How TO DEAL WITH GAS IN WEILIS.--Edward Rogers, a farmer who has lived 23 years just southwest of Portland, on the Shaituck road, suggests a few sim-ple but practical methods by which per-sons who have been prostrated by gases in wells caused by the discharge of dy-mentic may be perford and result with in wells caused by the discharge of dy-namine may be revived and rescued with-out endangering the Myes of others. "A great many lives," said Mr. Rogers, yes-terday, "have been Lost needlessly, simply because of a lack of knowledge, on the part of workman, of one or two-bert esthed by scholar webb have on the part of workmen, of one or two simple methods by which men who have been overcome by poisonous gases caused by the discharge of powder may be rescued. The method to which I re-fer are simply these: Lower a candle or a lamp into the well after the blast has gone off, and if the light does not go out, it may be depended that there is no gas. If a man has gone down and has become asphysiated, throw several buckets of water into the well, and on the man, and it will clear the well of gas and revive the man. This method is surely far better than to send a surely far better than to send a rescuer down, who may in turn be over-come and lose his life. I consider it strange that this idea has not been pub-lished before. I have been intending for 20 years to write to The Oregonian con-cerning the matter."



MAYOR ASKS CO-OPERATION OF MAJOR M'INDOE.

DRAW HOURS ARE URGED

U. S. Engineer Is Requested to Forward Resolution on Bridges to Department.

Mayor Simon has forwarded to Major McIndoe, in charge of the United States McIndoe, in charge of the United States engineering corps at Portland, resolu-tions from the Port of Portland and City Council and indorsement by County Judge Webster, in an effort to secure regulation of the draws on the bridges spanning the Willamette River so that they will not be opened during rush fours morning and evening. The Mayor in-closed a communication, requesting the Major to transmit the combined sets of resolutions and request to the Securetary resolutions and requests to the Secretary of War at Washington, asking for an order favorable to the proposed regula-

order favorable to the proposed legulations.
The Mayor has now done all in his power to secure the relief so greatly needed, in having the draws closed from 7:15 to 7:45 A. M., and from 5:30 to 6:30 P. M. If the Secretary of War will sign an order, authorizing this regulation. It can be put into effect soon. He is the supreme authority on the subject, and upon his action depends the final result. The resolution passed by the Port of Portland Commission joins with Mayor Joseph Simon in advocating that the draw bridges in the city be kept closed during the rush hours of the morning and evening when traffic is congested. The resolution advocated that no boats be permitted to whistle for the opening of the draws from 6:30 to 7. A. M. and after that they will be closed again from 7.15 to 7:45 A. M. after which boats will be permitted to pass through the draws.

be permitted to pass through the draws. A full hour during which the draws should be closed is advocated for the evening, the time set being from 5:30 to 6:30 P. M.


