Market for the 1909 Crop Will Soon Open.

INQUIRY FROM LONDON

Condition of the English Crop and Latest Estimates—Result of Irrigation in the Yakima Valley.

Hop-picking is now under way in every hop-growing county in the state. In a few yards where picking started first, baling is being done.

It is likely that before next week is far advanced, actual transaction in new baled hops will be recorded.

No change in prospects since our last. We do not alter our estimate of crop (240,000 cwt.). Market dull, prices unchanged.

"California crop looking as last reported. Estimate crop at 60,000 to 70,000 bales."

Hop-picking was completed yesterday in the Sacramento, Tuolumne and Yuba sections of California.
