

TAMMANY BARKS HARD ON GAYNOR

Boss Murphy Believes Catholic Opposition Will Not Be Much in Evidence.

LAYS PLANS YEAR AHEAD

If Gaynor, as Is Hoped, Becomes Governor, President of Board of Aldermen, Who Will Be Good Tammany Men, Gets Place.

NEW YORK, Sept. 26.—(Special.)—The new boss Tammany but these days is Justice William J. Gaynor for Mayor. Charles F. Murphy has studied the matter over very carefully, and is convinced that any weakness Gaynor may possess is more than counterbalanced by his strength. In other words, Tammany Hall has received assurance that the Knights of Columbus will not be able to control the Catholic vote of Greater New York.

Murphy has confided to his intimates that the more he studies the Gaynor situation, the more he likes it. Of course, Gaynor is not the man whom Murphy would personally select, but here are the facts which appeal with great effect to the leader of Tammany Hall.

Regardless of what Mayor Gaynor might say or do, a Tammany victory would give the Wigwag control of the Board of Estimate, which has the giving out of \$200,000 in contracts, and that is a matter in which Murphy is personally interested.

Murphy Looks Year Ahead.

Under the city charter, when the Mayor dies, is removed or resigns, his successor is the duly elected President of the Board of Aldermen. Murphy is prepared to bring about the selection of a good Tammany man for that office, as he has reason to believe that Gaynor will never serve out his term. For Murphy is planning to bring about the nomination of the Judge for Governor next year, and he expects he would be elected.

So, briefly, it is Murphy's scheme to put up with Gaynor for one year, and hold his organization in line by telling them of the good times that will come when the man they do not want is promoted.

In conversation with a friend the other day, Murphy is quoted as having said the Brooklyn jurist would not lose 5000 Catholic votes, and adding, cynically, "We will more than make them up from the A. P. A."

Which goes to show that Mr. Murphy, as a practical politician, does not mean to allow religion to interfere with business.

"The whole fight against Gaynor," said a prominent Tammany leader, "is confined to the Knights of Columbus. Arrangements have been made which will reduce this bolt to a minimum. You will find before the campaign is over that Judge Gaynor is in thorough accord with the religious teaching of his youth. It is not necessary to say more at the present time."

Tammany Is Pleased.

Tammany men are convinced that the campaign is over, and they are thoroughly pleased with the outlook. Here is the view of one of the most prominent Tammany leaders, who finds it too great an exertion to think of more than one thing at a time.

"Well, at the present moment he has the Hudson-Fulton celebration, with his marvelous pageants, to keep him going. We will have Cook and Peary both here in a few days who will keep him busy enough to keep politics in the background until after the polls close. The organization does not care what they say or do, nor is it interested in the question as to which man discovered the North Pole. So long as they keep on talking, and stir the people up, we will be satisfied."

World Supports Gaynor.

It is known that Murphy is much impressed by the arguments that are made by the New York World. In Gaynor's favor. The World is the nearest approach to a Democratic paper there is in the Borough of Manhattan. It even supported Bryan last year, although it must be admitted it uttered loud cries while doing so. In a recent editorial the World says in part:

Next to the President of the United States the Mayor of New York is the most important elective officer in the country. The city's total annual expenditures are less than the total revenue of the Federal Government at the close of Hayes administration. Its gross wealth equals the interest-bearing National debt. Its assessed valuation represents one-fifth of the total estimated wealth of the United States. Measured by the qualifications and opportunities of the office, The World believes Judge Gaynor is better fitted for this work than any other man whose name has been seriously proposed. We have no extravagant theories about him. We do not regard him as a political miracle, but we believe he is capable of giving the city a strong, clean, vigorous administration. We think he is especially fitted for this work for that leadership of public opinion which is one of New York's greatest civic needs. Four years ago an independent candidate on an independent ticket came within 3000 votes of being elected Mayor of New York. There are probably more independent voters now than there were then—and New York needs a Mayor.

Danger in Independent.

This one thing of an independent nomination worries Murphy and his close advisers. They all remember how they laughed loudly at Hearst four years ago. At that time Hearst seemed to be a ridiculous candidate. And yet, with a little common sense displayed in his campaign, he would be sitting in the City Hall today.

Nobody is able to figure the size of the vote Gaynor would poll, as he is to run as an independent candidate. But every student of politics knows that the average voter is mighty sore on both of the old parties, and would be glad to give them a swat if it were possible to do so.

So Murphy figures he will be able to absorb the Independent vote, win the election, and have all the spoils after a brief year of partial reform.

And from what the map in the street can see, his ideas appear to be sound and founded upon common sense.

So the probabilities are that the next Democratic Majority candidate will be Justice Gaynor, and his success may mean that he will be in line for higher honors from his party.

And should he become Governor or even President, Murphy would only display a laudible interest. For a successful play leader of Tammany Hall is only concerned with what goes on in his own city.

CHANGES ARE FEW

Eberhart to Carry Out Policies of Johnson.

FRANK DAY RESIGNS

Late Governor's Private Secretary Will Return to Newspaper, but Gossip Has It He May Run for Office.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Sept. 26.—(Special.)—Few changes are liable to be made immediately in the administration of the affairs of the state of Minnesota.

Governor Eberhart says he will continue to carry on as far as possible the policies of the late Governor Johnson. Many of the Democratic Governor's appointees were Republicans, and they may hold over permanently.

