

EARL GREY GETS LOST IN FOREST

Canada's Governor-General Has Narrow Escape in Fall Over Precipice.

EXHAUSTED WHEN FOUND

Lady Grey Shoots 250-Pound Bear at Headwaters of Nip Nimpkish River in Wilds of British Columbia—Party Starts Home.

VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 30.—Earl Grey, Governor-General of Canada, who returned here from Dawson and Skagway by the government steamer Quadra today, had a narrow escape from death when lost in the woods of the Nip Nimpkish river and a half hour on Saturday, August 28, when on a shooting expedition without companions, other than his dog.
