

CLERICAL STANDARDS SET UP, SAYS TAFT

Executive in Bracing Air of Rockies, Crosses Mountains by Moonlight.

MAKES ONE SHORT SPEECH

At Colorado Springs Refers to Prosperity Now in Nation and Sounds Warning That High Ideals Established He Not Lost.

PRESIDENT TAFT IN COLORADO.

Wednesday. Colorado Springs. Pueblo. Thursday. Montrose. Grand Junction.

PUEBLO, Colo., Sept. 22.—President Taft is crossing the continental divide and tomorrow morning will find himself west of the Rocky Mountains. All day the President has traveled with the panorama of white-capped peaks of the Rockies in view and at one time the train was for a mile or more through fields of snow. Tennessee Pass carries the Chief Magistrate to an altitude of 10,500 feet, nearly two miles above the sea.

For the first time the President is traveling to the West through the Royal Gorge of the Arkansas, where at one place the half-mile deep canyon is so narrow that the train is in sight of the river and the former has to be carried over the rushing stream by means of a hanging bridge, suspended by cables imbedded in the rock walls of the chasm.

Through Gorge by Moonlight. The 11-mile ride through the gorge was made by moonlight tonight, the President's train having left here at 8:45 P. M. and reaching the hanging bridge two hours later.

The President did not feel the effects of the altitude at all today and at the end of his first week of "one-night stands," he is in splendid health, despite the hospitality of the West and its elaborate and never-ending breakfasts, lunches and dinners.

Mr. Taft's voice is also in the best of condition. There was a little huskiness for a time, but it has about disappeared.

Taft Guest of Walsh.

Beginning the first of the two days of his Colorado tour, Mr. Taft motored 14 miles out of Denver to breakfast this morning at the home of Thomas F. Walsh, and at the request of the owner, re-christened as "Colonel," the estate heretofore known as "Welhurst."

Taking train at Welhurst, with an additional train filled with Colorado people as an escort, the President went to Colorado Springs, where he made a brief address in the public park to one of the largest crowds of the trip and then made a hurried automobile tour to points of scenic interest. From an eminence he overlooked the Garden of the Gods with the Rockies in the background and dark cumulous clouds playing tag with Pike's Peak.

From Colorado Springs the party came on to Pueblo, where the President left the train at the Mineral Palace Park and was driven at the head of a long procession of automobiles to the State Fair grounds, to face another exuberant throng and to make a brief extemporaneous speech in appreciation of the reception that Colorado has extended to him.

Ballinger Joins Party.

Secretary of the Interior Ballinger joined the Presidential party at Denver and will go through to Seattle with the President. He will assist Mr. Taft tomorrow afternoon in the formal opening of the Gunnison Tunnel at Montrose, Colo., the greatest irrigation project the Government has ever undertaken.

Mr. Taft announced today that he would not make his speech on the conservation of natural resources—the topic of supreme interest in the country through which he will pass during the next two weeks—until he reached Spokane, on September 28. It was at Spokane that the controversy between Mr. Ballinger and Chief Forester Pinchot became an issue. In his brief references he has made in his speeches so far, Mr. Taft has declared the reclamation work must go on, but that it must be done in conformity with the law and that no project will be undertaken until the money for the work is in hand.

Pinchot Not Commented Upon.

It was learned today that when President Taft wrote his letter to Secretary Ballinger, sustaining him in all that he has done as head of the Interior Department, he also wrote a letter to Mr. Pinchot. Further than to say that he had frequent correspondence with Mr. Pinchot and that they always have been the warmest friends, Mr. Taft will not further comment upon the matter.

The Presidential tour took on its first picturesque coloring of the West today when 23 sheriffs of Colorado counties, in the costumes of the plains, joined the party in a special car to act as a guard of honor to the President during his stay in the state.

Advances Must Continue.

Now, I think we have made great advances under this influence, but we must not stop. Such a policy cannot be brought to a successful conclusion by the administration of two or three. All that each one can say while he is responsible for his best efforts will be devoted to carrying out these policies, not only to devoting the government's attention, but also to encouraging the use of private capital and private effort in the same direction.

Grateful for Goodwill.

Now, my friends, I do not expect to make a speech. It was said that I would only say—"How do you do?" to the people; but we are so constituted in American political life that when a man says he would say "How do you do?" to the people, it has to go for a little while, and I have subjected you, therefore, to the tribulation of an American people in a political atmosphere, you are bound to undergo every time a political visit by you.

