

GIRLS PICK LUCKY NUMBERS TODAY

Drawings to Be Made in Cœur d'Alene Land Lottery.

NAMES LOCKED IN CANS

Envelopes to Be Dumped Onto Large Platform in View of Public and Mixed With Shovels, Then 1500 Selected.

SPokane, Wash., Aug. 8.—From a heap of more than 10,000 envelopes, drawing will be begun at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning to decide the lucky applicants for lands thrown open to entry and settlement in the Cœur d'Alene reservation. The envelopes are now in sealed cans at the Cœur d'Alene Land Office.

To convince the people who will watch the ceremony that the proceeding is regular, the cans will be cut open in the public view and emptied on a big wooden platform that has been erected for the purpose. The envelopes will be mixed with shovels and the selection of the first hundred will be made by Miss Helen Hamilton, of Cœur d'Alene.

Each envelope as drawn will be opened by the land officers and the name announced.

Other Drawings Later.

The drawing for the Flathead reservation will be done on Thursday and Friday by Miss Christina Donlan, of Missoula, Mont., and for the Spokane reservation of Monday, August 16, by Miss Harriet Post, of Spokane.

After the first 100 applicants for the Cœur d'Alene reservation have been drawn by Miss Hamilton, the other two girls will help her until 1500 have been taken—about twice the number of the homesteads on the Cœur d'Alene reservation.

For the Flathead reservation about 4000 applicants will be drawn, and for the Spokane reservation about 250, in each case about twice the number of the available homesteads, to allow for improperly filled out applications and for any other irregularities, and for those who fail to appear at the proper time to make entry.

A force of 75 clerks will be installed in a vacant storehouse at Cœur d'Alene tomorrow, who will open the application envelopes left after the drawing of the winners, tabulate the names alphabetically, and compare them with those of the first drawn.

All those who are proven to be duplicates or irregularly made out will be rejected, and the applicant will lose his chance.

Judge Witten and his clerical force have been busy today with the final plans for the drawing. The land officers have been here to hear for themselves if they are among the fortunate few.

The grand total of applications now reaches 36,238, about 100 having arrived in today's mail. Less than another 100 is expected tomorrow morning before 9 o'clock. The net number of claims, according to official figures given out tonight, are:

Spokane reservation, 41; Cœur d'Alene, 150; Flathead, 200.

It is estimated, however, that for various reasons these may be increased. Some may prefer an 80-acre tract of choice land to 160 acres less valuable. The total acreage in the Cœur d'Alene lands is a little over 230,000, excluding Indian allotments and sections reserved by Government.

A new schedule of allotments of the Cœur d'Alene reservation has reached the Land Office which shows that maps heretofore issued by private firms are greatly at variance with what the official map will show. It is thought there will be no further changes and that the Indians will be content to settle on the lands allotted to them, though some difficulty is expected in regard to the cutting up of long-traveled roads.

A Cœur d'Alene capitalist has offered \$30,000 to whoever draws the first number, but as the Government regulations prohibit any traffic in the lands, there is no way for him to get the land.

POPULAR TEACHER RESIGNS

Mrs. Ella D. Baldwin Quits The Dalles for Washington, D. C.

THE DALLES, Ore., Aug. 8.—(Special.)—At a meeting of the Board of the School Board last night the resignation of Mrs. Ella D. Baldwin, a seventh-grade grammar teacher, was accepted, and Miss Florence Chapin was elected, subject to appointment. Mrs. Baldwin has been a teacher in The Dalles schools for the past eleven years, and resigns to make her home with her son, E. D. Baldwin, in Washington, D. C. Mr. Baldwin is private secretary to Congressman W. R. Ellis.

Walter E. Felthouse, of Walla Walla, Wash., a member of the '99 graduating class of Whitman College, was chosen as an assistant instructor in the High School, vice Miss Nina O. Westcott, resigned, who had been acting in that position at Salem. Mr. Felthouse will have charge of the department of science. The High School will have three men instructors in the morning, and the afternoon will be added to the business course in the High School the coming term.

