

PORTLAND'S SHOW DRAWS BIG CROWD

Good Card Offered on Second Day of Stock Fair at Country Club.

MANY AWARDS ARE MADE

Judges Finish With Cattle, Sheep and Swine and Oregon Animals' Capture Honors in Numerous Cases.

An attendance of 7000 people, a most successful racing card in which Oregon and other Northwest horses shared largely in the honors, and completion of the bulk of the judging of show stock, marked the second day of the annual Portland Fair and Livestock Exposition yesterday.

The increased attendance that developed with the second day made it plain that success is in store for the big show. The first two days show a total attendance of 9000. The fair officials believe that now the programme is well under way and the weather seems more inclined to behave, the day of the show is not far off.

Throngs Visit Stock Stables. The long line of big show stables were well attended throughout the day. All adjourned to the exhibit places following the races while hundreds arrived late in the afternoon to view the blooded stock.

Lively Night Programme. The night programme proved a lively one, and fully 2000 people were glad they remained for the exhibition of broncho-busting in the illuminated arena.
