REV. C. T. HURD GOES TO NEWPORT.—Rev. Charles T. Hurd, who has been the pastor of the Anabel Presbyterian Church, in the Mount Scott district, for the past year, and a member of the Portland Presbytery, has accepted his resignation, and is expected to leave for a congregational meeting of the church last night. He has accepted a call to become pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Newport, Or., and will leave for his new pastorate during the coming week. Portland Presbytery, which meets in Portland Monday, is expected to act on his resignation and transfer Mr. Hurd to Newport. Rev. Mr. Hurd came to Portland from Corvallis one year ago, where he was connected with the State Epworth League as its president. Plans for choosing his successor at Anabel have not been considered.

FUNERAL OF A PIONEER WOMAN.—The funeral of Mrs. Agnes Foster, an Oregon pioneer of 1864, who died September 23 at the home of her daughter, Mrs. D. M. McLaughlin, 419 East Twenty-fourth street North, was held at this residence yesterday afternoon. Interment was in Lone Fir Cemetery. Mrs. Foster was born in Natchez, Miss., May 2, 1841, and came to Oregon across the plains in 1864. Her father and mother died while on the way and were buried at a point on the emigrant road which is now the town of Huntington. She had been a resident of Portland for 30 years, and beside her husband is survived by her two daughters, Mrs. McLaughlin and Mrs. Laura M. Rose, and one son, William R. Ladd. Members of Oregon Church, No. 12, Women of Woodcraft, of which Mrs. Foster had been a member, attended the funeral.

EVANGELIST BISHOP COMING.—Next Sunday morning and evening, at the First African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church, corner of Thirteenth and Main streets, Bishop J. S. Caldwell, of Philadelphia, will preach. The bishop is making an episcopal tour of the conference district, over which he presides, and he will visit the different churches in Oregon and California. He is known as the evangelist of the African Church. The public is invited. The hours of service will be 11 A. M. and 8 P. M. The church choir will sing the old-time gospel songs. Rev. W. W. SAVES HIS STOLEN BEES.—Charged with stealing nine swarms of bees and with taking his home out of Mrs. S. Kohler's stable in Hillsdale when he had not yet paid for the board of the animal, Albert Wachen, a saloon organ player, was arrested last night and placed in the County Jail, by Deputy Constable Klerman. Mrs. Kohler alleged that Wachen brought the horse to her a month ago and sold them for \$6 per month, with her at the rate of \$6 per month and that on Monday night he entered her barn without permission and took the animal away, together with the bees, which were her own personal property. Wachen was unable to supply bail and was locked up.

FIRST LATERALS IN BROOKLYN.—The first lateral in the Brooklyn sewer district will be laid in Ellsworth, Rhine, Karl, Rhine and East Twenty-eighth streets. For these streets the laterals are being advertised, and the aggregate cost will be more than \$5,000. But this is only the beginning. Hundreds of laterals will be laid as soon as the proceedings are completed and contracts let. In the Waverly-Richmond district it is announced that the laterals will be laid all together probably in one contract, as the petitions were filed in that form several months ago and delayed on account of the big conduit not having been accepted. Kentworth district is preparing to build many sewers. Two main conduits will be built on either side of Kentworth before the laterals. While the big tube will cost the whole district \$50,000, these laterals will probably cost much more in the aggregate. It will cost on an average of \$28 a lot for the main tube while the laterals will cost on an average of \$48 a lot. Then there will be the connections between the street and the house, which may cost from \$5 to \$20. Property owners in the Brooklyn district will have more than \$50,000 to pay in the next few months for sewerage.

IS IT HOT IN CHICAGO?—Rev. Andrew J. Montgomery, of the Third Presbyterian Church, who has accepted the call to the Oak Point Presbyterian Church, of Chicago, has been receiving congratulations from various quarters on what may be expected in the way of excessive heat in Summer and cold in Winter. However, Rev. A. D. Soper, who is in Chicago as assistant pastor in a large Presbyterian Church from Portland, wrote Mr. Montgomery a very encouraging letter in which he declared that the weather was neither excessively hot nor very cold at any time. This was the best information Mr. Montgomery had received from any source and he has been quoting Mr. Soper whenever any of his friends have asked him about Chicago's heat. He showed the letter to Rev. W. S. Holt, D. D., Pacific Coast Home Mission secretary, the other day, when Dr. Holt responded with emphasis, "Well, that beats me. If Brother Soper can lie like that after having been in Chicago only two years what effect will the weather have on you when you have been there several years?"

WILL BE MADE CITY STREET.—Williamette boulevard, now a county road, will be made a city street, between Morris street in Albina to the city limits at Willamette Acres, near St. John. J. W. Kertcham, F. J. Steinmetz and R. E. L. Simmons are the viewers. Williamette boulevard is the widest street on the Peninsula, and is part of the boulevard system laid out by the old Albina City Council. By a contract let by the old Council it was graded through to St. John, but it remained a county road and whatever grading has been done on it has been done by the county. By making it a street the city is given jurisdiction so it may be paved the full width, 100 feet. It follows the windings of the Willamette River for most of the distance to St. John, and is considered one of the most picturesque thoroughfares in the city. It also connects with all the other wide streets on the Peninsula. It is desired to have it improved with a hard-surface pavement in the Albina section, to be held for probably by a district assessment.

THE PORTLAND WOMEN'S UNION classes in chorus singing and in gymnastic dancing will begin the first week in October. The chorus will be led by Professor Boyer and classes will meet Thursday evenings, beginning October 7. The course will continue for ten weeks. The class in gymnastic dancing will be taught by Miss Lulu Hall and will meet Monday evenings, beginning October 4, and will continue for 12 weeks. FUNERAL OF J. W. HARTMAN.—The funeral of Joseph W. Hartman, who died September 27, was held Wednesday afternoon from Finley's chapel, and the interment was in Rose City Cemetery. Mr. Hartman had been a member of Multnomah, No. 7, Woodmen of the World, and leaves a widow, who is a daughter of Henry Magee, a prominent resident of McMinnville. Mr. Hartman was 31 years of age and was born in Belmont street, between East Nineteenth and East Twentieth streets, has been finished, but in its present condition is hardly passable for automobiles. GRIEF CAUSES HIS DEATH

B. F. Tyler Mourns Loss of Wife and Succumbs to Heart Failure.

Sorrow following the death of his wife, brought on an attack of heart trouble, which suddenly killed B. F. Tyler, a retired farmer, at Lenix yesterday, his death being just two weeks to the day after that of his wife. Tyler was nearly 70 years of age, and has lived in the vicinity of Portland for 30 years.

Although he had been complaining of not feeling well since his wife died, Tyler was walking about yesterday morning. While talking to a doctor on a business matter, he suddenly collapsed, and soon died.

While away from home attending a campmeeting recently, Tyler's wife contracted typhoid fever, and he brought about her death. Tyler leaves a daughter, Mrs. Edith Henderson, and two sons, Walter and Herbert Tyler, the former being a real estate dealer in Lenix.
