

## LABORER'S CAREER AS HOLDUP BRIEF

**Gets \$750 From Cashier at Muzzle of Revolver and Is Shot Dead Later.**

### ONE OF PURSUERS KILLED

**Minnesota Town Has Exciting Half-Hour, in Which Two Men Are Killed, One Fatally Shot and Two Hurt.**

WHITE BEAR, Minn., Aug. 5.—Following a hold-up on the First State Bank of this village today, Henry Paul, the robber, and Fred Larkens, one of the pursuing citizens, were shot and killed, and William Butler, one of the posse, mortally wounded. One other man received a wound in the thigh and still another was shot through the wrist. The robber, who had been employed as a laborer for several days, received his check for \$4 early today. When he went to the bank to cash it, Cashier Alfred Auger was the only man there. Paul offered Auger the check, and while the cashier was examining it he drew a revolver. Following the robber's instructions, the cashier passed out all the currency in the bank, amounting to \$750. The robber then fled through the village streets toward Bald Eagle Lake. Auger gave the alarm and in a few minutes an armed posse was in pursuit. The robber took refuge in a shed, and when the posse drew near opened fire. Larkens, who was leading the posse, went boldly into the shed. He dropped dead on the threshold with a bullet in his heart. The other pursuers then retreated to sheltered points and opened fire with rifles and revolvers. The fire was returned by the robber, who in a few minutes fell, shot through the abdomen.

### CURTISS OFF TO RHEIMS

**Only American Contestant for Aeroplane Prize by Bennett.**

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—Glenn Curtiss, the aviator, who has made a number of successful flights on Long Island, sailed this afternoon on the French liner La Savoie for France, where he will represent the United States in the international contests at Rheims.

"The machine I am taking with me," said Mr. Curtiss, "is a new one, and has never been given a trial, but since it is the counterpart of the one in which I have made some successful flights down on Long Island, I am sure it will fly. I am going to try principally for the international cup offered by James Gordon Bennett for the aeroplane negotiating a set course of about 12 1/2 miles in the best time. I shall try, too, for several other prizes. If successful at Rheims, I will probably stay in Europe a while this fall and make flights elsewhere."

### GROSS II HAS GOOD FLIGHT

**German Military Dirigible Covers 217 Miles in 15 Hours.**

BERLIN, Aug. 5.—The military dirigible balloon, Gross II, after an endurance flight of 15 hours and 40 minutes, came to earth at 3 o'clock this afternoon. The ship traveled 217 miles.

### Zeppelin Two Hours Late.

COLOGNE, Aug. 5.—Delayed by bad weather, the Zeppelin airship arrived here at 10:15 this morning from Frankfurt, two hours later than was expected.

### HEAT KILLS TWO MORE

**MANY PROSTRATIONS FOLLOW PATH OF TORRID WAVE.**

**Great Central Metropolis Suffers in Boiling Weather. With Little Relief.**

CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—(Special.)—Two additional deaths and many prostrations were reported today as the result of the terrific heat of yesterday and part of today.

Grant Normandie, 45 years of age, who had taken to his rear porch in the hope of getting a breath of air, was found dead by his wife a few moments later.

William O'Brien, 30 years of age, was picked up dead in an alley in the rear of a saloon. He had just taken a drink of beer and announced he was going home, as he was suffering terribly from the heat.

In the South Chicago steel mills several men were prostrated and three of these cases are serious. Two men and one woman were picked up from the streets in various portions of the city and all are in a serious condition.

Richard Oaks, 55 years of age, a roofer, was stricken by torrid rays and tumbled to the ground. He will probably die.

This afternoon cool breezes came off the lake, relieving the situation here, but the hot wave is spreading eastward and will probably reap a harvest of death and suffering until it spends itself in the Atlantic Ocean.

## MANY TOOK GRAFT

**Oswald Tells of Officials on Redlight Payroll.**

### LIKE REGULAR BUSINESS

**Ex-King of Tenderloin Calmly Betrays Harper and His Gang as Joining Him in Grafting Off Vicious Element.**

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 5.—The story of how a new red light district was built up on strict business lines, with headquarters in one of the modern office buildings in the heart of the city, where deals could be put through and records of all transactions kept—all under the alleged protection of city officials—was told today by Nick Oswald in the trial of ex-Chief of Police Thomas H. Broadhead, charged with accepting bribes. Nick Oswald has long been known here as "King of the Tenderloin."

Oswald today carried the story forward from the point it was brought to yesterday, when he testified to having made a deal with ex-Mayor A. C. Harper and ex-Police Commissioner Samuel Schenck for protection in his operation of the red light district, to the part involving the payment of certain sums monthly to various city officials, among them Broadhead, the Chief of Police.

The main testimony given today was concerning Harper and Schenck, and protests were entered by Broadhead's attorney, but upon the statement of Deputy District Attorney Ford that he will show later that Broadhead was a party with Harper, Schenck and others to a conspiracy it was permitted to go into the record.

When court adjourned Oswald was still testifying to details of meetings in the Mayor's office between himself, Schenck and Harper.

and his cousin did not have \$25,000, the amount demanded as a ransom. The letter was addressed to Joseph Pagano, one of the men held on suspicion. It came from Chicago and the writer tells Pagano he cannot claim "the trunks" because the police are watching them. The police will not divulge the name of the writer.

### KIDNAPERS BUSY IN GOTHAM

**Steal Child From Bed and Police Suspect Blackmail.**

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—The kidnaping of two children within a week from the same family has led the police to believe that efforts are being made to blackmail the parents. When Stephen Guardino, 4 years old, was stolen from in front of his home in Spring street, Sunday afternoon, the kidnapers apparently stole the wrong child, because he was released the following morning and was picked up on a strange street and returned to his parents.

### STATE WILL GET SAILOR

**Navy Department Will Surrender Negro Charged With Killing.**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—David Williams, the negro mess attendant on the battleship Vermont, will be surrendered by the Navy to the Massachusetts state authorities, who charged him with manslaughter as the result of the death of Mess Attendant Foster, following a boxing bout aboard the Vermont.

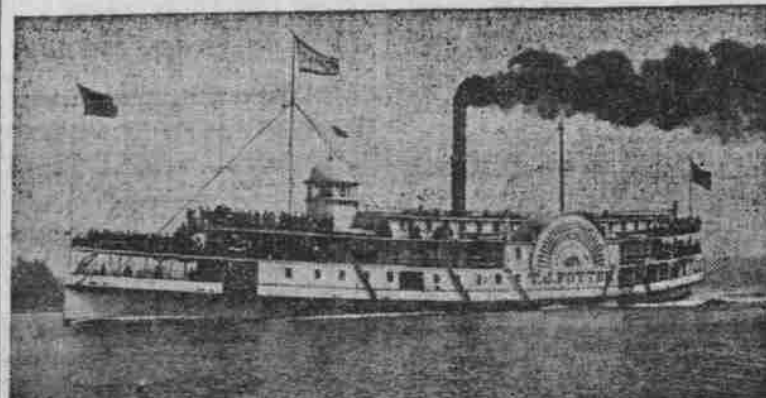
