Irrigation Congress Buries the Hatchet on Last Day of Spokane Session.

TO MEET NEXT AT PUEBLO

Resolutions Commend Forestry and Reclamation Bureaus and Ask for \$10,000,000 to Complete Proposed Projects.

tion commending the Newell and Pinchot administration of the bureau of reclamation and forestry were general, not even mentioning the chiefs of these divisions.

\$10,000,000 Sum Is Asked.

An annual appropriation of \$10,000,000 for a period of five years to aid irrigation work in arid and semi-arid regions...

That the government take measures to drain swamp lands in aid of land reclamation and of public health.

That there be brought about surveys and estimates of reclamation of submerged lands where the work is international in character.

That the states pass laws regulating cutting of public and private timber.

That there should be no political lines with reference to the use of water for irrigation.

That the Mississippi deep waterway be developed.

The committee turned down the resolution asking a \$10,000,000 bond issue, after a debate in which some of the Washington delegation upheld the measure.

Colonel Martin, representing the deep waterway project before the congress in the absence of W. K. Kavanaugh, president of the Lakes-to-Gulf Deep Waterways Association. He gave an outline proposed 14-foot main trunk waterway.

John T. Matthews was also a speaker on the subject of waterways. The afternoon session was devoted to address by Governor of the states of Florida, South Dakota, Idaho, Washington, Nebraska and Montana.

Governors Make Addresses. Governor Shallenberger, of Nebraska, made a stirring appeal for the conservation of resources which was greeted with continued applause.

Governor Gilchrist, of Florida, gained the confidence of the congress by an appeal for the abolishment of Mason and Dixon line by the designation of the South as a "sleeping giant now awake."

Governor Brady, of Idaho, commended both Secretary Ballinger and Gifford Pinchot and urged that oil be poured down the troubled waters in the interests of the general Western good.

Governors Vesoy, of South Dakota, and Norris of Montana, thanked the congress for its activities.

General Fielvion, formerly of Kruger's army in the Transvaal, represented Governor Curry, of New Mexico. All remaining traces of the Gifford Pinchot hostilities disappeared on the last day of the congress with perhaps a mention now and then by some kindly disposed speaker.

Unless a discussion should arise tomorrow, the congress will be considered adjourned.

Lyman's Words Convincing. The deep waterways for the inland Empire was the subject of the address of Professor W. D. Lyman.

Various projects for the removal of obstacles to navigation in the upper Colorado and its tributaries were discussed in detail by Mr. Lyman, who dismissed this topic by saying:

"It may be asserted that at moderate cost with locks at two points in British Columbia and four in our own country, with some improvements at a half-dozen rapids, the Columbia could be navigated over its whole course of fourteen hundred miles.

"As to expense, it may suffice to say that it is entirely within the bounds of reason, and that direct pecuniary gain would outrun the outlay many times over in the course of a generation. Let us see where a little figuring would lead us. If of \$500,000 bushels of wheat harvested in the inland empire this season, it is likely that 25,000,000 bushels will be shipped to tide-water. With an average reduction of 4 cents on 35,000,000 bushels, due to water competition, we shall reach a saving on wheat alone of \$1,000,000 a year. Three years' saving in shipping rates would probably pay for all improvements contemplated on the entire river with its chief tributaries.

"First, hammer away without ceasing at congressmen, cabinet, president, and all in authority to adopt the general policy of \$2,000,000 by bond issue to be used in the next 10 years for river and harbor work; second, hammer even harder at the specific purpose of getting the Canal Zone by continuing contracts in the next three years. Let the press speak with multitudinous might. Let popular agencies of all sorts convey the people's policy to the lawmakers. If these forces are brought to bear, our waterway work will be done soon, done well, done to stay, and done for public good."

THE BAROMETRIC REPORT. PORTLAND, Aug. 13.—Maximum temperature, 81 degrees, minimum, 58. River reading at 9 A. M., 8.9 feet; change in last 24 hours, fall 0.3 foot. Total rainfall, 5 P. M. to 5 P. M., 1.11; total since September 1, 1909, 25.53 inches; normal, 24.71 inches; deficiency, 8.78 inches. Total salinity, August 12, 3 hours 15 minutes possible; in 12 hours 18 minutes. Barometer reduced to sea level, at 2 P. M., 29.82 inches.

WEATHER CONDITIONS. The barometer continues to slowly fall with the New England high and the pressure this evening is relatively high of

the North California coast and relatively low over British Columbia. Light rain has fallen along the North Washington coast and has occurred elsewhere in the Rocky Mountain States on the Pacific Slope. It is much warmer in the interior of Western Oregon and slightly warmer in the Sound country.

The conditions are favorable for showers Saturday in Northwest Washington and in extreme Northwest Oregon. It will be cooler in the interior of Western Oregon and Western Washington.