OPIUM CAUSE OF REVOLT

Chinese of Shensi Objected to Crusade of Magistrate.

VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 8.—Further particulars brought by the steamer Montezuma today concerning the Mohammedan uprising in Shensi and Kansu districts state the revolt was due to the severe methods taken by the Chinese local magistrate to suppress the opium habit.

SKY AT PEAK IS CLEAR

MAZAMA EXPLORING PARTY WILL START TODAY.

Rough Country to South of Baker to Be Visited by Men Members of Club.

BELLINGHAM, Wash., Aug. 8.—(Special.)—Telescopic observations of Mount Baker, made this afternoon by a party of local people who will start tomorrow morning to join the Mazama exploring party at Meadows, showed the atmospheric conditions near the summit to be excellent. Forebodings are felt, however, because of stormy indications in the lower strata. Overcast skies in the vicinity of this city and a lowering barometer are an unfavorable outlook for the next few days.

Forest Ranger Bell of Denning, who came down today from the Mazama camp, reports that those who are staying there are awaiting the return of the exploring party with great interest. Half of the male members of the party, headed by President M. W. Gorman of the club, compose this exploration party, which is on a trip to determine the source of the south fork of the Nooksack River.

This river source heretofore never has been mapped. It is the theory of the club that the stream takes its source from the hillsides unnamed and unexplored in the southern slope of the mountain. It is the intention to explore thoroughly this glacier also. The route of the investigators takes them in the vicinity of the Twin Sister Mountains, through what is agreed to be some of the roughest and wildest country on the North American continent.

Members of the local city engineering department, headed by the City Engineer, recently made a trip to determine this territory to explore the watershed of the river. They were gone for a week and reported the traveling incredibly rough. It is expected that the Mazama explorers will be able to return to their permanent camp before the middle of this week. They will then be in fine condition for the climb to the summit of the mountain.

Ranger Bell reported the entire party of Mazamas in fine health and spirits, with no accidents nor sickness of any kind.

The local Mazamas who will start in the morning, comprise six persons. They say the understanding is that the climb to the summit will not be attempted until the end of this week.

Pretty Lacemaker Leaves Chicago Showered With Kisses and Tears.

CHICAGO, Aug. 8.—(Special.)—Pleuritically wept, benumbed and lamented, Ella Gingles, who came out of rural Ireland to play the stellar role in one of the most enthralling of recent

newspaper serials, unwillingly departed this afternoon for County Antrim, in the island of her forefathers. The young Irish lacemaker demurred when the authorities ordered her deportation, she said, her parents had read garbled newspaper accounts of her sensational experience in Chicago, and she doubted whether she could explain them to their satisfaction.

Miss Gingles was not suffered to depart quietly. Sympathetic clubwomen dropped tears on her forehead, and checked after imploring motherly kisses there, and a guard of honor, consisting of both men and women, escorted her.

Ella Has Dramatic Instinct.

Ella was duly appreciative of the interest which she elicited. She chirped softly to those who took her hands or pecked at her cheek, and wore all the time a distant far-away expression, as one who is lost in thought after many trials undergone and many sorrows supported. Whether she was dreaming of the hills at home, thinking of the traveling expenses of the President, or of the ordeal that awaited her on her arrival at home, when the task of clearing her name, and the evidence in her recent trial, and that the girl would use the contents on her arrival at home in explaining fully her troubles to her parents and friends.

The train left at 3 o'clock, and with a due sense of dramatic values Miss Gingles deferred the final parting until the last moment in the trainshed. In the station she stood at one side, with P. H. O'Donnell, her attorney, saying a little, and looking about her with wide Irish eyes, smiling at her friends, at the reporters, at the trainmen who had gathered to see her off—in short, at everyone who came near, but she wasn't in a talkative mood.

"Will you ever come back to America?" a friend wanted to know. "I can't say," she replied. Asked as to her future plans, Miss Gingles said: "Oh, I haven't really thought much about the future."

