DRAW HOURS ARE URGED

MAYOR ASKS CO-OPERATION OF MAJOR M'INDOE.

U. S. Engineer Is Requested to Forward Resolution on Bridges to Department.

Mayor Simon has forwarded to Major Melndoe, in charge of the United States engineering corps at Portland, resolutions from the Port of Portland and City Council and endorsement by County Judge Webster, in an effort to secure regulation of the draws on the bridges spanning the Willamette River so that they will not be opened during rush hours morning and evening. The Mayor has also secured a communication, requesting the Major to transmit the combined sets of resolutions and requests to the Secretary of War at Washington, asking for an order favorable to the proposed regulations.

No Doubt but First-Class Type Will Be Chosen, Says Mayor.

"There is no doubt that the bids will be able to select from one of the bids submitted a first-class crematory," said Mayor Simon yesterday when asked as to the probable outcome of the proposals submitted by various concerns last week, and which were discussed at length Wednesday night by the Mayor and Board of Health at the City Hall. It seems certain that Portland will soon have a garbage destructor which will in a measure take care of the largest amount of the city's refuse. The present one is conceded to be entirely out of date and inadequate.
