

DEATH RESULTS FROM AUTO RACE

One Man Killed, One Dying of injuries Caused by Collision of Cars.

GASOLINE BURNS DRIVER

Race of 24 Hours at Brighton Beach Begins With Fatality and Disasters to Cars—Goerks Wins on Motorcycle.

BRIGHTON BEACH, N. Y., Aug. 27.—One dead and one dying was the result of the 24-hour automobile race tonight soon after it started. Louis Cole, mechanic of the Stearns car, was instantly killed and Laurent Gross, the driver, had his back broken in the collision of their car with the Acme car. Paschke and Maynard, the crew of the Acme, were only slightly injured.

Driver's Clothes Burnt Off. Driver Hughes, of the Allen-Kingston, was seriously burned by his clothes catching fire from a blaze which started near his gasoline tank. Another driver killed Hughes in the sand, while the mechanic smothered the flames.
