

SAYS HUSBAND IS A BUTCHER BOLT

Mrs. Grace Buckles Fears Her
Heart Will Be Cut Out in
"a Quiet Way."

TELLS MOST LURID TALE

Divorce Petition Recites How She
Lay Awake at Midnight While
Clammy Chills Sped Up and
Down Her Quivering Spine.

Assured by her husband, William S. Buckles, of St. John, that he could cut her heart out in the quiet way, she says, and that when he was ready to kill her he would do it "in a quiet way." Mrs. Grace Buckles, a bride of three months, has brought a divorce suit in the Circuit Court. Not only does Mrs. Buckles say her life has been threatened, but she tells of lying in bed at midnight on two occasions, with the cold chills creeping up her spine, while her husband, dressed in a long black overcoat, with the collar turned up, and a black derby hat pulled down over his ears, crept stealthily about from window to window, attempting to gain entrance. Had a door been unlocked or a window been unfastened, Mrs. Buckles says she believes her husband would have quietly and coolly cut her throat or strangled her.

Wedded Bliss Was Brief.

Mrs. Buckles, whose maiden name was Barton, was first married to Ben F. Barton. He died in March, 1908. March 29 last she married Buckles, a young man 25 years old, employed at the Government morgue. She lived with him until June 22, when he left in a huff. The unhappy wife says that during their courtship days Buckles told her he was a machinist, and well able to provide proper support for his wife. She was living with her father and child by her first husband in St. John, and continued to live there after the wedding. But she says Buckles paid only \$1 on the house rent of \$10 a month, and gave her but \$13 for groceries. She says the necessities have been paid for with her own money, and that she has advanced her husband \$150.

Slow Music With This.

It was on the night of June 22, between 11 and 12 o'clock, she asserts, that she heard the door being opened from her bedroom window, which was followed by a hideous moaning. She thought her husband had committed suicide. Two nights later, she says, he was prowling about the house in the black overcoat and rubbers, although it was not yet outside. Again on July 1, between 1 and 2 A. M., he tried to unlock the back door, says his wife. She thought he had, she alleges, until about 3 A. M., when she heard a subdued cough near the front gate, and knew he had left. She asks for \$25 a month alimony, \$125 attorney's fees, and to resume her former name, Eaton.

Says Husband Abused Her.

Godfrey Grebe took peculiar delight in abusing his wife, Mrs. Lizette Grebe, according to her charges in a divorce complaint, filed in the Circuit Court yesterday. Mrs. Grebe's husband, she says, seems to have grown with his prosperity. Mrs. Grebe says she married him in Marion County, Kansas, August 28, 1904. When she came to Oregon they had nothing, but by dint of hard work managed to accumulate a little property. This Mrs. Grebe says her husband sold for \$450 to buy a car and a horse. She did not object to this transaction, as she says that Grebe was thereby enabled to earn better wages. But she says that after she had been away working out all day her husband would refuse to bring a bucket of water, would hide in the brush and frighten her, kept a loaded revolver in the house, and would flourish it when in his tantrums, and when she told him she intended to leave, threatened to hang himself, shoot himself or jump in the river.

Grebe Replies to Complaint.

Grebe filed in the Circuit Court yesterday afternoon an answer to his wife's charges, in which he says she is a Russian-German, and that if she signed the complaint she probably did not understand what it contains. He also says that he believes she is making her home with Joe Giesbach. He kissed his wife good-bye on the morning of July 16, he says, and when he returned home found she had taken the child to her brother's home "with the statement that they 'would probably get the child away.'"

Grebe Replies to Complaint.

L. E. Reed has filed a divorce suit against Madge E. Reed. He charges her with having deserted him in May, 1908. He married her at Oshkosh, Wis., June 20, 1905. They have one child, 4 years old, now with its mother. Lulu Wood filed suit in the Circuit Court yesterday against Charles M. Wood, asking for divorce. They were married March 4, 1905.

Chinaman Sues United Railways.

Even the Chinese have begun to sue the United Railways Company. Chua Leon added one more yesterday morning to the multiplicity of suits piling up against the company. He says the company has confiscated his land, al-

though he was promised as much as his Italian neighbor received for his Chun demands \$700 damages, although the Italian received only \$300. The company moved his house, he says, tore down his fences, filled up his well, and cut down his fruit trees. He owned 30 acres.

Order Signed for Writ of Review.

