

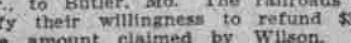

Flathead Prizewinner Jumped
\$1350 Ball at Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 23.—(Special.)—Joseph Furey, of Warsaw, Ind., who drew claim No. 1 in the Flathead land drawing, was formerly a resident of this city and jumped ball for \$1350 several years ago. He was accused of being party to buncoing an old man named White out of \$30.
