

TWO INDIANS SPOIL CLEAN RECORD OF NEZ PERCE.

One Confesses Series of Crimes Netting \$1000—Constable, Long-Haired Red Man Nabs Pair.

LEWISTON, Idaho, Sept. 30.—(Special.)—For the first time in the history of the Nez Perce tribe, two Indians have been arrested on a charge of burglary. One of the men in custody has confessed a series of burglaries in the Kootenai and Stites sections, which netted the operators more than \$1000 worth of blankets, guns and jewelry.

CANNON OUT, HE SAYS

CONGRESSMAN LENROOT PREDICTS HIS DOWNFALL.

Pointdexter to Be Leader, Declares Wisconsin Lawmaker—Tariff Schedule Breaks Pledge.

SPokane, Wash., Sept. 30.—(Special.)—"Joe Cannon will never again be Speaker of the House of Representatives," Congressman Miles Pointdexter is destined to be one of the foremost leaders in the lower House of Congress within the next three or four years. Inside of four years the insurgents will be in control in the House and the autocracy of Joe Cannon will be at an end.

Thus old Congressman Irvine L. Lenroot, of Wisconsin, expresses his own personal views and voice the sentiment of the so-called "insurgent party." Lenroot arrived in Spokane last night and was the guest of honor at a luncheon. "With respect to the new tariff schedule, I feel strongly that it is not in compliance with the pledges of the Republican party platform," he said.

INSPECTION RUINS PLANTS

Canadian Horticulturists File Protest Against Officials' Methods.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Sept. 30.—(Special.)—Horticulturists of Vancouver, Victoria and vicinity are so thoroughly indignant at the way they have been treated by provincial government officials that they are getting up a signed protest to the Department at Ottawa to protest against what they allege is wanton destruction of nursery stock consigned to them from outside points.

All ornamental nurseries and greenhouse stock entering this province has to be inspected and fumigated to guard against pests which may infect the plants. The complaints allege that after this fumigation has taken place the plants are passed to the Provincial Department, which detains them for some time, often as long as hundreds of dollars' worth of stock rot, is spoiled or condemned.

MAN FALLS OFF DOME

PORTLAND ELECTRICIAN MAY DIE OF INJURIES.

Al Newsom, Wiring Capitol at Salem, Topples Off Ledge—Wrists Broken, Skull Crushed.

SALEM, Or., Sept. 30.—(Special.)—Al Newsom, an electrician employed by the Pacific Electric Engineering Company, of Portland, while at work on the ledge at the base of the dome in the State House this afternoon, lost his footing and plunged head first to the third floor, 20 feet below. Both wrists were fractured and his skull crushed. His recovery is doubtful.

Newsom was working on the ledge 20 feet above the third floor and his brother-in-law, Howard Hale, was on the floor. Newsom called for a piece of wire, telling Hale to throw it to him. As Newsom reached for the wire he lost his balance and fell, striking on his head and hands. At 3:30 o'clock tonight the injured man was still unconscious.

Carpenter Takes Fatal Fall.

WHITE SALMON, Wash., Sept. 30.—(Special.)—Grasping only a piece of loosely nailed scantling when he missed his footing on top of a building on which he was working, Alonso Scout, a carpenter, fell 20 feet to the ground. He was picked

up unconscious, having suffered internal injuries from which he may not recover.
