Albert Augustus Pope was born at Bos-ton in 1842. He left this position at the out-break of the Civil War, enlisting in the Home Guarda, and moon being appointed a Captain. In August, 1862, he was ap-pointed to the Massachusetts Infantry as Lieutenant, and for bravery on the field a Laeutenant, and for bravery on the head nt Freederickshurg, Knoxville and other engagements was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel. At the close of the war he entered the wholesale shoe-finding business, remaining

in this until 1877, when he founded the Pope Manufacturing Company, to make small patented articles. In 1878 he introaman patented articles. In loss he intro-duced the bicycle manufacturing industry to the United States. His company soon became a leader in this line, and later absorbed many others in a trade agree-ment, and also taking up the manufacture of automobiles of automobiles.

He founded The Wheelman, in the inter-He founded The Wheelman, in the inter-ests of cycling and good roads, and ran the magazine until it was absorbed by Outing. Mr. Pope was a leader in the good roads movement, a prominent worker in civic and state affairs, and was a member of many clubs and socie-tles. He gave largely to charity, found-ing the Pope Dispensary for Women and Children in Boston. ren in Boston

He was married in 1871 to Miss Abby Linder, of Newton, Mass.
