AUTO HONK FATAL

Aged Woman Drops Dead Through Sheer Fright.

CAR 200 FEET BEHIND HER

Mrs. Mary Wrightman, 74 years Old, Collapses as She Crosses Street on Way Home.

Death Instant.

Aged, feeble and constantly in fear of her life at the hands of speed maniacs, Mrs. Mary Wrightman, 74 years old, dropped dead of fright yesterday morning upon hearing an automobile approach behind her.

Carrying a watermelon, a burden for one of her years, her view of the street blocked by a sunbonnet she wore, the aged woman's fear of passing automobiles was enhanced and the honk of a machine approaching 200 feet away was directly responsible for her death.

Mrs. Wrightman was on the way to her home at 122 East Thirty-fifth street, about 50 feet from the intersection of that thoroughfare with Morrison street, when her death through sheer fright occurred. Occupants of the machine, whose names were not ascertained by the police, reported that the aged woman after hearing the warning of the automobile on Morrison street, half turned about, bobbed feebly, dropped the watermelon and fell.

The car was stopped and the two men occupants jumped out and carried the woman into a nearby residence. A physician summoned pronounced her dead, saying death was instant and due to sudden heart failure.

George Wrightman, a son, with whom Mrs. Wrightman lived, said his mother frequently expressed fear of death by being run down by an automobile. This fear, he said, was produced by reports of numerous fatalities and accidents attributed to reckless speeding in Portland of late. She was also afflicted with heart trouble. This coupled with fright caused her sudden death.

Mrs. Wrightman had lived in Portland six years, coming here from her native country—Canada. She was born in Colborne, Ontario, July 27, 1835. Her husband died 27 years ago.

She is survived by her son, George, with whom she lived; Mrs. John Densen and Mrs. W. E. Smith, daughters, of Portland, and Dr. A. E. Wrightman, of Silverton, Or.

The funeral will be held Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, from Sunnyside Methodist Church and interment will be made in Rose City cemetery.

EVANS CANNOT COME HERE

Wells-Fargo President Would Live Here If Possible.

Friends of Colonel Dudley Evans, the genial president of the Wells-Fargo & Company Express, who had hoped there might be truth in the rumor that he would make his stay in Portland permanent by transferring his headquarters here, will be sorry to learn there is nothing in the report. At the Hotel Port-

land last night, Colonel Evans said that much as he liked the city, such a thing would be impracticable and hardly possible.

All the other express companies have their head offices there, and we all have to keep in touch with each other in a business way to a certain extent that would be impossible to do in any other city."

"It has been 30 years or more since I left the office here. When I was stationed in this city, I established offices for our company in many other Northwest towns. Portland has grown wonderfully since that day."

"During the past year, there has been a notable increase in our business here. This is true generally of most of the Northwest cities, though there are a few

HIGHEST IS 77 DEGREES

Weather, However, Is Oppressive With Warm Wind.

With a maximum temperature yesterday of only 77 degrees, the weather was extremely oppressive. M. the thermometer stood at 64 degrees and there was a gradual increase until 3 o'clock. During the next three hours the temperature remained stationary.

FOREST FIRES WANE

Unfavorable Winds Slacking, Critical Stage Is Past.

FEW HOUSES DESTROYED

Blaze Fighters Able to Rest, Although Force Still Stands Guard.

Springwater Division Blaze the Most Severe.

The forest fire situation in the vicinity of Portland has passed the serious stage, and, owing to the falling away of the winds prevailing Saturday, the fire-fighters have the flames well under control. Many blazes, which started Saturday, burned over a large tract of timber, brush and undergrowth but as far as learned no houses were destroyed with the exception of bunkhouses at the Pulfer-Shay-Potter mill east of Boring. The burned district lies along the Estacada line from near Boring to Lents Junction, thence along the Springwater division of the Estacada line almost to the Golf Links.

The fires are still smoldering and it may be some time before the air is cleared of the dense smoke, unless a rain gives relief. On the other hand, winds such as prevailed Saturday will make the situation critical again with the redeeming feature that the worst of the loose brush has now burned away and little of this remains as fuel for the flames.

Yesterday the fire-fighters were able to rest after their labor of Saturday night when they worked nearly all night in an effort to save their homes and lands from devastation by the flames. Small squads were kept on hand, however, watching the flames to prevent them from spreading.

Springwater Division Worst.

The worst fire was that along the Springwater division of the Estacada line. Here the blaze extended even west of Stanley and ran back half a mile south of the carline. The flames extended at this point on both sides of the tracks although north of the tracks the fire was well under control. A long tract near Witchita was burned, the flame-swept area extending clear to Bell and covering a tract of about 100 acres. Not much valuable timber was burned although in many places the fire approached dangerously near the dwellings. This section of the fire was practically under control yesterday afternoon although a number of owners of adjoining tracts were still on hand looking after their property.

Along the regular Estacada line beyond Lents Junction, the fire was still burning yesterday but no further damage was feared. Here the fire belt is not as wide as that closer the city but it burned a much heavier class of timber. The fire began near Linneman station south of the tracks, continued west to Wilson where it burned up to the railway right of way and was at its worst south of Sycamore, where a tract of about 50 acres was burned clean. The fire also did considerable damage south of Gilbert and Gates.

Of the fires, not yet under control, is one which started yesterday morning near Frank Heiney's sawmill, located

about 2 1/2 miles south of Linneman. The fire burned all around the mill but the force of fighters managed to drive the flames away from the buildings.

