## CHILDREN IN PLANS

Boys and Girls May See and Hear President.

## BOARD EXPECTED TO ACT

If Arrangements Can Be Made, Taft Will Be Asked to Address Juvenile Population in Park Block Near Armory.

Mayor Simon favors a feature for the visit of President Taft, Saturday, October 2, which will include all of the school children of Portland, and City Superintendent Rigler, of the school department, says that if certain difficulties can be overcome he would be glad to have such an arrangement made. The Mayor will take up this matter with the committee on arrangements at the next meeting, and it is probable that it will be indorsed and then taken before the Board of Education for discussion.

"I think it would be a very delightful thing to have the school children see the President and hear him talk," said Mayor Simon, yesterday, "and I will take up this feature with the committee on arrangements at the next meeting. To my mind this will furnish one of the very foremost attractions, and will please both the President and the children."

"I have had no time in which to consider the matter," said City Superintendent Rigler, "but I realize at a glance that, if some obstacles that present themselves can be overcome, it would be a great thing to arrange to have the children participate in the President's reception while here. It will be Saturday, when school is not in session, and it would necessitate a great deal of transportation; there is also the question of a suitable place to be considered, and other things which must be talked over before such a feature as this could be indorsed by the Board of Education. However, I am in favor of such a plan, if it can be worked out, and will be glad to do anything I can to help it along."

There was no further word from Secretary Carpenter from Beverly yesterday, indicating that the tentative programme telegraphed by Mayor Simon is satisfactory to the President. This includes a public address at the Armory in the afternoon of Saturday, and banquet at night. It was thought that perhaps some arrangement might be made to have the school children participate in the afternoon meeting, and that they might be en-

## GOSPEL CAR IS COMING

Catholic Church on Wheels Will Be Here for Short Visit.

The chapel car "St. Anthony," the only Catholic Church on wheels in the United States, will arrive in this city over the O. R. & N. at 6 o'clock tonight. It will remain in this city Sunday and Monday, proceeding to Seattle Tuesday morning for a few days at the Fair. The car is in charge of Rev. A. P. Landry, as chaplain, and other officers of the Catholic Church Extension Society.

The car is constructed on the same general plan as a Pullman, being provided with a chapel and accommodations for the officers of the society by which it is owned. It is the gift of Ambrose Petri, president of the Commercial Securities Company of New York. The car is designed for missionary work in sections of the country where churches are few or widely separated.

## OFFERS JAIL SPACE

Webster Would Have City Use Rooms in Courthouse.

## WILL SAVE BIG EXPENSE

Mayor Simon Favors Plan and Action Will Be Taken When Councilman Lombard Returns From Los Angeles.

The city is in a good way to save the cost of a quarter block and the expense of a big building in which to house the Police Department, Municipal Court, Emergency Hospital and Jail. County Judge Webster has for several days been in consultation with Mayor Simon, and has tendered to him for the municipality the use of all necessary room for these purposes in the Courthouse now being erected for Multnomah County, and is not particular whether the city pays anything in return for this, since the people of Portland pay nearly all of the taxes of the county.

Mayor Simon is highly pleased with the offer, but is waiting until Councilman Lombard returns from Los Angeles before he makes a final reply to Judge Webster. Mr. Lombard is chairman of the health and police committee, which has charge of this business, and it is the desire of the Mayor to turn it over to Mr. Lombard for consideration. It can be said, however, that the Mayor is favorable to such an arrangement if the city can have the necessary room and facilities for carrying on its work in the county building.
