When the cast was first applied, after considerable trouble and much pain, Dr. Burdette was asked how he felt. He replied: "It seems strange that a man's body should be capable of enduring so much pain without succumbing. But the Lord's will be done."

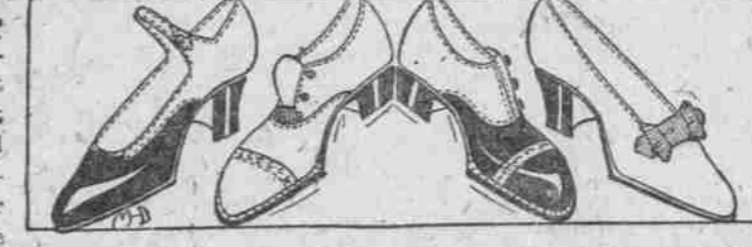
