

PIERCE STUNNED BY SHOCK OF DEFEAT

Democrats Plan to Benefit by Disgust at Tacoma Over Choice of McCredie.

LANGHORNE IS THEIR MAN

Revenge May Be Taken on Jefferson by Aiding Removal of Custom-House—Ashton May Enter Race for Senator.

TACOMA, Wash., Sept. 30.—(Staff correspondence.)—Having gone to Olympia after assuring Tacoma voters that the nomination of Ashton for Congress was positively clinched, the leaders of the Pierce County delegation returned here to find a stunned and disgusted constituency.

Blame for defeat is laid at a dozen different doors and all manner of means are suggested for getting even. The soreness that exists throughout this city, however, is not directed so much toward Judge McCredie as it is toward the delegation and individual members thereof from the several counties that combined against Pierce.

Democrats Pick Tacoman. On the whole, while the bitterness of defeat is very strongly felt in Pierce County, there is no prospect at the present time that it will prove anything more than the usual after-convention soreness which will disappear before the day of election. The contest will be remembered for months to come, but will be shown in other ways than the knitting of the party ticket.

Attacks on McCredie.

Democrats and the more disgruntled of the Pierce County delegates have dubbed Judge McCredie "the Oregon Candidate" and throughout the campaign undoubtedly the chief effort of the Democrats will be to arouse the more or less latent envy of Portland and other cities by spreading the yarn that Judge McCredie's principal interests are in Portland and that he is only nominally a resident of Vancouver and the State of Washington. Tacoma has had special representation in Congress for so long a period, during six years of which both a Congressman and a Senator were from this city, that the loss is more keenly felt and the Democrats are at this time making strong claims of upsetting the Republican majority in the district as the result of the disaffection they suppose exists in the county which polls one-third of the votes in the State.

Aside from the declaration that McCredie is a Portland man and that his candidature is to be a Tacoma man, the Democrats have no argument to present with the idea of arousing Tacoma resentment against McCredie. The Clark County jurist received his nomination in fair convention fight. Stories have been spread in Tacoma that there was crooked work in the caucus held Tuesday night, but the record of the ballots does not bear out the charge.

Jockeying in Caucus.

The assertion is made that Finch on two different ballots had a majority of the caucus and that Harmon had a majority once, but that they were eulogized out of the caucus nomination by the presiding officers. At the time the three ballots in question were taken the voting was amid great confusion. Embarrasses were occurring from delegation to delegation and there was every evidence in the air of a break-up. Some of the delegations were casting their strength to different candidates on each ballot, but for the purpose of sparring and without any intention of bringing about a nomination. On three occasions this jockeying would have given a majority to the delegation had "stayed put." In each instance, before the votes could be totaled and announced, changes were announced that defeated a choice. It is an admitted parliamentary rule that a vote may be changed before the result of the ballot is announced. The secretary and the chairman apparently worked as rapidly as possible to give the result of each ballot, but were hampered by the confusion and disorder.

Pierce Blames Jefferson.

Pierce County blames Jefferson County for the defeat of Ashton and the anger among the Republicans centers on the Jefferson delegation with far greater force than it does on Judge McCredie. The predicted outcome is the loss of the Puget Sound customs office by Port Townsend. The Treasury Department for several years has favored, quietly at least, the removal of the Customs House to Seattle. Jefferson County, however, has always been a staunch ally in Pierce County, given not so much because Tacoma likes Port Townsend, but because it dislikes Seattle.

The Tacoma Chamber of Commerce in the past has come to Port Townsend's rescue and Cushman's prestige in Washington has served to keep the Customs House in its old place. Now, Tacoma declares the city will not turn a hand to keep Seattle from getting the prize and that McCredie, because of his newness on the job, will not be able to prevent the removal.

Finch Swung Delegation.

