## CLEVER TRAP IS SET

Spaniards Catch Moors With Fire From Rear.

## ROUT FORCE OF MOSLEMS

Marina Draws Them Out of Camp and Opens Fire From Both Fort and Warship—Many Killed. Rest Are Put to Flight.

MADRID, Aug. 3.—A report received this afternoon from General Marina related a successful Spanish maneuver at Melilla. The Spanish commander set a trap for the Moors, who were in the foothills of Mount Gurgu, late yesterday afternoon. While he maneuvered several battalions in front of the Moorish position, the battleship Numancia moved down the coast to be in a position to take the enemy in the rear.

The Moors took the bait and moved forward and at once fell under the concerted fire of the fort and the Numancia. They broke and retreated in disorder, leaving many dead on the field.

As soon as the necessary troops arrive the advanced Spanish positions at Mount Atalayou and Sidamet will be strengthened preparatory to an advance upon Zeluhan, the Spanish objective.

The Red Cross and other organizations are working ceaselessly to care for the sick and wounded, both at Melilla and at Spanish ports.

The Bank of Spain has contributed \$1000 to the Queen's fund.

A large force of Moors, containing contingents from the coast and inland tribes, today gathered in front of Alhucemas, the island fortress belonging to Spain on the coast of Morocco, evidently preparing for an attack.

The Spanish troops show a splendid spirit, and the commissariat and hygiene arrangements for their care have been much improved.

DON JAIME MOST PEACEFUL  
 Spanish Pretender Declares He Will Not Join in Revolt.

VIENNA, Aug. 3.—Don Jaime, the pretender to the Spanish throne, declared in an interview here yesterday that he had no intention of interfering in the present crisis in Spain, and that his retirement to Frohsdorf, in Lower Austria, far from the Spanish frontier, was proof of his peaceful purposes.

"The Carlist party is a party of order," said Don Jaime. "I never will take upon myself to bring an entire people in danger for my own ends. Never will I lead Spain against Spain."

"Should I return to Spain at the head of an army it will be to restore order. This might happen, should the revolutionists drive out King Alfonso, or the welfare of the country require it. The popularity of King Alfonso is declining through no fault of his own, and Queen Victoria is less liked than the King. Spain dreads foreign influence; Victoria has remained a stranger too long, and the people never will forgive her."

Don Jaime is of the opinion that the war in Morocco was unavoidable, and he fears it will last a long time.

MOORS PREPARE FOR BATTLE  
 Spaniards Observe Their Movements From Captive Balloon.

MELILLA, Aug. 3.—The Spanish commander today sent up a captive balloon from which observations were made of the movements of the Moors on Mount Gurgu. Thousands of Moors were seen preparing for a great battle.

MADRID, Aug. 3.—Official dispatches received from Melilla say the Moors last night attacked a blockhouse in course of construction. They were repulsed. The Spaniards lost one officer killed and 14 men wounded.

## HAWLEY TO FRONT

Cannon Will Make Him Head of Claims Committee.

## CAN DO MUCH FOR OREGON

Improves Oregon's Prospect of Getting Civil War Claim—Ellis and Humphrey Rivals for Harbors Committee.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Aug. 3.—Unless Speaker Cannon rearranges his programme, he will appoint Representative Hawley to the chairmanship of the committee on claims and keep him on the committee on agriculture.

In attaining the claims chairmanship Mr. Hawley must jump from last place to first, but his selection is due to his diligent work as a member of the committee in the last Congress and to the further fact that the Speaker has confidence in his judgment and discretion.

As chairman of the claims committee Mr. Hawley will be in a position next session to have Oregon's Civil War claim incorporated in the next omnibus claims bill.

Representative Ellis and Representative Humphrey, of Washington, are pulling all strings to get Senator Jones' old place on the rivers and harbors committee. It was said today that the Speaker had not yet decided who would succeed to that vacancy, but probably it will be one or the other of these two men. Mr. Polk, because of his insolvency, will get no good committee assignments, but Mr. Hamer of Idaho probably will go

on public lands and possibly on post-offices as well.

## ASSISTANTS GIVEN ADVANCE

Promotions for Deputy Postmasters in Towns of Northwest.