Circuit Judge Morrow has signed an order for a writ of review in the case of M. D. Silas against J. S. and L. D. Cole, which was recently tried in Justice of the Peace Court. Silas, the petitioner, says that the Justice erroneously opened a default judgment June 22, permitting the Cole in default of the writ returnable some time during the September term of court.

The Coal Creek Company has brought suit in the Circuit Court against F. B. Jones, W. A. Jones and R. B. Rose, East Side fuel dealers, to recover \$1600. The company alleges this amount to be due as rental for eight months on coal mines in Cowalla County, Washington.

Cherry Slug Pest.

PORTLAND, July 21.—(To the Editor.)—Presumably you were correct in your diagnosis in today's Oregonian that your inquirer's trouble affecting his trees is known as cherry or pear tree slug. This filthy slug thrives on the bark of trees and shrubs. Reports from all districts show the pest very numerous this season and apparently no districts are immune. If it is the cherry or pear tree slug, a very unpleasant odor may be noticed. As it is a leaf-eating insect, and as the arborvitae can be used successfully as a spray. All-slacked lime or very fine dust has been used with good results, apparently drying up the slimy insect. Liquid sprays can only be successfully applied with spray pumps. In order to be effective in using dust, the upper side of all the leaves should be thoroughly covered. The simple remedies, all can keep their trees free from this pest, which is doing so much destruction of late. The life of the slug is about four weeks, but in those four weeks it fairly riddles thousands of trees, and prompt action is necessary to overcome it. E. J. LADD.

Bark Wandsbek Added to List.

The German bark Wandsbek, now en route from Hamburg to Santa Rosa, with general cargo, has been added to the list of vessels to load new crop grain at Northwestern ports. The Wandsbek is on the list with option of either Puget Sound or Portland loading. She will be due early in December and probably will be loaded at Tacoma.

The steamship Northland is discharging asphalt at the Couch-street dock.

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., July 21.

During a dense fog at 3 o'clock this morning the steamer Iroquois collided with the schooner Endeavor, Captain McAlister, from San Pedro, for Ballard, in ballast. The collision occurred about two miles south of Marrowstone Point. The impact was quite severe, and when the vessels were cleared it was found that the bow of the schooner had been cut to the water's edge. Little or no excitement prevailed among the passengers and crew of the Iroquois, and every order of the captain was promptly obeyed.

The Iroquois offered to take the crew on board, but when it was found that the schooner was not seriously damaged, the Iroquois refused to do so. The schooner was towed to an anchorage in this harbor, and the Iroquois continued to Victoria. According to Captain McAlister, the damage to the vessel will reach between \$5000 and \$10,000. The fog came up unexpectedly, and the schooner was surrounded by vessels sounding for signals. To better guard against collision, he had his automatic fog signal sounded at intervals of 40 seconds, but notwithstanding this precaution he had two narrow escapes from collision before he was struck by the Iroquois.

When the collision occurred the man who was operating the fog signal had to jump to save himself from being crushed. No blame for the accident is attached to the master of either vessel, as both were using the utmost caution.

HENRIK IBSEN REACHES PORT

Norwegian Steamship Brings General Cargo From Orient.

Flying the house flag of the Portland & Asiatic Steamship Company, the Norwegian steamship Henrik Ibsen, arrived yesterday at 10:30 o'clock. She is on her first voyage to this port in the service of the Harriman steamship lines. The Ibsen has a moderate cargo of Oriental merchandise for this port and some Eastern freight. On the outward trip space has been engaged for 1000 tons of flour and a small quantity of lumber.

Captain Mayo Visits Puget Sound.

Captain Henry T. Mayo, secretary of the Lighthouse Board, and Commander J. M. Elliott, inspector of the Thirtieth Lighthouse District, left yesterday for Puget Sound, where they will make an inspection of the lights and fog signals. The trip around the Sound will be made on the tender Manzanita, Captain Byrnes. Commander Elliott will later leave for Alaska on the steamship Armeria for a tour of inspection of the lighthouses and buoys in that section. The Armeria will go as far west as Nome.

Puritan Safe at Nome.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 21.—The steamer Victoria arrived from Nome this morning with 300 passengers and \$200,000 in gold bullion. The Victoria encountered little ice, indicating that the unprecedented heavy drift of early summer is gone. The long overdue British steamer Puritan, a hole in her bow and her propeller stripped of blades, was met near
