and then Bethel won out 8-5 with a whirlwind finish.

The third set went 6-3 for Wickersham and the fourth set 6-3 for Bethel. It happened all the while that the man who had won the match on the shady side of the court. In the semi-finals of the consolation match played before the Wickersham-Bethel match, A. B. McAlpin won over W. G. Gilbert, 6-1, 6-2, 6-2. Today at 3:30 P. M. Richard Wilder will play the winner and it is thought he will take the match without difficulty.

anywhere near so many people would care to go. Mayor Simon, members of the City Council and Executive Board, President Wetherbee, of the Commercial Club, and other well-known citizens of Portland left for Seattle in a special train at 11:30 last night. In two sections. Thirty minutes later the regular Portland-Seattle train pulled out, also in two sections, of 12 coaches each. It was so with all of the trains which left earlier in the day. The first special left the Union Depot promptly at 7:30 A. M. in two sections, and was followed at 8:15 by the regular passenger, in two sections.

They prepared to have any number. Consequently, coaches were brought into regulation and at 10 A. Late yesterday afternoon the first Portland booster train to Seattle, and they will continue to arrive there until this morning. The last night train will be in Seattle about 7 o'clock this morning. SALE OF RAILROADS WILL HELP BANK

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AMOUNT INVOLVED, \$80,000

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In consideration of the purchase of the road by Bates and his associates, certificates of deposit to the amount of \$80,000 were issued by the Oregon Trust & Savings Bank in return for which bonds to the amount of \$100,000 were received, the difference in these amounts being advanced in cash by the bank, which afterwards suspended in August, 1907. It is understood that the terms of the pending settlement between the two receivers contemplate that the original certificates of deposit shall be returned to Receiver Reddy in addition to the major part of the \$100,000 in cash which was advanced. When this understanding has been reached, the bonds of the defunct railroad company will be surrendered and the assets of the suspended bank increased proportionately.

INSTITUTE IS HELD

Catholic Educational Association Meets.

DR. HARRIS IS SPEAKER

Going Into Principles and Methods—Today's Work.

The Institute of the Catholic Educational Association of Oregon was opened yesterday morning by the celebration of solemn high mass at St. Mary's Cathedral by Rev. James Rauw, V. G., and an appropriate sermon by Rev. John A. Ryan, of St. Paul's Seminary, St. Paul, Minn. At 11 A. M. the programme was opened in the assembly hall of the Christian Brothers' College, on Grand avenue and Jackson street. Rev. William A. Daly presided at the morning session.

After brief musical exercises, Dr. John H. Haaren, associate superintendent of the New York schools, who was in the city a year ago, was introduced. Dr. Haaren's initial lecture was on "Pedagogy," the keynote of the convention, and commanding close attention. Dr. Haaren analyzed with great care. He spoke of Catholic pedagogy in its broadest scope.

"Pedagogy," he declared, "is to education as a part is to the whole. Education is the broad term. Pedagogy is the limited one. Education is the product of all experience affecting the adult as well as the youth, often without apparent plan or purpose, while pedagogy is a purpose, a systematic and practical purpose acting upon the young. Pedagogy is both a science and an art. As a science, pedagogy has certain principles formulated as the result of experience or derived from the sciences more or less cognate. Pedagogy is an ascertained end or purpose, which is to enable the teacher to guide or train the child in accordance with the ideals of education as proposed either by civilization or the prevailing thought. Pedagogy is higher than mere method."

Dr. Haaren said the teacher without technical education might study pedagogy and did study pedagogy by sympathy with and for the child. In the afternoon Brother Fabrician delivered a scientific talk on "The Psychology of Habit." The lecture was a close analysis of the subject, and he gave a comprehensive definition of the subject.

Miss Irene Finn and Miss Margaret Keys rendered several vocal selections. F. W. Goodrich presiding at the organ. Dr. Haaren delivered an interesting talk on "Reading as a Basis of Literary Study." On account of the importance of the subject he did not finish, and will take it up again tomorrow. Dr. Haaren placed the taste for reading on a high plane in the scheme of education. He defined the real ability to read as the capacity to "breathe the very atmosphere of the author," but remarked that the ability to read might also be a curse, such as superficial reading, the mere passing of time, and mechanical reading, from which nothing is learned.

Dr. Haaren condemned in strong words the use of slang, which he declared, while sometimes expressive, was the report of the layman to escape thinking. He condemned the insatiable reader, the reader of the sensational, the mechanical reader.