## Lends Figurehead to State.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Aug. 3.—Through the efforts of Senator Jones the figurehead of the cruiser Washington has been lent to the State of Washington. It now lies at the Puget Sound Navy-yard, where it was recently removed from the ship. The Government has not yet decided what disposition will be made of the figurehead of Dewey's flagship Olympia.

## OLD MAN KILLED IN JAIL

Authorities Believe Negro Cellmate Guilty of Murder.

STOCKTON, Cal., Aug. 3.—Jacob Sleeper, aged 81, was found dead in a cell at the County Jail early today, and an autopsy showed that the man had been murdered. His face was beaten almost beyond recognition.

The dead man was in jail for intoxication. The authorities are making an effort to hasten the crime on Charles Johnson, a negro, who occupied the cell with Sleeper.

Ten Twohy Teams Allowed to Pass Through Gurtz Road.

## BOTH SIDES TALK OF CASE

Porters Say They Are Not Building "Turkey Track" While Harriman Contractors Complain of Uprooted Stakes.

to this point hereafter. This is practically the only point on the route where it will be necessary. We intend to build eight miles of wagon road from Tygh Valley around the Mutton Mountains, and will then ship supplies over the Great Southern Railroad to Dufur, and get as good a route into the upper canyon as from any railroad point on this side of the river.

"Yesterday we had 750 men on the pay roll, and there will be 150 more tonight. We have 64 four-horse teams at work freighting and on the grade."

Injunction to Be Contested.

Attorney Carey declared here today that the injunction which served to open the road through the Gurtz ranch in his opinion is void. Judge R. R. Butler, Circuit Judge, will be in Moro, the county seat, tomorrow, and will at that time set a date for the hearing on the order. Mr. Carey also declared that he had the affidavits of all the ranch owners who gave options to J. P. Porter, that they had not entered into verbal agreements with the Harriman people permitting the latter to cross their lands.

H. A. Brandon, constructing engineer

of the Harriman road, is not here, and J. W. Twohy, of Twohy Bros., said today when questioned about Johnson Porter's charge, that he knew of no statement having been made to Mr. Porter that he could not use the canyon wagon road.

## Men in Good Humor.

The laborers employed by the two railroads are now working practically side by side at the tunnel portals, but good humor prevails among the men. The water boy for one gang may serve the other, or vice versa, and the employees swap tobacco. Good work is interfered with, however, and the foremen and engineers are subjected to annoyance on this account.

Another force of Porter men is working on the Oregon Trunk line grade in a manner that threatens, unless it is soon stopped, to undo work by the Harriman employees on the wagon road extensions into the tunnel. This wagon road is along what will be the Harriman railroad grade.

In the complaint filed in the Circuit Court today on which the new injunction is based, the Deschutes Railroad Company alleges the approval by the Interior Department of its right of way from a point two miles below the tunnel to a point seven miles above it, all of which is on Government land. The right of exclusive possession of this right of way is claimed. The complaint charges that the Oregon Trunk Line and Porter Bros., since July 20, have wrongfully and unlawfully excavated rock on this right of way, and have removed and destroyed the plaintiff's survey stakes, damaging it to the extent of \$500. The Horseshoe Bend tunnel is described, and it is alleged that the defendants have no survey stakes there and nothing to indicate that they have ever surveyed a railroad line at that place, but are employing a large number of men excavating and removing rock. It is declared to be impossible for the Deschutes Company to occupy its right of way and construct its railroad unless the defendants and their agents, servants and employees desist from destroying stakes and interfering with the work.

Today Harry Carleton, Tony Scappell and Sam Sappano, Porter men arrested on a charge of participating in a riot, waived examination and gave bonds for their appearance in the Circuit Court. Bail was reduced in each instance from \$1000 to \$750.

Liabilities of Over \$9,000,000.

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—Liabilities of \$9,000,000 and assets of \$3,395,928 are shown in the schedules of Shepard & Co., the bond brokerage house which failed April last, filed today. All but a few thousand dollars of the claims are unsecured. The firm was heavily interested in railroad projects and industrial enterprises in New Mexico.
