

BOLIVIA AND PERU ON VERGE OF WAR

Organ of Montes Admits Arbitration Award Has Forced Issue.

BUT DOES NOT DESIRE WAR

Diplomatic Relations With Argentine Ruptured and People Call for Enrollment in Army to Fight Peru.

LA PAZ, Bolivia, July 21.—The Estado in a semi-official editorial says: "Argentine has placed Bolivia and Peru in an extremely delicate situation. The object of arbitration was to seal the permanent friendship of the two nations, but the injudicious injustice of the award has resulted in placing them on the verge of war."

The Argentine press says Bolivia's repudiation means war with Peru. We do not wish such an extreme. Neither Peru nor Bolivia is prepared for war. A solution should be found in the way of peace and equity, avoiding a desperate situation.

The recall of the Argentine Minister, Senor Fonseca, who has been stationed here throughout the disorderly events leading up to the present crisis, was followed almost simultaneously by the removal of the Bolivian Minister stationed at Buenos Ayres. On the departure of the Bolivian Minister from Argentina, he was ordered to turn over the archives to the American, Chilean or Brazilian legations.

The rupture of diplomatic relations was announced after extended official conferences, held yesterday, at which efforts were made to meet the aggressive attitude assumed by Argentina, and at the same time allay the growing popular agitation in Bolivia.

The spirit of the people was shown in monster petitions asking to be enrolled in the army, the petitioners asserting unconditional support of the government cause in case of an armed conflict. The feeling that hostilities may occur is shown by the continued departure of many Argentine and Bolivian residents.

The cause of Argentina's breaking off of diplomatic relations, as stated here, is a circular issued by President Montes to the provincial governors of Bolivia referring in slighting and offensive terms to Argentina's decision against Bolivia in the pending Peru-Bolivia boundary dispute.

Argentine also takes offense at President Montes' orders to the municipality of La Paz to suspend the centenary fetes which have been going on. In view of Argentina's adverse attitude, which is regarded as a national insult. These two steps by President Montes are construed by Argentina as incompatible with a dignified continuance of friendly diplomatic relations.

FEARS MEXICAN JUSTICE Critic of Diaz Government Says Embellishment Charge Faked.

EL PASO, Tex., July 21.—Enrique Villaseor, former jefe Politico of the Mexican towns of Temosachio and Yachaviva, recently surrendered to the United States authorities and was locked in jail. Villaseor was wanted on a Federal warrant, his arrest being requested by the Mexican government on a charge of embellishment.

Villaseor has been editor of a local Spanish publication, La Carreta, and says that the charge against him is trumped up to secure extradition. He claims he has attacked the Mexican government in his paper. He says he has been in hiding in El Paso for a week and decided to give himself up because he could prove the charges against him to be false.

MORGAN PARTY IN ALASKA Eastern Financiers Start on Tour of Inspection of Mines.

CORDOVA, Alaska, July 21.—The private yacht Yucatan arrived from Seattle today with the party of Eastern capitalists brought out by Governor W. Perkins of New York to inspect the Morgan-Guggenheim properties in Alaska.

Immediately upon arrival, Mr. Perkins and his guests left by special train for an inspection of the Copper River and Northwestern Railroad and the interests of the Guggenheims in the interior.

Long Branch Has Bad Blaze. LONG BRANCH, N. J., July 21.—Two hotels, the Cliff House and Amberside Inn, and seven houses were destroyed by fire today. The fire swept a block in Brighton avenue, between Second and Third avenues, causing \$100,000 damage.

JEROME ON ALERT

Expects Thaw to Gun for Him and "Angel Child."

IF LIBERTY IS REGAINED

Advices Evelyn to Take to Tall Timber—Ready for Thaw and Another Lawyer Is Armed. Former May Be Victim.

NEW YORK, July 21.—(Special.)—People who do not know the facts in the case have expressed surprise that Evelyn Nesbit Thaw should vigorously oppose the efforts of her husband to get out of the Matteawan insane asylum. But the woman's friends knew she would not as she did—that is, if she kept her nerve, which many of them openly doubted.

When the more or less chuckle-headed jury acquitted Thaw and the judge sent him to the asylum, District Attorney Jerome, who was in court, turned to one of his newspaper chums.

"If Harry ever gets free," he said, "he will buy a large, business-like looking revolver, and go gunning for the 'Angel Child' and me. He wants my scalp because he believes I prosecuted him too bitterly. Some things he has learned about his wife make him anxious to kill her. I can look after myself, but if I was the 'Angel Child' I would take to the tall timber."

Evelyn Thaw has said the same thing. She has told friends that her life is in danger, and she knows Harry will take her life. Of course, while he was safe with the maniacs, she continued to pose as the devoted wife, but it was only a pose, for her life has been one long-drawn-out dread that the man who went to prison for her sake would commit another murder in which she would have the star part.

Thaw May Figure as Corpse. A lawyer who entered the case as Thaw's counsel and later represented the wife is another person who has "that uneasy feeling." He has been practicing at a local shooting gallery, and carries a revolver around in his outside coat pocket. Mr. Jerome has also stated what he means to do.

It is a safe bet that if young Mr. Thaw goes on the warpath again, he may figure as the corpse this time, for the fate of Stanford White has warned the men Thaw has threatened since he went to jail.

THAW'S MOTHER WRITES BOOK Scores Jerome Bitterly and Also Criticizes Insanity Experts.

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., July 21.—The prosecutors of Harry K. Thaw are criticized and insanity experts scored in a 30-page booklet which Mrs. Mary Conley Thaw, mother of Thaw, issued here today.

It bears the title "The Secret Unveiled" and alleges the existence of a "sordid combination" against Thaw and the taking of unusual oppressive measures in his case. His entire sanity at present is strongly asserted.

Mrs. Thaw refers bitterly to District Attorney Jerome, who, she says, "has on four occasions left the responsibility of his own district to pursue the case into a district within which, as he himself acknowledges, he has no jurisdiction."

COAL LAND IS RESTORED Government Action in Wyoming Adds Greatly to Valuations.

WASHINGTON, July 21.—Announcement was made today that the Department of the Interior has just classified as coal land and restored to the public domain, certain unappropriated lands in the Evanston land district, Wyoming, fixing the price for disposal of the tracts there in some cases as high as \$500 an acre.

MULE KILLS HIS RESCUER Brute Kicks Young Fellow in Head and He Drowns. ASTORIA, Or., July 21.—(Special.)—C. R.
