Charley Graham's Senators from Sacramento and Walter McCredie's Portland bunch played the fastest game of the season on the Vaughn-street lot yesterday afternoon. It required only 1 hour and 15 minutes to complete the contest, which was won by the home club by the score of 3 to 2.

Al Carson was pitted against Jack Fitzgerald, and both twirlers worked in perfect form, all the runs being made in one inning, the fourth. Sacramento started the proceedings by putting two runs over, though one was all it should have had, for indifferent work in the fielding line contributed to the other tally. "Longshot" Myers, the new first sacker of the Senators, opened the inning with a safe hit. "Chick" Gandell, who now plays center field, popped out to Olson, and "Steeper" Flanagan shot one between Grady and Spies, which should have been good for only two bases. The relay from Spies to Olson carried over the latter's head, and Johnson, who had the sound, tossed badly to third. Myers had tallied on the hit and when Ote's toss escaped Carson, Flanagan also registered.

In Portland's half the home guard got busy with Fitzgerald. Grady opened with a single and Ote Johnson walked. Manager McCredie singled to center and Grady trotted home. Fieber sacrificed, advancing Johnson and McCredie, and when Ote flew out to Charley Doyle, Johnson beat the throw home. Spies singled to left and McCredie registered the third and winning run.

The cold weather was responsible for a small crowd, but it also caused the players to ginger up and play fast. Both teams tried to keep warm. Both teams were on edge all of the time, and the fielding stunts were snappy and well executed. The Senators present a somewhat stronger front than on their last appearance here, for this diminutive chap, Darringer, is a much better third baseman than was Jamieson, and Myers looks better at first than Gandell did. The latter is now where he belongs—in the outfield.

Among the entries in this division are Quaker Maid and Dorothea, Andrew Laidlaw's handsome pair from Spokane, which took first prize in the ladies' phaeton class at the last Madison Square Garden show.

Handsome, better pointed and eminently more valuable specimens of horse flesh many of them imported but recently from New York and England especially for the Portland show, constitute a large portion of the entries in the big social attraction which throws open its doors this afternoon, and will continue tomorrow and Saturday with daily matinees.

That the show will be a huge success is foretold by the largely increased number of entries as well as the many out of town entries. Yesterday the show ring presented the appearance of a regular show day programme, for the fancy stappers, bridle and saddle horses, traps, carriages and all things pertaining to horses and driving thronged the arena and formed a most interesting spectacle.

Ring Is Busy Scene.

A corps of assistants to Samuel E. Kramer, assistant to President Cronin, of the Portland Hunt Club, under the auspices of which organization the Horse Show is being held, were kept busy in arranging the decorations, and also in placing and removing barriers for the jumpers. The seating capacity of the big arena will be large, for extra seats are being installed in the galleries as well as on the main floor.

A large number of the representative members of Portland's social set visited the Oriental building yesterday, while they took a keen interest in the working of their own entries, many were heard to express praise of the handsome horses owned by out-of-town exhibitors, and were given a turn, about to become to familiarize them with the surroundings.

Credential, a 4-year-old colt owned by T. J. Smith, of Vancouver, B. C., and Fox Catcher, belonging to J. D. Farrell, of Seattle, were two of the most admired show horses worked out yesterday. Zombornt, the fancy stepper, a set of the famous Zombor, and owned by John Porter, of Porter Brothers, the railroad contractors, was another handsome animal to excite the envy of the spectators at yesterday's workouts. Zombornt is entered in several classes, and this is his first appearance on the track this season, his owner having placed him on the Northwest harness circuit.

A. J. Coffman's Belle Brandon, a handsome, sweet mare, which captured four prizes at the recent Seattle horse show, is another entry possessing so many fine points that she will undoubtedly take a few laurels here. Belle Brandon is a high-stepper of more than passing merit, and her owner is especially proud of his entry in view of the successes attained at the Seattle show.

Polo Match Each Day.

What is expected to prove a most interesting feature of the Portland show is the daily polo match to be played by officers of the United States Army from Vancouver Barracks. This sport is comparatively new to Portland, and the Army officers have volunteered their services to the horse show in the effort formally to introduce the game to Portland's society. Polo, when played properly, is a skilful as well as most invigorating exercise, and should become a fixture in annual sporting events.

A notable feature of the Portland show will be the champion jumping match between Credential and Fox Catcher, for these two horses are recognized as the best on the Coast. The superiority between them will be decided at the Portland show, and expert horsemen figure that better than seven feet will be the mark set by the winning animal. This event is one of the most exhilarating spectacles of a horse show, or of a cross-country ride, and to see the two best leaping specimens of horseflesh on the Coast in a championship competition will be the good fortune of the patrons of the Portland show.

The Indian, a seal brown gelding owned by Everett Q. Griggs, of Tacoma, who recently purchased the handsome horse for \$300 at New York, is another entry likely to make things interesting for the blue-ribbon brigade. At present this entry is a trifle green for show purposes, but careful handling may show him to advantage. At any rate the horse shows quality and by the time next season's show rolls around the Tacoma entry will prove a formidable competitor.

Miss Eleanor Laidlaw, of Spokane, has the Car and Searchlight, two of the best show horses in the Northwest, and both were driven about the arena and the

Lord Nelson and Lady Arva, a handsome chestnut pair of carriage horses, will again compete for the honors, while Highland Gaiety, last year's champion in the ladies' saddle and driving classes, will also appear in the Portland show. In addition, Miss Baker has a recent importation, Uarda, a five-gaited mare, of which great things are expected.

D. B. Frederick, of Seattle, will again be on hand with his prize winning collection of light and heavy harness horses, as well as a number of high-class draught animals.

This year's show is to be judged by John G. McDonnell, of New York, and Frank E. Alley, of Roseburg, both of whom are considered highly capable of the job.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Or., Oct. 6.—(Special.)—In the regular meeting of the student body of the university, held this morning, an amendment was proposed, restricting the voting on captains of the various athletic teams to the men who were entitled to "O" from playing during the year of each election. The constitution now permits all those who have competed in intercollegiate games to vote. The amendment is proposed in order to cut down the voters to the small number of men most vitally interested and thus do away with any electioneering.

After the student body meeting, the men of the freshmen class met and the suggestion of upper classmen elected a football supervisor, track manager and track captain, whose main duty will be to incite the freshmen to take part in these two branches of student enterprise. Barzile, of Portland, was elected football supervisor; Warner, of Pendleton, track manager, and Kuykendall, of Eugene, track captain.
