Bleriot Ready for Contest With Wright and Prize Will Be Offered.

INVITATION TO AVIATORS

Exposition Proposes Prize of \$25,-000 to Winner of Three of Five Races - Conqueror of Channel Is Ready.

PARIS. July 29 .- Louis Bleriot apgreatly pleased when informed by the Associated Press today that the officials of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition had offered \$25,000 for an aeroplane race between him and the Wright Brothers. He said: "If either of the Wrights challenge me under the Seattle conditions, I shall immediately accept."

FAIR OFFICIALS RENEW OFFER

Receive Bleriot's Acceptance and Invite Wrights to Enter.

SEATTLE. Wash., July 23.—(Special.)

-- Upon receipt late tonight of a cable-gram from Louis Eleriot, consenting to compete at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Ex-position in an aeroplane contest for a \$25,000 purse, the exposition authorities repared a second cablegram to him re prepared a second cablegram to film re-tewing their offer in more specific terms and asking him if he would appear in a series of five races, the winner of the majority to receive the principal prize. Simultaneously a telegram was sent to Weight brothers apprising them of M. Rieriot's acceptance and urging them to indicate whether they would participate in the contest.

Josiah Collins, one of the directors, gave out an interview tonight in which he said the directors were jubilant that their offer was accepted and declared that they would now proceed to prepare the plans in detail. He estimated that the event would be a profitable investment to the exposition and predicted that it would establish a record for attendance that would rival that of any exposition ever held.
