A fellow reporter, who had accompanied Wilson, intervened at the outset of the altercation with the result that the reporter scaped disfigurement.

Wilson had called Bailey a liar. Bailey retaliated by seizing the newspaper man by the throat and throwing him across the lounge where he held him for several moments, at the same time administering a severe tongue-Further hostilities were then

abandoned.

Under assignment from the paper on which he was employed, Wilson had written two news articles in which Bailey was charged with falling to make proper inspection of dairies in the vicinity of Portland, from which it was alleged a great deal of impure milk was being served patrons. The specific charge was made that although the Dairy Commissioner had been notithe Dairy Commissioner had been noti-fied that the dairy herd of Henry Rolfes on the Cornell Road, was diseased, that official had taken no steps to prevent the further sale of milk from the infected animals.

"Wilson came to my office about 4 o'clock this afternoom," said Mr. Balley, "and among other things asked me if I still contended that no person could contract tuberculosis from drinking tubercular milk. I replied that I did not think it probable. He then produced a number of authorities to which he requested my attention. 
