

ORCHESTRA CALLS FOR MORE MONEY

Musicians in Orpheum Theater at Spokane Go Out on Strike.

UNION IS BACKING MOVE

Demand for Higher Wage Scale May Affect Circuit All Over Northwest—Strike May Spread to Other Theaters.

SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 5.—(Special.)—Eight musicians of the Orpheum, the Spokane theater of the circuit embracing very large city on the Pacific Coast, struck today for higher pay. It is the opening of a battle, the trumpets of which may be heard from Salt Lake to Portland and from Los Angeles to Victoria. For the new scale may apply everywhere. The musicians are acting on the advice of their union and are backed in their demands by the Theatrical Mechanics' Association of the Northwest, which recently held a convention in Seattle. The mechanics, or stage hands, employed at the Orpheum threaten to strike tomorrow if the demands of the musicians are not complied with.

Comedian Employs New Stunts.

Tonight the comedian who depends on the bass drum to punctuate his falls or exchanges of airy pirouettes with the orchestra leader is compelled to interject new stunts and lines, for the single musician present, a man who has been steadily engaged this afternoon, has all he can do to play straight music. The scale paid the musicians up to the time the discord arose has been \$20 for the common garden variety of musician, and \$35 for the man who plays the violin and jokes with the teams behind the footlights. This applies to the Orpheum, styled "high-class vaudeville."

The demand is for a \$5 increase all round.

Other Theaters Join in Demand.

At the Pantages and the Washington variety theaters, where the admission is cheaper and the shows are given, the scale against two in the Orpheum, the present scale is \$27 and \$30, and as soon as the contracts with these theaters expire a demand will be made for a \$3 advance all round. Both these theaters have their regular music this evening.

The stage hands will hold a special meeting tomorrow, even if it is Labor day, for there is a chance to strike and no holiday will be permitted to block such a rare opportunity.

SUMMER SERVICE TO END

Only One Train to Newport After Next Tuesday.

ALBANY, Or., Sept. 5.—(Special.)—The summer schedule of two trains each day on the Corvallis & Eastern Railroad from Albany to Yacoma to handle the crowds of visitors to Newport and the Nye Creek beach, will be discontinued next Tuesday and the winter schedule of one daily train each way substituted. The schedule of trains on the east end of the line, extending from Albany into the Cascade Mountains, and of the local trains from Albany to Corvallis, connecting the east and west end lines of the Southern Pacific, will remain practically the same. The eastbound Corvallis & Eastern trains will run to Hoover hereafter instead of to Newport. Hoover is four miles beyond Newport, and the track to that point has been in use for many years, but only when trips were necessary for lumber. Hoover has been the regular eastern terminus, but the regular run is extended to Hoover, the actual terminus of the line, by the new schedule.

The complete new schedule of the Corvallis & Eastern Railroad, which will go into effect next Tuesday, is as follows: Train No. 1, Yacoma to Albany, arrives 11:55 A. M.; No. 2, Albany to Yacoma, leaves 12:35 P. M.; No. 3, Albany to Hoover, leaves 7:30 A. M.; No. 4, Hoover to Albany, arrives 5:55 A. M.; No. 5, Albany to Corvallis, leaves 7:30 A. M.; No. 6, Albany to Corvallis, arrives 10:10 A. M.; No. 7, Albany to Corvallis, leaves 11:55 A. M.; No. 8, Albany to Corvallis, arrives 6:00 P. M.; No. 9, Albany to Corvallis, leaves 7:30 P. M.; No. 10, Corvallis to Albany, arrives 11:55 A. M., Sundays only.

PRIMARY WORK FEATURED

Teachers' Institute Opens at Kelso September 9.

KELSO, Wash., Sept. 5.—(Special.)—The teachers' institute for Cowlitz County, which is to be held at Kelso, September 9 to 11, promises to be an exceptional one. Among the instructors prominent in the Northwest educational circles are J. H. Ackerman, Superintendent of Public Instruction in Oregon; Professor N. D. Showalter, County Superintendent of Whitman County; Miss Nellie A. Sherwood, primary work supervisor in the State Normal at Cheney; and Ben A. Johnson, director of manual training in the public schools of Seattle. Special emphasis will be placed this year on the primary work and discussion of manual training possibilities. Miss Carrie E. Roberts is Superintendent of Cowlitz County Schools.

MANY TO ATTEND SCHOOL

Largely Increased Enrollment at Eugene Is Forecasted.

EUGENE, Or., Sept. 5.—(Special.)—Institutions point to a greatly increased attendance in the schools of the city, which

open during the present month. This increase will affect every grade of the public schools up to and including the State University, as well as the other institutions of learning located in Eugene. Besides the University of Oregon, Eugene has the Bible University, the Eugene Business College, the Modern School of Business, the Academy of the Sacred Heart, the Eugene High School and the following grade schools: Central, Gary, Patterson, Condon and Lincoln.

The University of Oregon will open its doors September 20, with an increased attendance over any previous year. The Eugene High School, which ranks next to the Portland High Schools in attendance, will open on the same day, with prospects of considerable increase. The graded schools will open on the same day with the largest number of pupils ever reporting for the first day's work. There will be two new schoolhouses ready for the children of the grades when the Fall term opens, the Condon school in Fairmount and the Lincoln school in West Eugene. These two new schools have been built and equipped at an expense of some \$50,000.

The Eugene Business College opened September 1 with a record-breaking attendance. On September 1 the Modern School of Business, a new institution for Eugene, will open its doors. Parents with their children are returning daily from their vacations and the holidays about the city are being rapidly filled up by the families who are coming into the city for the school here. Instructors are returning to the University of Oregon, and students are beginning to come in. The football boys, numbering about 30, will be here by September 10 to take the annual camping trip up the McKenzie River.