The Jefferson County delegation originally stood six for Finch and four for Ashton, but the delegation adopted the unite rule and the Finch majority swung all ten votes for the Ashton man. Finch's capture of the delegation was made due to lumbering influences, principally those of the old Ludlow mill. Representative Edward Sims was the leader of the delegation, while Representative William Bishop was out for Ashton. When Finch swung the Jefferson delegation over to McCredie, Bishop became disgusted and went home, refusing to attend the convention. The Ashton forces assert that, if Bishop had not laid his plans for running for the State Senate next year and had not feared trouble in his district, he would have been able to upset the caucus and would have done so through his influence with the Jefferson County delegates.

Planning to Get Even.

Pierce County is also aware that the McCredie combination was accomplished in part with the understanding that Clark County will do what it can to land a Cowlitz County man in the vacancy on the bench that will be caused by McCredie's resignation. "We are looking after that matter," declare Tacoma delegates, "and Cowlitz County will have to come to Tacoma before the Governor is seen." Tacoma, it

is promised by some, will be able to prevent the appointment of any man that may be decided upon by the McCredie combination.

Other Counties Satisfied.

Outside of Tacoma every other county that had an unsuccessful candidate proved a good loser. After the caucus Finch, of Aberdeen, told the Pierce County delegates that, although he felt that he had been double-crossed by individuals in some of the delegations, he would stand by the caucus movement to the last and would pledge every one of the 49 votes he could control in behalf of McCredie. Finch kept his word. Stewart, of Cowlitz, who was a strong possibility to the last, took defeat amiably and led in the hurrahing for McCredie. He even asked the privilege of paying the charge made by the hotel for the use of the dining-room, where the caucus was held. "I have had lots of fun and it was worth it," said Stewart. "I would rather see McCredie get it than myself," declared E. E. Beard, of Clark County. The Harmon men also accepted defeat philosophically. The Harmon men stuck so honorably to the agreement that they declined a definite offer of the entire Ashton forces for Harmon if they would break the caucus agreement. The offer meant certain nomination for Harmon if he had accepted it.

May Run Ashton for Senator.

One outcome of the convention proceedings is likely to be the entry of a Tacoma man in the race for the United States Senate that will come next year. A preference for United States Senator will be expressed by the direct primary method. The situation in King County promises to be complicated, with Senator Piles confronted by other aspirants in the person of John E. Humphreys, John L. Wilson and perhaps C. F. White. Under such conditions Tacoma men believe that Pierce County, as the second largest in Western Washington, will have a good chance of landing the place. Ashton for Senate is already talked in Tacoma, and with the possibility of Pierce presenting a candidate, Tacoma will undoubtedly see the advantage of supporting the Congressional ticket. Individually Ashton made a good impression on the southwest counties that encompassed his defeat, by the manner in which he accepted the situation.

In view of all the circumstances of the case, McCredie's election seems certain.

HAY'S MOVE POLITICAL?

WASHINGTON GOVERNOR SELLS HOME TO JUDGE TWOHY.

Report Declares He Will Make Seattle Home to Enter Senatorial Race to Succeed Piles.

SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 30.—(Special.)

—Is Governor Hay planning to take up his permanent residence west of the mountains, with a view to becoming a candidate for United States Senator to succeed Senator Piles, whose term expires in 1917? The sale of the Governor's home in this city is interpreted by many as being a confirmation of the report which was circulated some time ago on the Coast, that Governor Hay would move to Seattle and enter the race. The property, which has been sold to Judge Twohy, of the firm of Twohy Bros., was purchased by Mr. Hay about a year ago from W. T. Clark, of Wenatchee, for \$23,000. It is understood the price paid by Judge Twohy is in the neighborhood of \$40,000.

FIRST CAR IS CHEERED

Children Ride Free—Fairmount Residents Set Off Fireworks.

EUGENE, Or., Sept. 30.—(Special.)—The first street car was run over the Mees avenue line this evening. Manager Smith, of the Portland-Eugene and Astoria Railway announced a week ago that this would be done, but a few of the Fairmount people thought the work could be completed by this time. A crew worked all day Sunday and another crew worked last night to complete the task.