Campers to Blame.

Another fire, started by careless campers, broke out yesterday morning on Johnson creek near Linneman but being in light timber it is not liable to spread to the valuable trees. A fire which broke out at Boring, about a quarter of a mile north of the town, yesterday morning, is still burning but a big force of fighting it. The fire which started Saturday is now under control. The Pulfer-Shay-Potter mill was saved by the fire-fighters and its big tract of timber was also partially saved by the fire being stopped in its mad rush toward Boring. M. B. Green, manager of the mill, attributes the saving of the mill to the efforts of the Japanese woodcutters who turned out in force to quell the flames.

Small fires were also burning yesterday near Estacada although chiefly in the undergrowth and not in the heavier timber. All along the line the fires were burning and smoldering but the fact that the air was still yesterday gave the fighters a respite and a chance to get the upper hand of the flames to hold them within the limits devastated yesterday morning.

Other fires burned over the undergrowth in the direction of Troutdale but the damage there was chiefly in cord-wood. Cut wood has been one of the heaviest losses in all the fires of the last two days and will run into many thousands of dollars. Around Lents the flames amounted to little save those to the south in the neighborhood of Witchita and Bell where a large tract was burned. These fires, however, did not threaten Lents as the winds favored the thickly settled neighborhood around Mount Scott and Lents.

DR. F. A. GOELTZ VISITS

Physician Who Discovered Theoracoma

Bronchotomy Is Portland Guest.

Dr. F. A. Goeltz, of Erie, Pa., famous for his discovery of the Theoracoma Bronchotomy operation, has been in Portland several days, a guest of Dr. William M. Campbell. Dr. Campbell and Dr. Goeltz were students together and passed the first two years of practice in the same hospital. Dr. Goeltz is visiting surgeon of the Hamot Hospital in his home city.

The discovery of the Theoracoma Bronchotomy operation was the subject of an article in the Annals of Medicine recently. The operation is said to have revolutionized the ancient theory of removing articles from the bronchial organs of children when the ordinary method of extraction through the trachea failed.

"Dr. Campbell has about induced me to move to Portland and after the pleasant time I have spent here, I am almost convinced to move here," said Dr. Goeltz.

Dedication to Be Held Sunday.

The Dr. McLoughlin Home, lately removed to the park in Oregon City, will be dedicated with appropriate ceremonies next Sunday afternoon. The exercises on the day will also commemorate the 32d anniversary of Dr. McLoughlin's death. Addresses will be made by Frederick V. Holman, of Portland, well known as the biographer of Dr. McLoughlin; P. H. Darcy, of Salem, and Dr. W. E. Carll, Mayor of Oregon City. An attractive program of vocal and instrumental numbers has been arranged.

MISSING GIRL SAFE

Foster Child of Portland Couple Goes to Her Mother.

MARIE COOPER IS LOCATED

Lass Objecting to Sleeping in Cradle, Say Neighbors, Ran Away.

She Is With Parent in Los Angeles.

Miss Marie Cooper, the 15-year-old foster child of Mr. and Mrs. Fred W. Cooper, of Fulton, supposed to have been kidnapped, has been located by Detective Hawley. She is with her own mother, Mrs. Fred Jones, in Los Angeles. The girl's real name is Miss Lillian Kahler, the difference between her name and her mother's being explained by her mother's marriage to a wealthy Californian since the death of the child's father.

According to Detective Hawley the girl was adopted by the Coopers while they were living in Michigan, seven years ago. The mother went to court to obtain possession of her child, but testimony against her character was introduced, and she failed to win the fight, which was then taken to the higher courts. The battle lasted for several years, the Coopers, in the meantime moving from place to place to keep their whereabouts unknown to the girl's mother. At one time they were living in Florida. It is said, and later went to Seattle, coming to Portland from the Sound.

Mrs. Jones located her daughter here and succeeded in getting into communication with her. The woman has two children, Lillian's brother being four years her senior. The lad wrote his sister, and it was arranged that he was to pay her a short visit in Portland. After the visit the girl mysteriously disappeared.

A week ago last Saturday she went to meet her brother. Her foster parents, the Coopers, believed she was going to Montavilla to take her music lesson. "But I won't go if you can't trust me," she is said to have told them. This remark worked to perfection. Once free, the girl transferred from the Fulton car to an Oregon Electric car for Salem, this line passing near her home in Fulton. At Salem she met her mother, Mrs. Jones, and together they went to the Southern California city.

It appears the Coopers lost the papers giving them possession of the girl and it is said they have sent to Michigan for duplicates. If the custody of the child becomes an issue in the local juvenile court or in California, the child being more than 14 years old, will be allowed to choose her own guardian, and as she thinks more of her mother than of the Coopers it is probable she will remain with the former.

The girl's foster father conducts a small restaurant at 227 Macdonald road, Fulton. Neighbors say he intends to go at once to Los Angeles, to fight for the possession of the child.

For a time it was thought that Miss Kahler had gone to Castle Rock, with her schoolteacher friend, Miss Pearl Reynolds. Miss Reynolds was at one time in Cooper's employ, and became well-

acquainted with Miss Kahler. The schoolteacher left a week ago today for Castle Rock, her home. She had been in Portland about three months.

To her, Miss Kahler is said to have volunteered the information that she intended to run away. A Fulton rumor states the girl objected to sleeping in a cradle which, despite her age, is said to have been provided for her by her foster-parents.
