

HUSBANDS JOIN TO TRAP JOINT WIFE

No. 2 Lures Her From Portland to Oakland, Where No. 1 Charges Bigamy.

KEPT PRISONER IN ROOM

Mrs. Hayner-Thiele Falls Into Trap. Then Tries to Shift Blame of Misdced on No. 2, Who Played Dirty Trick.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 7.—(Special.)—The arrest of Mrs. W. R. Hayner, alias Mrs. Edmund Thiele, at Oakland today on a charge of bigamy, reveals one of the most remarkable stories of matrimonial adventures on record, reaching the climax when the two husbands banded together and No. 1 sent No. 2 to Portland, Oregon, to decoy his wife within the reach of the court.

A little more than a week ago, Edmund Thiele, who is a well-to-do druggist of Crockett, Contra Costa County, went to Portland and found his "wife." By promise of finery and jewels he induced her to return with him to Oakland and they went to the Alta Vista apartments. Then No. 1, William R. Hayner, was summoned by No. 2, and it is said that the two husbands held the woman a virtual prisoner for several days while they prepared the evidence which resulted in her arrest today.

Leaves No. 1 in Denver.

The woman's maiden name was May Ferguson and she was married to Hayner twenty years ago in Jefferson County, Iowa. They lived until about a year ago in Denver. Then Mrs. Hayner suddenly departed westward, bringing her 11-year-old daughter with her. Just 27 years old and very pretty, she soon made friends and last Spring she met Thiele. On June of this year she and Thiele

and her daughter went to San Rafael, where they were married.

Mrs. Hayner was taken to San Rafael this evening from Oakland by a constable and lodged in the County Jail. She will be brought before a justice of the peace on Saturday on a charge of bigamy.

Says No. 2 Lured Her On.

The woman's daughter left tonight for Portland. She claims to have a husband there, though nothing definite on her married state can be obtained here. The woman's son, aged 19, is now with the father.

Mrs. Hayner says she will make it "hot" for Thiele for having "played that dirty trick," saying that he used every allurement to entice her to marry regardless of her undivorced state.

DOOMED TO ENGLISH JAIL

Benson Sentenced for Swindling Hundreds by Fake Bank.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—Harry Benson, of Brooklyn, N. Y., whose real name is Bebro, has been found guilty in the Criminal Court and sentenced to five years penal servitude. The charges against him were of fraud in connection with the bankruptcy of Fotham's Bank, which he founded.

In the course of the trial, evidence was given that he had defrauded more than 200 persons through the bank. It was also adduced that he had swindled 1800 other persons by means of the International Securities Corporation.

GRADE WHEAT UNIFORMLY

All Interests Hope for Agreement. Let Government Step In.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 7.—Uniform grading of wheat, the most important question before the grain interests of the country, was the principal subject of discussion in the convention of the National Graindealers today.

It is hoped that it will be possible to formulate a grading upon which the Chicago Board of Trade and all other wheat interests shall be able to agree, and thus fend off general Government inspection, to which the majority of the members of the association are opposed.

Captain Fined for Smuggling.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 7.—Captain Zeltmeyer, of the steamship Erna, of the Independent Steamship Line, pleaded guilty in the United States District Court today to a charge of having smuggled Panama hats into this country and was fined \$1000 by Judge Wellborn.

QUAINT SHIPS MOVE

Hudson-Fulton Celebration Is Transferred Up-State.

ALBANY IN GALA ATTIRE

New York Capital Entertains Half Moon and Clermont—2000 Girls Do Flag Maneuvers Before Governor Hughes.

ALBANY, N. Y., Oct. 7.—The up-state Hudson-Fulton celebration reached its climax today with the arrival at Hudson of the reproductions of Henry Hudson's ship, Half Moon, and Robert Fulton's steamer Clermont, and with an impressive spectacle at Albany.

Preceded by a yacht carrying Governor Hughes, the old steamer Norwiche towed the Half Moon to the landing at Hudson, while the Clermont, bearing Mrs. Hughes and a party of guests, splashed along under its own power. They were given an enthusiastic reception. Civic and military organizations paraded through the city and were reviewed by Governor Hughes at the city hall.

A float representing the "Reception of LaFayette" was manned by members of LaFayette Commandery No. 7, Knights Templars, of Hudson, which was named in honor of General LaFayette, who was present when the commandery was instituted in 1824.

In the afternoon a drinking fountain, erected by Hendrick Hudson Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, was dedicated in Court House Park.

At Albany more than 200 school girls wearing red, white and blue caps, were closely grouped on the steps of the state capitol, so as to represent an American flag.

Albany's main celebration has been reserved for tomorrow, when the Half Moon and the Clermont with a flotilla of torpedo boats and revenue cutters are expected to arrive.