Kisses and Tears at Last.

Five minutes before the train pulled out the signal was passed and the farewells said. One woman with white hair threw her arms about Ella's neck and kissed her. Then other women of the group approached to say farewell. Many wept, but Ella's eyes were dry. She was quite calm, and hurried through that part of the ceremony without any apparent zest.

Mrs. Grace Van Dusen, who will sail with Miss Gingles, who will leave New York on the Campania on Wednesday. Mrs. Cook is going to see that Ella gets safely home to Larnoe, County Antrim, near the famous Giant's Gate-way, and will aid her in her explanations to her parents.

shooting, in particular, Lieutenant Adams, and which are denied by the officers in question. This being the case, it is almost certain the officers will be called in rebuttal and there will be a number of recalls for the purpose of clearing up as

far as possible tangles in the testimony. After the testimony is closed, the argument of counsel will take a day or two, so the case is more likely to go into the following week than to be completed early during the present week.

Suicide Theory Demolished.

The evidence presented during the week just past has demolished the suicide theory as to the death of Sutton. It was demonstrated that Lieutenant Utley's testimony on that point was based on the belief that accidental self-killing was suicide, while his statement that the movement of Sutton which ended in the fatal shot began before the cry that Ruelker had been shot, demonstrated belief that he had killed Ruelker, was not the cause of Sutton's action. Besides, the testimony of Surgeon Cook, who performed the autopsy, yielded nothing in favor of the suicide theory against that of accidental killing of himself in an effort to reach the officers who were holding him.

To this degree the inquiry has resulted in a clear triumph for the Suttons.

Mrs. Sutton Must Bring Proof.

On the other hand, there has been no direct evidence to justify the original claim of Mrs. Sutton that her son was shot by someone else, or her later allegation that he was beaten to death and then shot to cover up the murder. The testimony of Mrs. Sutton and Mrs. Parker must prove these or afford the means of its proof, or so much of their claim will fall to the ground.

GREEK FLAG MUST NOT FLY IN CRETE

European Powers Insist on This, but Work for Amicable Agreement.

CAPITALS ARE AGITATED

Turkey, However, Seems Not to Have Presented Ultimatum to Greece, but to Have Confined Herself to Verbal Protests.

LONDON, Aug. 8.—The acute stage reached in the dispute between Turkey and Greece over Crete is causing anxiety in the European capitals, such as always accompanies any diplomatic difficulty in that quarter.

However, as M. Jawolsky, the Russian Foreign Minister, said at Cowes last Tuesday, if there is any awkward development in the situation, Europe will see from the four protecting powers are making energetic representations both to Constantinople and to Athens to secure an amicable agreement.

The four powers insist that under no circumstances shall the Greek flag be hoisted over any public building in Crete, and the foreign consuls at Athens have been instructed to impress upon the Cretan authorities.

TURKEY IS NOT SATISFIED

Reported Force of 5000 Men Ready to March on Greece.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 8.—The steps the Porte has taken at Athens concerning Crete have been confined exclusively to verbal representations. No written ultimatum has been presented, and the representations have been couched in the friendliest language consistent with firmness.

Greece had already informed the Porte that the Greek officers in Crete had been struck off the Greek army list since 1906, and the whole question was in the hands of the four protecting powers. She said also she expected tomorrow to make a formal reply in this vein, reiterating assurances of Greek neutrality.

From the Turkish standpoint, such a reply will be unsatisfactory, but much is hoped from the energy the protecting powers are displaying to prevent the crisis becoming dangerous. The Ambassadors of the four powers—Great Britain, Russia, France and Italy—conferred today, and will meet again tomorrow to agree upon a common action, which will be taken without delay.

The agitation against Greece is growing in the Turkish provinces. A volunteer force of 5000 men has been formed at Monastir, ready to march against Greece.

TURKEY MUST KEEP PEACEFUL

France Glad Germany Backs Up Representations of Powers.

