AGONY ENDURED BY SHIPWRECKED

Death Carries Off All but Five of 22 Cast on Desolate Reef.

SURVIVORS ARE SKELETONS

Captain and Mate of Errol Drown and Captain's Wife Drowns Herself and Children in Fear of Cannibalism.

VICTORIA, Aug. 24.—Few more tragic tales of the sea are on record than that brought by the steamer Akaroa, this morning from Australia of the wreck of the Norwegian bark Errol, which struck Middleton Reef June 18, and of the sufferings and the tragedies of the survivors briefly reported by cable. Five remained of the 22 when the Tofu took them off, so emaciated from thirst and starvation that they had to be carried.

The five survivors were too far gone to talk much of their sufferings. Patrick Palmer, an American who joined the ship at Coquimbo, said:

"Five of us got away on a raft. We went all over the reef in search of water, but found none, and one of the party died on the reef. We had some difficulty in building the raft and the captain and second mate both got drowned. The captain's wife stood within a few feet of him and she saw him drown as she stood there wringing her hands. She had her four children, from a baby one year old to the 8-year-old girl, standing beside her.

No Water, Live on Shellfish. "We thought we would be able to find water on the reef and save the lives of those we had left on the wreck, but those sailing directions lie. They said there was water there, a life-boat and food, and there was no food and no life-boat. He died; he fell down on the reef and dropped his head on his chest. He was lucky. There was another wreck on the reef and we thought it was a store-ship. We boarded it, but found nothing to eat. It was musty, old and all it held was a bottle with about two gills of water.

that must have been there for years by the horrible taste of it. I and the carpenter drank it. We afterwards found some more water and, although it was bad, we drank it. We then decided to build a punt from the wreckage, and while we were working at this we lived on shellfish.

Drowns to Escape Being Eaten.

Another survivor took up the story. He said that when the sufferers were sitting on the sand the captain's wife thought they were considering cannibalism and she asked them not to eat her children. Her mind had gone. Suddenly she ran into the sea and drowned her four children, following them into the sea.

When relief finally came there were but five—four men and a boy. And these were so exhausted that three had to be carried by the rescuers.

The steamer Tofu was bound from the islands to Sydney and when two wrecks were seen at Middleton Reef, where formerly there had been but one, the steamer bore in and sent boats ashore, one being met by the punt built by the survivors, who hysterically seized the jugs of weakened brandy and beef tea passed to them.

ROADS LET CAR ORDERS

Howard Elliott Predicts Rapid Development for Oregon.

ABERDEEN, Wash., Aug. 24.—In an address before Aberdeen business men, who had asked better train service to Aberdeen and Grays Harbor, Howard Elliott, president of the Northern Pacific, said he predicted that the next two years would be the "hardest years in the history of railroading in the Northwest," and that the next 30 years would witness greater railroad development in Oregon and Washington than any one now dreamed of. He said that the next few years would be years of great prosperity here, both in railroad and country are now well on the road to recovery from the panic of 1907, which he insisted had been chiefly caused by attacks on railroads and obstructive legislation.

John D. and Preacher Beaten.

CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 24.—John D. Hoyt, a well-known lawyer, was yesterday in putting Dr. W. C. Bittling, his former New York pastor, now of St. Louis, to what the oil king calls the "fire test of the links." The pastor outpointed him in a golf match over the Forest Hill course in which the two, as partners, were defeated seven strokes by Captain Levy Scofield, of Cleveland, and J. S. Sweeney, of Detroit.
