

TAFT SECLUDED IN SIERRA RETREAT

Rides Amid Inspiring Scenes of Yosemite Mountains, Looks Into Valley.

RESTS IN NATURE'S GLORY

Long Stage Journey Up Mountain Gives Glimpses of Wonderland of California — Greets Band of Children.

WAWONA, Cal., Oct. 7.—An all-day stage ride over 34 miles of mountain roads brought President Taft tonight to this lovely little Sierra retreat. Mr. Taft and his party reached the Wawona Hotel in their stages at 5 P. M., one hour after the scheduled time, due to the lingering in the Grouse Creek forest near Chinquapin, where the noon-day luncheon was served on improvised tables set down at the foot of a hundred towering pines.

The day ride from El Portal, which began at 7 A. M., included glimpses of Yosemite Valley, from Inspiration and Artist's Point, a pursuit of the tumbling waters of the Merced River into the valley floor and a winding, narrow climb to the crest of mountains 7000 feet high, which snout in the waters of the Yosemite. The day was bright, the air like crystal and everywhere was the exhilarating scent of pines. News that mountain lions were infesting the park held out hope of adventure for a time, but not even the tracks of one were seen on the road.

Enjoyable, Restful Day.

The President has declared that this was one of the most enjoyable days of his life. It was the first glimpse of the Yosemite and surroundings, and the freedom from speech-making all contributed to the pleasure of the first day of rousing it in the Sierras. This outing came just in time, for the President was pretty well tired out when he left San Francisco.

Mr. Taft's constant coach companion today was John Muir, the noted naturalist and explorer. Mr. Muir knows the Yosemite and he had ready answers for the innumerable questions the President put to him.

As he passed through the outskirts of the valley, the President was saluted by a grizzled old California pioneer, Galen Clark, the first white man to make known the existence of the giant sequoia trees which the President will see tomorrow. Mr. Clark is now over 80. He lives in the park and has asked that he be buried amid the trees and mountains he has known so long and so well.

Walks and Gets Appetite.

The President alighted from his stage during a portion of the trip and walked a mile or more up the mountain road. It gave him a splendid appetite for the picnic luncheon of fried chicken, potatoes, pie, fruit and jelly. At one point in the park where a change of stages was made the President was greeted by a band of little school children and school teachers with their

Tonight in the temporary "White House," into which one of the little hotels here had been converted, the President is being guarded, as he was last night at El Portal, by a detachment of cavalry.

The President tomorrow morning will go into the valley and see the big trees. He will spend Friday night at Glacier Point, or Sentinel Hotel, and return to El Portal Saturday. He will start early Sunday morning for Los Angeles, where he will arrive Monday morning.

BOY JAILED FOR MOTHER

Confesses Murder He Did Not Commit to Save Parent.

SIDNEY, Neb., Oct. 7.—Anton Krupnick was a wealthy farmer living a few miles from Sidney. On the night of June 29 he arose from his bed, sought a drink of water, and sat down at the kitchen table. While sitting there a bullet from a rifle was fired into his temple, producing almost instant death. His wife telephoned the Sheriff that robbers had entered the house, stolen \$500 and then killed her husband.

The money and rifle were found wrapped in Mrs. Krupnick's apron and buried near the stable. She was arrested, charged with the murder. Yesterday in court, Andrew, her 16-year-old son, testified that it was he and not his mother who shot his father. After the boy had been sentenced to imprisonment for life the case against the mother was dismissed. Then the boy told the Sheriff that he was not guilty, notwithstanding his confession.

CHINA IMPORTS BAD PORK

Oriental Ship Tuberculous Hog Carcasses to London.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—No fewer than 9 per cent of the carcasses of Chinese hogs recently imported into England, and thus far inspected by the sanitary commission of the city of London, have been found to be affected with tuberculosis.

The first shipment of 5000 hogs sold well in the wholesale market. Although they were offered by the retail butchers at 25 per cent below the prices charged for other imported hogs, they did not find favor with the public.

WIRELESS RECORD FALLS

Aerogram Sent 3300 Miles by Army Transport Buford.

HONOLULU, Oct. 7.—The Army transport Buford, which arrived from Manila yesterday, reports that wireless communication was established with the Pacific Coast four days before the vessel made this port.

This means that messages were interchanged over a distance of 3300 miles. The Buford is supposed to have the most powerful wireless equipment afloat in the Pacific Ocean.

IRISH COMING FOR MONEY

T. P. O'Connor Will Ask Americans to Contribute to Cause.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—T. P. O'Connor, M. P., will sail soon for the United States, at the request of John E. Redmond, the Irish leader, to explain the political

situation to the supporters of the Irish cause in America, and to appeal for funds to carry on the struggle for home rule.

The Nationalists regard the approaching general elections as one of the most critical periods in their history, and the full power of their organization will be utilized in helping the Liberals to deprive the House of Lords of the power to veto, which, they claim, is the sole remaining obstacle to home rule.

The Nationalist point of view is set forth in an appeal Mr. Redmond is forwarding to M. J. Ryan, of Philadelphia, which follows:

"A great crisis in the Irish struggle has arisen. The House of Lords is engaged at this moment in destroying the Irish land bill, with its promise of closing the land war of centuries and completing the restoration of all the land of Ireland to her people, and the banishing forever of misery and famine from the west of Ireland."

SEATTLE MISSES POINT

CAN'T SEE JOKE AND MAN WITH GROUCH IS ARRESTED.

Badges Announcing "To Hell With Seattle; I'm Going Home," Fall Flat at Fair.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 7.—(Special.)—"To hell with Seattle; I'm going home," is the message told in letters of black on silk ribbon badges which were on sale for a brief time yesterday at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition, or until Chief Wapenstein, of the A. Y. P. guards, confiscated the lot from the small boys who were selling them, and also caused the arrest of C. C. Chiman White, of Tacoma and Portland, the man who is accused of having authorized the badges to be distributed.

White is one of the exhibitors in the machinery building at the fair. The Tacoma-Portland man, it is said, departed from his usual custom of entering the grounds on an exhibitor's pass by purchasing a 50-cent admission at the gate on Exhibition day, September 18.

This entitled him to a prize, one of some 58,000 that were in the various exhibition places, but when he drew it he evidently was not satisfied. The grouch seed was planted and later bloomed into 2000 silk badges. Chief Wapenstein confiscated the lot and warned White against exhibiting his grouch in such a public manner.