PARIS, Aug. 8.—Great satisfaction is felt here that Germany is supporting the representations of the protective powers to Turkey as to the necessity of a peaceful solution of the Turco-Greek dispute over Crete.

The status quo existing at the time of the evacuation of Crete by the international troops alone was promised to Turkey and it is considered that energetic action is necessary at Constantinople in order to prevent Turkey from advancing fresh pretensions.

Greece to Reply Tuesday.

ATHENS, Aug. 8.—It is stated the Greek reply to Turkey will be delivered Tuesday. The representatives of the powers are holding conferences with the Premier and the Foreign Minister. An Austrian squadron and an Italian warship have arrived at Volo. It is supposed they are on the way to Salonika.

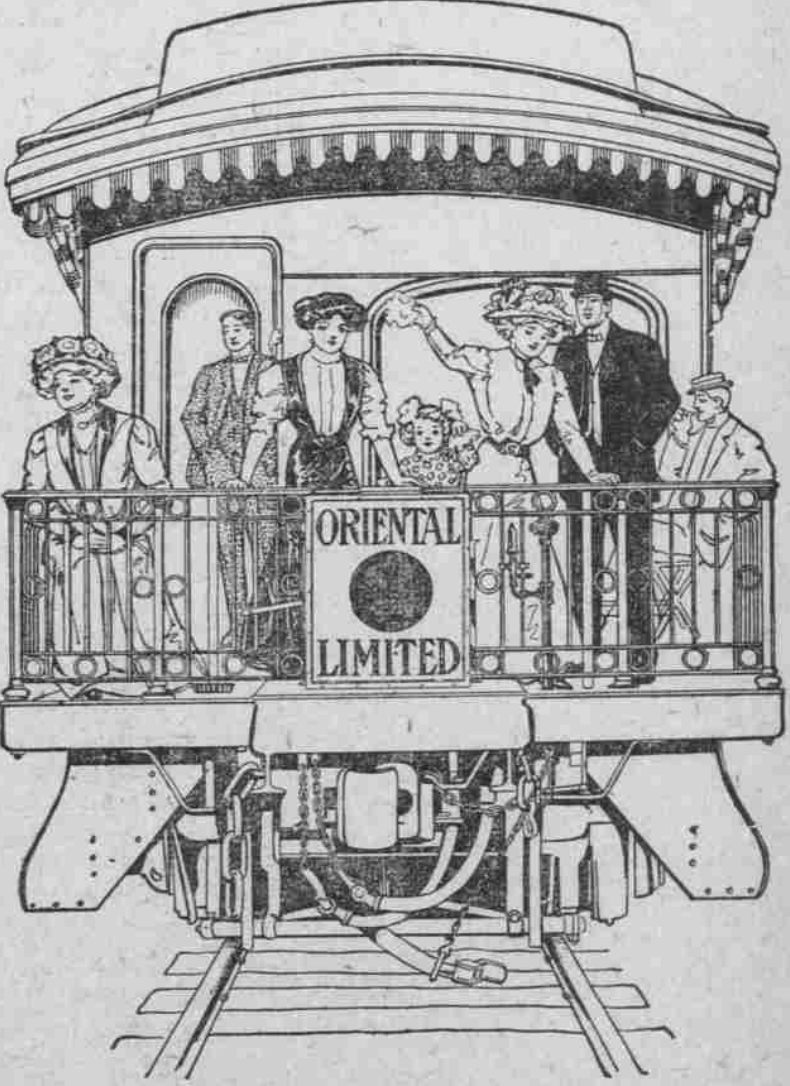
The tournament is being played as a workout, preparatory to the approaching contest at Newport.

Philippine Tobacco Will Bear Stamp as to Quality.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—Purchasers of Philippine tobacco hereafter will have a Government guarantee as to its quality and cleanliness, as a result of an arrangement made by the Bureau of Insular Affairs, with the Philippine government.

Every package imported into the United States will be stamped with a certificate indicating the quality of the material used and workmanship. The arrangement was made to ensure strict compliance with the new Philippine tariff law.
