Pitchers Eastley, of San Francisco, and Harkness, of Portland, each suffered a bad injury yesterday, but the San Francisco boys got off much worse than did the Portlanders, and this resulted in Portland winning the third game of the series by the score of 3 to 2. The game was probably the most exciting of the series, for good plays were quite frequent, and bad ones also, both of which caused the bugs to become rabidly excited.

The Seals put two runs over in the sixth inning, and while Eastley was hit much harder and oftener than was Harkness, it looked as though the brace of tallies might decide the contest. Portland's only hope lay in a batting rally, and many thought this would not be forthcoming, especially as several long hits had gone for naught in the earlier part of the game. Walter McCredie was especially in evidence with the stick, for he rapped out a double, a triple and a single in his first three trials against Eastley. Strangely enough, it was his lesser hit that finally counted, though Ote Johnson practically scored all three runs with a hit to center field.

The Seals' two came in the sixth when McCredie opened with a two-bagger to right. Eastley bunted and no one covered first, which put the Seals in a bad way. Zeller flew to Ryan, but too close in for McCredie to score. Mohler then pulled off the hit and run game, and against first base was unopposed. McCredie scoring and Mohler reaching first in safety.