I wish to renew, in closing, my sincere gratitude for your cordial reception.

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U. S. Judge C. H. Hanford at Yakima Valley Celebration at A. Y. P. Scores System.

SEATTLE, Sept. 22.—The three counties of Washington which are situated in the Yakima Valley and which have been transformed from desert into rich farming land by irrigation celebrated their day at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition today. United States Senator Wesley L. Jones, of North Yakima, and United States District Judge Cornelius H. Hanford, who is largely interested in Eastern Washington irrigation projects, addressed a meeting in the Exposition Auditorium. Judge Hanford advocated the conservation policy advocated by Chief Forester Gifford Pinchot and ex-Governor George C. Pardee, of California, saying:

"We have heard told repeatedly by advocates of the 'big stick' policy that our court's proposed new system will not hurt the West, but will aid in the development of the natural resources of the region in which vast areas are reserved and to be reserved."

In our state the reservations comprise more than 27 per cent of the total area, into which the homesteader dares not set his foot. The water runs down our mountains and most of it flows idly to the sea without turning a wheel, but to prevent this here from acquiring vested rights the theorists insist that it must keep on flowing idly until it can be made to yield tribute to the National Treasury, as the agents of the Government shall dictate."

ROBT. HOE, INVENTOR, DIES

Pioneer Printing Press Manufacturer Passes While in London.

LONDON, Sept. 22.—Robert Hoe, 70 years of age, head of Robert Hoe & Co., printing press manufacturers of New York and London, died here today after a short illness.

Mr. Hoe had been in London several weeks on his annual business visit. He suffered from acute attack of kidney trouble ten days ago, and his death resulted.

Robert Hoe, while still a young man, succeeded his father, Robert H. Hoe, in the management of the printing press factory established by his grandfather, Robert, and achieved fame as the greatest of a family that had brought the mechanical art of printing to its present state of excellence.

When Robert Hoe entered the business, the "Hoe Cylinder," patented in 1844, was considered a marvel. His inventive genius, coupled with his administrative ability and the faculty of surrounding himself with efficient aides, developed the old "Hoe Cylinder" into the present wonderful double-textile and double-rotary presses. Robert Hoe was the inventor of color printing presses also.

Besides being the principal owner of the R. Hoe & Co., with large factories in New York and London, he was an extensive manufacturer of circular saws and saw-bits. He was one of the founders of the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

AEROPLANE UPSETS IN AIR

Flying Machine Does Tumble Act and Kills Aviator.

BOULOGNE, Sept. 22.—Captain Ferber, an officer of the French army, was killed near here this morning while testing an aeroplane. While in the air the machine turned over and then dashed to the ground. Captain Ferber was crushed to death by the motor.

Captain Louis Ferdinand Ferber had been detailed for several years to investigate aeronautics in the interest of the French army. He was at one time in charge of the extensive Government reservation at Belleville, near Paris, where the army conducted a series of experiments in aviation. He worked with the Lebaudy brothers, and the dirigible balloon La Patrie was an outcome of this co-operation. Captain Ferber's interest, however, turned quickly to the heavier-than-air machine, and he was a pioneer in this field.

MORO LANDMARK BURNED

Cherry Croft, Residence of J. B. Mowry, Destroyed by Fire.

MORO, Or., Sept. 22.—(Special.)—The residence of J. B. Mowry, better known as Cherry Croft, was destroyed by fire last night, between 8 and 10 o'clock. The cause of the fire is unknown, the blaze being well underway before discovered.

Conference of Managers Develops More Friendly Spirit—Additional Territory Demanded.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 22.—(Special.)—That the California State League (outlaw) may yet consider a proposition to enter organized baseball next season is evidenced by a conference that was held Tuesday night in Oakland, those present being J. Cal Ewing and E. M. Walker, of the Coast League; Cy Moreing, Jr., backbones of the Outlaws; Messrs. Moore and Douglas, of Stockton, and Frank Herman.

Although no steps were taken by those present, the situation was discussed, so it is said, with far more friendly spirit than was manifested last winter. It is declared also that the State League representatives are more inclined toward organized baseball than they were and that they could secure the same offer that was open to them in the winter, might be inclined to accept.

The conference, so Cal Ewing says, was arranged by a mutual friend of both sides, who came to him and asked him if he would be willing to meet with Moreing and his people, to talk over the situation.

It has been learned, ament the conference, that the Outlaws wanted territory that was first offered to them, which would include Stockton, Fresno, Sacramento and a club in Oakland.
