SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 2.—(Special).—After playing 21 innings of shutout ball, Portland dropped today from the sublime to the ridiculous. The champion Colts played miserably in the field and couldn't hit a lick against the masterly pitching of Clyde Hall and his fine support. Gough, who was trotted out to pitch, had nothing and in the third inning he twisted Seattle's pile up five doubles and two singles for a total of five runs. Tom Seaton checked the slaughter for two innings, but the Lynch crowd fell upon him in the sixth, a double, two singles, which, with a base on balls, gave them three runs. In the next inning ten men went to bat and through the medium of five hits, two bases on balls and some infield errors showed over seven tallies.

With three men on base, Hall walked Bennett, forcing in a run. One hit with an infield error and a muff by Crocker chased in the 16th and final run.

Portland got only five hits off Hall, but two of them by Mayes and Kennedy were home runs. Portland's last two scores, made in the ninth, came after the visitors had lost all interest in the contest.

Frisk, with two doubles and two singles out of five times up, and Bennett, with three singles out of four times up, led in the hitting. Features of the game were Capron's throw from left to the plate, snipping Seaton after gathering in Murray's fly, and Bennett and Raymond's work around second base. WRESTLERS ALL READY

SHARP CONTEST IS PROMISED
TOMORROW NIGHT.Berg and Olson Both in City and
Today Will Draw for First
Chance at Roller.

Feeling fit as fiddlers, all three of the big wrestlers who are to take part in the 15-minute wrestling match at Exposition Rink tomorrow night are ready for the referee's word to go. Dr. Roller, always in condition to wrestle or box at a moment's notice, is in splendid fettle and looks upon the hard job out for him as an easy proposition.

Berg blew in from Hot Springs yesterday, eager to get a chance at Roller. The soreness has left the ankle that bothered him after the Youthful match and he is traveling at a rapid rate. Berg's clean life and continued working out allow him to step on the mat in the pink of condition whenever there is necessity for it.

Olson declares himself to be in rapid-fire order. His month's stay on the Coast has put the Swede in fine condition, and there is no clutch that he may not throw Roller before the 15 minutes have elapsed and win the match himself.

The man elected to go on against Roller first will probably be settled this morning, when Berg and Olson will meet with Manager Curley and draw for the honor. Ordinarily there is a disposition to hold back and let the other fellow take the first chance, but in this case it is different. Both light heavyweights have in the past shown that they can beat Roller in a straight match, and that is the compelling reason for wanting to get on first. If either throws Roller in the 15 minutes it will be the first defeat suffered by the big Seattle physician outside the ones given him by Frank Gotch, champion of all.

The match tomorrow night is scheduled to start at 8:30 o'clock, and the doors of the rink will be thrown open at 7:30, so that the gallery crowd can be accommodated. Ample seats have been arranged for in anticipation of the largest crowd that ever attended a wrestling match in Portland.

There will be a preliminary between some of the local aspiring lightweights.

KEENE'S AFFLICTION WINNER

SPITE OF UMPIRES
SERIES TO BE HOTPortland Fans Kick at Con-
nection of Moguls With
San Francisco Team.

SAY PARTIALITY IS SURE

Seals Have Good Players, Though,
but Rooters Believe With Even
Break McCredie's Huskies
Can Beat Them to It.

This afternoon the Vaughn-street baseball lot will be the scene of the opening of the hottest series of the season when the San Francisco club, somewhat crippled by the absence of Tom Tennant and the injury to Kid Mohler, will engage McCredie's bunch in the first of six games.

Even though favored some by the "tump" and executives of the league, practically all of whom are owners of the club, the Seals are a formidable aggregation of players and deserve a little consideration on that account. Players like Zofier, McCredie, Mohler, Nick Williams, Jimmy Williams, Harry Melchior, Claude Berry, "Al" Pate, "Silver" Henley, Eastley and the others are capable knights of the spangles and would help any club.

However, as good as are these players, their work is not half appreciated for the reason that the owners of their club are the officials of the league, while the manager of the club, Daniel W. Long, is secretary of the league and in that capacity is the boss of the umpires. That is, he gives the officials whatever instructions they receive, and naturally, when they give a few bad ones against Portland, which is always apparent when the Seals meet McCredie, the ownership of the San Francisco club is held more or less to blame.

Ewing Could Be Replaced.

The San Francisco players don't like to have this subject mentioned. Danny Long does not appreciate it in the least, and neither does J. Cal Ewing, but the latter gentlemen themselves are to blame and could remedy the evil by resigning and allowing some other worthy man to take the positions. J. Cal Ewing says it has been impossible to get anyone to fill either his position or that of Secretary Long, but he forgets that the country is doing very well without Teddy Roosevelt, and of course J. Cal would not for the world intimate that he is greater than the immortal Teddy.

If it were not for Long's connection both as manager of the San Francisco club and secretary of the league, in which latter capacity he assumes the duty of ordering the umpires about, Ewing's connection with the San Francisco club would not be so obnoxious, but with two San Francisco managers practically bossing the umpires, things do not look just right. The umpires may be as honest and competent as the day is long, but they get the orders from Ewing and Long and a man would not be human who failed to notice the source of his bread and butter.

Berry Not Pennant Hungry.

This kind of comment is advanced only in Portland, for Henry Berry, owner of the Los Angeles club, has had his fill of pennants and while he undoubtedly would like another one, he is not quite so anxious as are the fans of Portland, who believe Walter McCredie's team can gain a high percentage if it is given an even break. With Danny Long and Frank Ish, both prominently connected with the San Francisco club, on hand this week, the umpires can be expected to take some notice of Ernest Mohler and his ever frequent kicks. Even with this handicap, McCredie's bunch will give the Seals a battle and if they make good on Long's boast of taking four out of six, it will look very much as though Daniel knew beforehand whereof he spoke.

Jack Graney, Portland's southpaw, will oppose the Seals in the opening game, while either Browning or Eastley will open up for San Francisco. The series will be hard fought and should be extremely interesting with the moguls present.