This evening a car was run over the cemetery line which has just been connected with the Mees avenue extension. The loop skirting the foothills south of Fairmount. As the car proceeded on its initial trip stops were made all along the line to give the children a free ride. Fireworks were set off by the Fairmount residents in celebration of the line.

REGISTRATION DATE FIXED

Attorney-General Holds Books Open June 1, Close October 15.

SALEM, Or., Sept. 30.—(Special.)

—Replying to a request from Representative Hawley, Attorney-General Crawford has rendered an opinion to the effect that under the new law registration will commence about June 1, 1910, and close about October 15. It is also held that petitions cannot be circulated and filed until after a candidate has registered, which cannot take place until on or after June 1. The completed petition must be filed at least 20 days before the primary election, to be held 45 days before the general election. The Attorney-General finds nothing in the corrupt practices act showing when a political campaign officially commences, and is of the opinion that in many cases it is continuous.

J. H. AKERS DIES AT DRAIN

Oldtime Resident of Junction City Passes Away.

DRAIN, Or., Sept. 30.—(Special.)—J. H. Akers, an aged citizen, died here today. He was born in Fulton County, Pa., April 15, 1827, where he lived until October 20, 1851. In the summer of 1853 he moved with his wife and child to the then unsettled prairies of Iowa and established a fine farm home where he resided 21 years. He moved to Oregon in the fall of 1874, and settled at Junction City, Lane County, where he lived 30 years. To be near his daughter and family he came to Drain five years ago. Mr. Akers had been almost blind for six years and was helpless from paralysis for many months. He was a member of the M. E. Church for 60 years. He leaves a widow, two daughters, Mrs. L. E. Edwards, of Drain, and Mrs. G. A. Young, of Redmond, Wash., and ten grandchildren.

DEMOCRATIC CALL IS OFF

Congressional Delegate Not to Be Picked Until October 2.

TACOMA, Sept. 30.—The Democrats have canceled the call for Congressional delegate convention and will hold a mass convention of the district at Olympia at 1 P. M., Saturday, October 2. This is necessary in order to file nominations in time.

McCREDIE'S SHOE TOWN IS EXHAUSTED

Vancouver, Elated Over His Nomination, Extends Most Hearty Welcome.

HE WILL STAY ON BENCH

Judge Not to Resign Until Outcome of Election Is Known—Smiles at "Oregon Candidate" Report—His Plans.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Sept. 30.—Greeted on every hand with the plaudits of the citizens of Vancouver, and deluged with telegrams of congratulation from all parts of the State of Washington, Judge McCredie the Republican nominee for Congress from the Second Washington district returned home like a conquering hero this morning. It is a momentous event in Vancouver's history to have one of her citizens chosen as the nominee for Congress, for such a nomination virtually assures election. Hitherto the nominee of this district generally hailed from Tacoma or some other northern point, and the selection of McCredie is a source of great joy to the southern counties of the State as well as to the citizens of Vancouver. It is looked upon as a signal victory, as Judge McCredie was to Olympia as chairman of the Clark County delegation and had entertained no idea of being a candidate. He really wanted to withdraw his name when it was presented before the caucus and received 90 votes as a starter. Several switches of delegations occurred thereafter and the Vancouver jurist was on the point of withdrawing his name when the Clark County delegation switched to the McCredie standard. Before the convention was aware of the drift of sentiment, McCredie had been tendered a required number of caucus votes to land him the nomination.

Public Reception Monday.

The Clark County delegation, immediately upon its return home, inaugurated plans for a public reception to be tendered Judge McCredie next Tuesday night at the Clark County hotel. The next morning Congressman from the Second Washington District will be the occasion for a great celebration.

Not since Washington has been a state has the Columbia River territory been recognized by a Representative in Congress. Some of the enthusiasm displayed over the nomination of McCredie is shown in the many telegrams of congratulation from all parts of the state received by him in the last two days. Among those who have telegraphed their congratulations are Senators Piles, A. G. Foster, ex-United States Senator from Washington, who wired McCredie from St. Paul; George H. Baker, United States Senator at Spokane; and W. H. Redpath, also of the Falls City, a candidate for Governor at the recent election; S. A. Madge, a politician of Olympia; E. W. Wright, of Henry E. McGinn, of Portland; and a host of others from various parts of the state.

