Mrs. Barciay Ready to Put Up Hard Fight for "Incubator Baby.'

CHILD IN COURT'S HANDS

Abductors Must Stay in Jail Until Friday, When Court Will Pass on Habeas Corpus Proceedings Brought by Them.

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 25 .- James Bar-Stella Barclay, arrived here tonight to help his wife in her fight for the possession of little Marian Bleakley, the kidnaped "incubator baby." Mrs. Barclay and Detective James Gentry, of Kansas City, will have until August 30 to prepare arguments in their habeas corpus case whereby they hope to avoid being returned to Topeka for trial as kidnapers.

Governor Hadley next Friday will give Mrs. Barclay and Gentry a rehearing in the Kansas extradition proceedings. If he decides to recall the requisition papers the kidnapers will go free, but the baby still will be under the court's orders.

Mrs. Barclay and Gentry are going to try to get bonds. They are not pleased at the prospect of staying in jall until August 30.

Child in Court's Care.

Marian was today placed temporarily in the custody of the clerk of the Juvenile Court of Kansas City. ceedings on the docket today, both brought by Mrs. Barclay. One sought to prevent Mrs. Barclay and J. N. Gentry from being returned to Topeka for trial. The second sought to prevent baby Marian from being turned to the custody of Mrs. Bleakley, whom the State Supreme Court has declared is the legal mother. Today's proceedings, though brief, were fraught with much interest and were partici-pated in by the greatly-sought 5-yearold child and the two women have been so strenuously fighting for

During the progress of the proceedings today Marian nestled in the lap of Mrs. Bleakley, who sat just in front of the judge's bench. ### SLAYER IS TO PAY PENALTY

Hezekiah Barnes Must Hang for Killing Ann M. Aldrich.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 25.—(Special.)

The State Supreme Court today affirmed the conviction of Hezekiah Barnes, who is under sentence of death for the murder of Ann M. Aldrich, of Walla Walla, May 1. 1908. The appeal was based chiefly on the contention Barnes had been twice placed in jeopardy because the jury in the first trial had been dismissed by Judge Brents. This appeal point is held to be without merit. The record here shows the judge dismissed the jury after it had been out 41 hours because the jurymen asked questions which the court said "are none of your pusiness." The jury agreed Barnes had killed the woman, but wanted to know what his punishment would be if they found he had been insane when he committed the crime.

bis this season.

ASTORIA. Or., Aug. 25.—With the salmon fishing and packing on the Columbia River this year notoriously short, the heads of the industry are naturally rather indisposed to quote any figures whatever.
