SHE HOISTS BROOM

Cruiser Tennessee Breaks Pacific Speed Record.

TWO SHIPS BREAK DOWN

Colorado Bursts Steampipe and Scalds Two Men to Death—West Virginia Stops for Repairs and Drops Behind.

HONOLULU, Sept. 10.—The Pacific fleet, comprising eight of the fastest

cruisers in the American Navy, which left San Francisco last Sunday afternoon under Rear-Admiral Uriel Sebree for a five months' cruise in Oriental waters, arrived here at 11 o'clock this morning with the exception of the Colorado and West Virginia, which were delayed by accidents to their machinery.

Two Men Scalded to Death.

During a burst of speed on Wednesday, a steamship burst aboard the Colorado, scalding to death two men in the coal bunkers. The dead are L. M. Lepetaki, an ordinary seaman, and C. P. McDermott, a coal-passer.

West Virginia Drops Behind.

The breaking of the piston ring on the cylinder made it necessary for the West Virginia to fall out and stop for repairs. She made a splendid sport, cutting through the water at 19 1/2 knots for 24 hours, and succeeded in catching the fleet. The work of feeding the furnaces to keep steam in the boilers at a pressure

sure that made this speed possible proved too much for the crew, however, and the cruiser was compelled to drop behind. At 11 o'clock this morning the West Virginia was 30 miles behind the rest of the fleet and the Colorado was still 50 miles off port.

BUILDING IS ON INCREASE

August Figures Show Large Gain. Portland Stands High.

CHICAGO, Sept. 10.—Unusual activity in building operations throughout the United States during the month of August is indicated in the report published in the Construction News today. According to this authority, a remarkable increase of 34 per cent in building operations is recorded during the month compared with the corresponding time last year. In the 50 largest cities of the country, permits were taken out last month for the construction of 15,351 buildings, involving a total estimated cost of \$53,150,011.

SUE CASH REGISTER TRUST

Ohio Would Revoke the Charter of Money Machine Firm.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Sept. 10.—Attorney-General Denman brought quo warranto proceedings against the National Cash Register Company, at Dayton, Ohio, asking that it may be ousted from its charter, that a receiver be appointed and that its assets be distributed among the stockholders. The petition alleges illegal restraint of trade, combinations to prevent competition, and manipulation of funds in the carrying out of alleged unlawful business enterprises.

Murder Theory Replaces Suicide.

MILWAUKEE, Sept. 10.—What the police at first supposed to be the suicide of Mrs. Ward E. Hedger, at her home here last night, is now believed to have been a murder. Mrs. Hedger's body was found with a bullet wound in the head, evidently from a revolver fired at close range.

BIG EXCURSION PLANNED

REALTY BOARD WILL GO ON TRIP TO LAURELHURST.

Two Special Cars and 40 Automobiles Will Convey Guests to View Proposed Improvements.

In two special streetcars and from 25 to 40 automobiles loaded chockfull and overflowing with jolly real estate men and their guests, the Portland Realty Board will celebrate its second big "get acquainted" excursion of the season this afternoon with a trip to Laurelhurst.

Promptly at 2:30 o'clock the two special cars which have been chartered for the occasion by the excursion committee of the board will leave the spur switch at Fourth and Yamhill streets for the new suburb. Anybody can go on the cars who can find room, and each car will seat 40 persons comfortably. The Realty Board has announced it is making this excursion for the benefit of the public as much as anything else, and everybody who cares to go along will be genuinely welcomed. It will not cost a cent for carriage either. The committee has attempted to all that.

In addition to these electric cars, 25 automobiles have already been placed at the service of the real estate men, and there may be 40 of them by this afternoon. The members of the board will ride to Laurelhurst in these autos in regular parade formation.

At Laurelhurst they will be received by a special reception committee, headed by J. B. Melkie as master of ceremonies, and Frank F. Mead, vice-president of the Laurelhurst Improvement Association. They will follow an informal programme. The visitors will be taken all over the tract, which was formerly known as the Ladd farm, and shown the various improvements that have been made and are contemplated. Then Tom Richardson, of the Commercial Club, will start things with a few words, and following him C. K. Henry will speak. J. B. Melkie, who was formerly secretary of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce, will make a short address on "Portland and Its Possibilities."

MINING CONGRESS TO MEET

Many Topics to Be Considered at Goldfield Session.

GOLDFIELD, Nev., Sept. 10.—The United States, Canada and Mexico will be represented by about 2000 delegates to the American Mining Congress, which will hold its 12th annual session in this city September 27 to October 2. Twenty-five political subdivisions of this country, including Alaska, will have representatives.

One of the most important subjects to be taken up will be that of the proposed National Bureau of Mines. The revision of mining laws, mining accidents, increased use of silver, mine inspection, fraudulent mine promotions, smelting rates and the conservation of mineral resources will be the subjects of papers and addresses.

MARRIAGES NOT RECORDED

Spokane Auditor Can't Collect Necessary Fees.

SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 10.—(Special to The Spokesman.) Clerk Cal Atkinson can ascertain to whom he is to look for the fee of \$1. allowed by law for the recording of marriage certificates, no more will be recorded. That is the announcement made by the County Clerk today. Since the new marriage license law went into effect, on August 24, reducing the fee collected by the Auditor to \$2, no one has seen fit to pay the Clerk for recording. He has put upon record 12 certificates, issued since the new law went into effect, but not being able to collect a fee, he has been holding up all the others, and now has on hand 46 certificates.

SAYS HE PAID BRIBES

CHICAGO SALOONMAN TELLS OF MONEY PAID TO POLICE.

Gave McCann \$20 From Each House With Red Lights—Woman Pays \$250 to Escape Jail.

CHICAGO, Sept. 10.—Payment of bribe money to Edward McCann while he was inspector of police at the Desplaines-street station, for the protection of illegal establishments, was testified to at McCann's trial by Louis Frank, a member of the saloon firm of Frank Bros., and one of the principal witnesses for the state. Frank testified that he first met McCann in the inspector's office in March, 1908, through Police Sergeant Charles Hawkins, and that later the inspector sent for him. He said the inspector asked

him to collect money which the proprietors of illegal establishments would bring to him.

"They were to pay me \$20 from each house," said Frank.

"Did you ever pay McCann this graft money elsewhere than at the station?"

"Yes, at his home. I went with Max Plummer. Some water was arrested, charged with pandering. I went to the inspector's room and told him that Plummer wanted him to fix it up so the woman would not be sent to prison. McCann told me it would cost \$50 if he did. I went out and told Plummer what the inspector had said, and Plummer said he could only pay \$20. I went and told McCann. He agreed, and I got the money from Plummer."

Sergeant Mulvihill, stationed at the Desplaines-street station, testified that when McCann took charge of that station, in 1908, he assigned Mulvihill to keep a record of all disreputable establishments in the district. His duty, he said, was to call on the inmates what was expected of them. When he had completed a list of the inmates of each place he made a report to McCann.