U'REN VERBALLY LASHED

J. D. STEVENS ALSO GRILLS SENATOR BOURNE.

Scathing denunciation of United States Senator Bourne and W. S. U'Ren, the Clackamas County "lawgiver," characterized the address of J. D. Stevens, in Marlin Hall, first and Stark streets, last night. "Oregon's Freak Legislation and Freak Legislation," was the subject of the address which was delivered under the auspices of a local branch of the Socialist party.

"If direct legislation in Oregon had accomplished nothing more than the election of Jonathan Bourne to the United States Senate it would have nothing for which to commend itself," declared Mr. Stevens.

"Possessed with the power to make laws, the people of Oregon have gone wild. They have enacted law after law without determining whether the enforcement of such statutes would prove beneficial to the interests of the people. What is the result? W. S. U'Ren, of Oregon City, now proposes to submit to the people a bill establishing an entirely new system of state government. Its provisions contemplate that the people shall elect only two state officers. One of them, the Governor, is to be charged with the absolute right to appoint all other state officials and boards."

"This law undoubtedly is proposed in the interest of the corporations who certainly would find it easier to own and control one Governor than probably 100 men who now have a voice in administering the affairs of the state. It is a foolish, infamous, ridiculous and unworkable measure, keeping both politically and socially with the record of U'Ren."

"This same measure which U'Ren now proposes to submit to the voters of Oregon under the name of initiative and referendum would be rejected even by the people of Russia. It amounts to an outrageous proposal beyond sane comprehension by any man having the welfare of his state at heart."

In discussing his subject, Mr. Stevens selected as his text one of Socrates' maxims, "Avoid Excess." He charged that the people of the United States are governed altogether too much and said that the people of Oregon came in for more than their share of legislation. The assertion was made that the measure would be rejected even by the people of Russia. It amounts to an outrageous proposal beyond sane comprehension by any man having the welfare of his state at heart."

Graves in View Near By.

Grouped about the house on the broad lawn of the city park was an audience of several hundred people, who listened to the address of Frederick V. Holman, president of the State Historical Society; B. H. D'Arcy, of Salem, vice-president of the Oregon Pioneer Association; Rev. Father Sherman, of St. Mary's, and the Rev. J. G. Stevenson, of Klamath Falls, mayor of Oregon City, presiding over the ceremonies, and his introductory remarks were happily chosen. The Oregon City Concert Band rendered patriotic selections.

Down in the churchyard of St. John's, only a few hundred feet away, the marble stones that mark the graves of Dr. John McLoughlin and his wife shone brilliantly in the afternoon sun, while above them rang out eloquent words of the man whose noble deeds in behalf of the Oregon country will live for countless generations.

Holman Recalls Dark Days.

Referring to the last 12 years of the life of Dr. McLoughlin, spent in Oregon City in the house that was dedicated this afternoon, Frederick V. Holman, the biographer of McLoughlin, spoke feelingly of the acts of injustice that embittered the declining years of the old doctor's life. Mr. Holman had his subject at his finger ends and his words were brief, but they were of intense interest. Mr. Holman said in part:

Happy was the original dedication of this house, clustering with charming memories of today. It was in it that Dr. McLoughlin suffered from deepening grief. He was the father of a family of 12 children, and some of those whose greed of gain outweighed their sense of duty, even religion, and justice. It was here that the poignant grief held him at times benumbed. It was here that his life was wrecked, and finally his great heart broke. It was here that he died. I shall not go into these details. They are matters of history. He was a man of great courage and public prominence, whose memories survive mostly through their unworthy actions towards him. That it was restored to his heirs by the State of Oregon is a matter of state pride to every true Oregonian. It was an act which appeals to the right feeling of every lover of justice and humanity. It was an official acknowledgment of the debt of gratitude of his services in securing the early immigration, and of what he had done for Oregon, and what Oregon owed to him. It is to be regretted that the dark days of his last years were not brightened by his act of justice. His memory has now come into its own.

MURDER TRIAL NEAR

Young Robbins to Face Hood River Court Tuesday.

FATHER MAY BE WITNESS

Prosecution Relies on Chain of Circumstantial Evidence—Defense May Try to Blame Relative for Mrs. Castoe's Death.

HOOD RIVER, Or., Sept. 5.—(Special.)—All Hood River is on the anxious seat over the approaching trial of young George Robbins, who is accused of the brutal murder of Mrs. Emma Castoe in his father's shack the afternoon of June 25. The case has been set for next Tuesday, and predictions are rife that considerable difficulty will be encountered in securing a verdict. The murder of the aged woman has been the principal topic in Hood River for the last two months, and, as interest in the case waned, the subject was revived by the short-lived escape of young Robbins from jail at The Dalles.

A rumor was current that the prosecution's main witness, Mrs. Mary Anderson, of Portland, had disappeared, but this is denied by Sheriff Morris. He states all the witnesses summoned by the grand jury will be on hand to testify, as well as others whose knowledge of the movements of young Robbins on the day of the murder was not imparted to the authorities until after the grand jury had ordered the alleged murderer held for trial.

It is hoped to convict Robbins, based entirely on circumstantial evidence, the prosecution, it is believed, will make William Robbins, father of the prisoner, one of the principal witnesses against his son. Robbins, Sr., admitted to District Attorney Wilson and others that his son, George, had a penchant for lying. This statement by the father and the sworn assertion by the prisoner himself that everyone who testified against him at his preliminary examination fabricated will, it is thought, be emphasized by the prosecution. Several witnesses who testified against Robbins in the preliminary examination are old-time and respected citizens of Hood River.