Some of the Johnson men have said that they would resign. So far, however, Frank Day, Governor Johnson's private secretary and his political manager, alone has made a definite announcement. He will leave the office October 1. He says he is going back to his country newspaper, but he is likely to be back in the political strife a year hence, when Eberhart's time expires. He may groom a new Democratic candidate. It would not be surprising if he should be nominated for Governor himself.

To depart radically from some of Johnson's policies might prove dangerous in a state where his personal popularity was so remarkable, so whatever plans the Republicans may have in view they are proceeding slowly.

Mrs. Johnson is the sole heir of the late Governor's estate, which is valued at \$25,000. She has no relatives, and she probably will stay in St. Paul. There has been some talk of asking the next Legislature to provide for widows of Governors who shall have died in office.

RACES TO BE CHANGED

VANDERBILT CUP TO BE GIVEN IN STOCK CAR EVENTS.

Four Classes Will Be Made, to Run Over Distances of 135, 205 and 275 Miles.

NEW YORK, Sept. 26.—By a decision formulated this week by the Manufacturers' Contest Association, the Vanderbilt cup race will change in character to a stock car race, open to machines of even as low piston displacement as 161 cubic inches.

The races participating are to be divided into four classes, all of which will race over the same course and at the same time, but for different distances. The smaller cars will be required to cover a total of 135 miles, those next in power 205 miles and the rest, racing under one classification, 275 miles.

The races will be run October 30, over a new circuit comprising seven miles of open roads in Nassau County and five miles of cement roadway.

BRIDGE WILL BE LONG, QNE

Southern Pacific Structure at Lebanon to Cost \$100,000.

LEBANON, Or., Sept. 26.—(Special.)—The railroad bridge which will be built across the South Santiam River at Lebanon this Fall will be one of the longest bridges in this part of the state. The bridge proper will be 290 feet long, and there will be a trestle 300 feet long on the west end of the bridge.

Work on the big structure will begin tomorrow and the construction will be rushed by a big crew. The bridge will cross the river just above the big county wagon bridge. There will be two steel spans, each 150 feet long, resting on concrete piers. It is estimated that the bridge and trestle will cost about \$100,000.

The site of the structure is a splendid one, however, and its erection will stop the trouble the Woodburn-Natron line has experienced ever since its construction in crossing the South Santiam. The old bridge between Tallman and Crabtree has gone down or been seriously damaged almost every year since the road was built.

Knapp Starts for Coast
Chairman of Commerce Commission to Preside at Spokane.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.—Chairman Martin G. Knapp, of the Interstate Commerce Commission, left tonight for the Pacific Coast, where the commission is to hear a series of complaints affecting the traffic of the interstate commerce.

Chairman Knapp will go directly to Seattle, where he will join the other commissioners. The first series of cases will be heard at Spokane, beginning September 22.

Commissioner Franklin K. Lane, who is in Chicago attending a meeting of the commission of the National Association of Railway Commissioners will join the commission at Spokane this week.

MOTOR-CYCLE RECORD SET

Jack DeRosier Goes Five Miles in 5 Minutes 7 2-5 Seconds.

PASADENA, N. Y., Sept. 26.—Jack DeRosier, the world's champion, broke the five-mile motorcycle record at the Clifton stadium today. His time was 5 minutes 7 2-5 seconds.

Elmer Collins, of Boston, won the 5-mile motor-paced race, the first race of a series to decide the middle-distance championship of America, beating George Wiley and Peter Drubach.

TROOPS MAY BE CALLED

ALABAMA'S GOVERNOR IS FOR MILITANT PROHIBITION.

Sheriffs of State Protest Executive Goes Over Their Heads in Proposing Raids.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Sept. 26.—(Special.)—Because of a threat to go over their heads and enforce prohibition laws in the intense way he thinks he should, Governor B. B. Comer, head and front of the movement for constitutional prohibition, has brought down the wrath from many of the Sheriffs of the state.

The latest to enter a protest, and he does so in the papers not only of his home town but of larger cities, is the Sheriff of Decatur, who complains that the Governor has taken unwarranted liberty in demanding that he break up the sales of liquor at Decatur. The fact that the executive has the right to use military in raiding if he sees fit, and that under the new act Sheriffs may easily be impeached, adds to the feeling of resentment aroused.

The Governor is demanding action, however, and Sheriffs of larger cities will not feel surprised any day to see troops flocking to raid places.

APPLES GO BY TRAINLOAD

Wenatchee Will Ship Fine Fruit to England.

WENATCHEE, Wash., Sept. 26.—(Special.)—William Edmunds, a well known fruit-grower who will go to England next month with apples from the Wenatchee Valley, has received advice from that country that because of severe weather fruit is scarce and the demand is greater than anticipated. Mr. Edmunds is preparing to take two big trainloads of Wenatchee apples between October 20 and 25.

LOGGER'S SKULL CRACKED

Victim, in Serious Condition, Is Brought to Portland Hospital.

CASTLE ROCK, Wash., Sept. 26.—(Special.)—A logger, known only as "Big Jim," was badly if not fatally injured Friday, by a pullback line, which struck him in the head, knocking him some distance and rendering him unconscious. He was picked up and brought to this city and examined by a physician, who pronounced it a severe case of concussion of the brain, and ordered the victim taken to Portland at once, where he is now under treatment in a hospital.