Opposition Not Feared.

Judge McCredie does not take opposition very seriously, though he admits the two Tacoma men mentioned as possible opponents on the Democratic ticket are capable men and either would poll a large vote. However, he counts on the Republican majority, as well as the earnest work of his friends in the district to carry him through with flying colors. Judge McCredie announced that he would shortly start on a tour of the district for the purpose of getting acquainted with the rank and file of his constituency, and also that he would not resign from the Supreme Court bench until the result of the election is definitely known. In other words, Judge McCredie will retain his present office until November 2 at least. He stated he will not resign now, as he realizes that Governor Hay, who is not very well acquainted with the district, should have all the time he can possibly get to select a man for the judgeship.

Honor Was Not Sought.

"The whole thing came about so suddenly and so unexpectedly," said Judge McCredie last night "that I have hardly had time to realize that I am the candidate of the Republican party of the Second District for Congress. It is a great honor and what surprised me most was that it was entirely unsought. Some weeks ago a delegation of Vancouver citizens came on me with the request that my name be submitted as Clark County's candidate, but I declined the honor because I had my hands pretty well filled with court matters as well as my business interests. This latter (with a smile), as you know, is my interest in the Portland baseball clubs, and the name of Mr. Beard was chosen by the delegation, of which I was chairman. I do not believe they would call me the 'Canuck' candidate. My opponents may gain some prestige by the use of the term, but I doubt it, for the reason that the rank and file of the party, I think, realize that the southern portion of our great state is entitled to recognition after all these years."

Interested in the Columbia.

His residence in Vancouver, which is closely related to Portland in a business way, will not alter my allegiance to my state or my district, and I wish to assure all hands, whether residents of Tacoma, Aberdeen or Port Townsend, that my efforts, if elected to Congress, will be on behalf of the whole district and favoring no particular locality.

"Naturally all legislative matters pertaining to the development of the Columbia River will interest me considerably, for I should deem it my duty to further all improvements in that great waterway because of its being as much, if not more, a Washington stream than an Oregon one."

HARLIN RETIRES FROM RACE

Independent Candidate Says McCredie Is Right Man for Place.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Sept. 30.—(Special.)—Announcing that he believed Judge McCredie the proper man for the place, Thomas Harlin, of Oakville, who recently filed his petition with the Secretary of State as independent candidate for Congress, today formally withdrew his candidacy in favor of McCredie.

HOUSES HUNT SICK MAN

J. Addison Smith Sought in Canby and Aurora Woods.

OREGON CITY, Or., Sept. 30.—(Special.)—From 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon until 1:30 o'clock today, Constable Miles, Dr. T. C. Smith, Jr., of Salem, and a guard from the state penitentiary, two bloodhounds, searched the woods between Canby and Aurora for J. Addison Smith, who mysteriously disappeared a week ago from the Open Air Sanatorium at Milwaukie. Reports received by Dr. Smith indicated that his brother had been seen at Canby, but Constable Miles, who returned to Oregon City this afternoon, stated that the man bore no resemblance to the missing patient, except that he had a mustache. The suspect was located this morning at Aurora, and is merely a broken down wanderer, who spent last Tuesday night in the City Jail, having no visible means of support. Some of Mr. Smith's clothes were taken to Canby from the sanatorium and the bloodhounds were given the scent, but the chase was hopeless from the start.

PENDLETON JUDGE CLEARED

Land Office Exonerates H. J. Bean of Fraud Charge.

LA GRANDE, Or., Sept. 30.—(Special.)—In a decision handed down today by the officials of the local land office, Judge H. J. Bean, of Pendleton, was exonerated of the charges of fraud brought against him last Winter by the Government in connection with a desert land entry of 20 acres in Umatilla County.
